dictment was withheld pending brief report on expenditure of of the BCD. The matter was discussed at the Monday meeting of the Commissioners' Court.

Architect's drawings and estimates of the costs of a show barn at Robert Lee and a recretation hall at Bronte were presented to the court Monday. The judge told BCD members that since the cost of building materials has gone up, the estimated figure of \$84,000 for the barn and \$52,000 for the rec hall were higher than was expected.

Thetford said it would cost about \$8,000 to draw up the plans and take bids on the two projects. The court gave its okay to proceed with the plans.

Judge Thetford said it would take most of the fall to complete the plans and by January they would know how much federal money would be forthcoming next year. The amount received for 1973 was very little more than the 1972 amount, the Judge said.

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



The number of layers throughout the nation totaled 285,000,000; this is five per cent below last year and two per cent under last month.

LAMB crop in Texas (lambs born during the period Oct. 1 1972, through June 50, 1973) is estimated at 1,964,000 head; this is down 15 per cent from the 2,302,000 head last year.
