Funeral services for Joe Bowman, 75, were held at Sparks, Nev., July 9 with burial in Reno, Nev. His home was in Marysville, Calif.


He was born March 16, 1898, at Mertzon and came to Coke County where the family lived several years near Silver. They moved to California in 1937.

According to the latest statistics, America's fiftieth state is death rate; death rates in the age groups 5-19, 20-44, 45-64, and 65plus; deaths due to motor vehicle accidents, the combined group of heart disease, cancer and stroke, as well as influenza and pneumonia. And with a life expectancy of 71.55 years, it's right behind the five leaders: Nebraska (71.95 years), Iowa (71.91), Kansas (71. 90), Minnesota (71.84), and North Dakota (71.72), Trailing in this category is South Carolina, where residents have an average life expectancy of only 66.41 years.

Keeping the canned peas fresh ... How long you can keep canned and packaged foods at home before they lose their nutritional value depends, largely, on freshness at the time of purchase. According to Philip L. White, Sc.D., secretary of the American Medical Association's Council on Focds and Nutrition, all packaged and canned goods are coded, by number or letter, indicating either the

date. Since the codes vary, shoppers should ask the manager or information service at their local store how to interpret the codes

Flour, sugar, and other staples will keep almost indefinitely if properly sealed to keep out insects, dust, and moisture. Unamong the lowest five in overall opened packages of prepared mixes, such as cakes, puddings, biscuits, casseroles, and instant potatoes, can be kept for one year. says Dr. White, but once opened, the contents should be used within two months.

When buying canned goods, stay away from dented or punctured cans. Swollen cans contain spoiled food, he explains, and should be thrown out. Many canned fruits and vegetables, such as apricots, asparagus, cherries, pineapple, and peaches, can be stored up to two years, but they will lose some of their flavor, texture, and vitamin C. For best results, says Dr. White, canned goods should be stored in the coolest area in the house (preferably below 70°F). It's also a good idea to mark the purchase date on all pantry items and replace

NEW GUARD PROGRAM OF-FERED - A new enlistment option in the Texas National Guard has been offered non-prior service personnel for a 90 day trial period.

Under the plan, non-veterans can enlist in the Guard for six years with the option of serving three in an active (drill status and the final three in the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR) Control Group. No monthly drills would be required in the last three years, although summer training may be ordered. Texas is one of 16 states offering the option.

TAX EXPERTS TO BE CALL-ED - In the search for a solution to school revenue problems, the Legislative Property Tax Committee may be asked to bring in expert witnesses to discuss taxing of intangible property like bank accounts, stocks and bonds.

A House education committee sub-panel is exploring the intangible tax field in determining wealth of school districts, but has encountered little enthusiasm for taxing all such wealth.
