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

14 MORE GAS SUITS FILED-Atty. Gen. John Hill has filed 14 more suits to recover full market value of royalty gas produced from state lands. The first such suit was filed May 18 against Exxon Corporation.

The state contends it is not limited by long term contracts, nor to any regulated ceiling prices promulgated by the Federal Power Commission.

Defendants, according to state allegations, are selling gas at about 20 cents per 1,000 cubic feet, or less, while the market value is around 45 cents per 1000 cubic

> ROAD CONTRACT LETTING OFF-Monthly state highway contract lettings scheduled July 24-25 for 18 projects costing about \$22 million were cancelled due to failure of Congress to approve a federal aid bill.

Texas Highway Engineer B. L. DeBerry said the state had no allternative. Highway aid bills have been tied up in conference committee after th U. S. Senate and House passed different versions. Dispute is largely over diversion of highway trust fund revenues to urban mass transit.

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


