### Fine Fall Rains Cover RL Area

The rain was fairly general over the Robert Lee area, starting on Tuesday night of last week and continuing through the first of this week.

### Items of Interest From R-Lee BCD

Bill Allen reported at Tuesday's meeting of the BCD that a \$125 payment had been made to John Gill, outdoor sports writer, for his work in publicizing Lake Spence and the Robert Lee area. 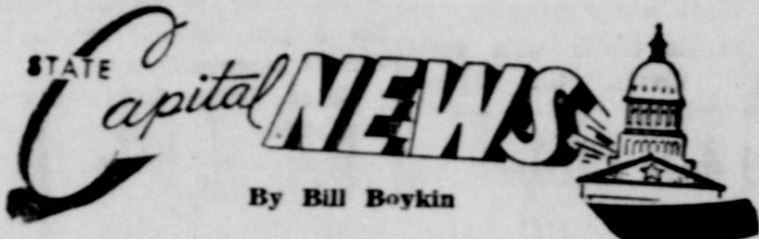

Austin — An executive order has been issued by Gov. Dolph Briscoe creating the Division of Rural Community Services in the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Governor Briscoe, who has listed rural development as one of the priorities of his administration, created the new division in response to what he termed "the urgent needs of rural areas."

In announcing the new rural services office, Governor Briscoe said the role of the Texas Department of Community Affairs is to make all state resources available and accessible to local communities as they strive to help themselves.

The Rural Community Services Division will provide information and technical assistance to rural communities and will assist in development of a state policy for rural development, the Governor said.

The new office will serve as a clearing house and will be a central state office that rural communities can go to for help, said Briscoe.

Raymond L. Prewett, executive director of the Texas Rural Development Commission, has been named to head up the Division of Rural Community Services.

A major part of his new duties, said the Governor, will be to assist rural communities in their relations with state and federal agencies and to direct communities with specific problems to the appropriate agencies.

Along the same line, the Governor has acted to expand the Texas Industrial Commission to include three members from rural areas. In the past, membership on the Commission has been two employers of labor, two employees or laborers and five members from the general public.

The Texas Industrial commission is responsible for planning, organizing and operating a program for attracting and locating new industries and to promote the expansion of existing industries in Texas.

REVISION COMMISSION REVERSES ITSELF — The Texas Constitutional Revision Commission reversed its Aug. 25 decision—that the Texas Legislature should meet annually — and voted that the proposed new Constitution should require the legislature to meet once every two years. But the time and duration of session or sessions would be set by the lawmakers themselves.

POT LAW RULING DUE—The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals

is expected to rule later this fall on an amendment to the state's criminal code to allow resentencing of persons previously convicted of possession of marijuana.

Travis County Dist. Atty. Bob Smith, who argues against implementation of the resentencing provision, claims it amounts to commutation of sentence, a power which the constitution gives only to the governor.

"Just because you call a horse a cow doesn't make it a cow," Smith told the Criminal Appeals Court. "Just because they (the Legislature) call it a resentencing doesn't mean it's not a commutation," Smith said.

Lawyers on the other side of the question claim the resentencing

provision is an authorization for the courts to review sentences, upon request from the defendant, and amend them, if justified.

About 800 persons serving terms in Texas could be affected by the outcome of the ruling. Conviction of possession of marijuana carried possible sentence of up to life imprisonment prior to revision by the 63rd Legislature to reduce first possession penalties.

The groom-to-be is a junior law student at St. Mary's University in San Antonio. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Vaughan III of Hillsboro.

**New Export Facility ... Turkey Production Increases ... Red Meat Production Expands.**

New livestock export facilities for Texas will become a reality soon. The state of Texas has entered contracts for construction of the new facilities to be located at Brownsville and El Paso.

The new facilities, along with those already constructed in the state, will boost Texas further into the realm of international agriculture. About \$40 million a year is now added to the Texas economy through the livestock export business.

The new facilities will meet standards set by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and will include sheltered and cubed pens, vats for dipping, laboratory and office space, and hydraulic operated chutes.

Other export pens are in operation at Houston, Eagle Pass and Del Rio.

TURKEY producers in Texas are expected to produce 16 per cent more turkeys this year than last year, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

The current crop is estimated at 9,091,000 birds compared with 7,851,000 raised in 1972.

Nationwide, turkey production is expected to be two per cent higher than last year. Minnesota is the leading turkey production state in the nation. Texas has ranked in the top 10 for several years.

The increase in turkeys in Texas for 1973 is in the heavy breed variety. A decrease of 5,000 birds is expected in light breeds.

RED meat production in Texas commercial slaughtering plants is up two per cent in July from the previous month and is one per cent above the amount produced in July 1972.

Nationwide, red meat produc-

tion is almost identical to a year ago, but is five per cent under June of this year.

In Texas, cattle slaughtered during July is 1,000 below the number slaughtered last month. Hog slaughter is down 9,000 head from last month. Sheep and lambs killed are up 4,000 head from a month ago.

Average live weight of cattle slaughtered in July was 944 pounds.

AUCTION sales in Texas report sales were below year ago totals for cattle, calves, sheep, goats and hogs.

Cattle and calves marketed through auctions during July numbered 588,000 head, six per cent below a year ago, and nine per cent under a month ago.

HARVESTING of 1973 crops is behind schedule of last year. Cotton harvesting is nearly 10 per cent completion. Corn harvest is about two-thirds behind in completion compared to last year.

Grain sorghum harvest is picking up momentum with some excellent yields of 5,000 to 6,000 pounds per acre reported in the Blacklands. The crop in the High Plains shows generally good growth.

Early fields of wheat have been planted on the High Plains. A shortage of fertilizer is being reported in wheat areas.

Plans are nearing completion for the Food and Fiber Pavilion at the State Fair in Dallas to be held in October. The Texas Department of Agriculture's Marketing Division will again be in charge of the pavilion.

Purpose of the pavilion is to show the abundance and quality to be found in Texas produced food and fiber.

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### PUBLIC NOTICE

## SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

#### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to: Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days;

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session;

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

#### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

#### NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

#### NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

#### NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

#### NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

#### NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million;

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified;

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

#### NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

#### NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."

## Our Newsletter

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

The Senate Watergate hearing is to be resumed soon, and is, according to Senator Ervin, to be concluded about six weeks later. Considerable rumbling has developed about continued TV coverage, and a good many are saying the "show" should be shut down, that it has served its purpose, and it's time to let the courts perform.

While exposure of any form of skulduggery may be useful, there is serious danger that excessive publicity may jeopardize

the ability of the Department of Justice to successfully prosecute any Watergate culprits who may be indicted. Many prospective jurors become opinionated and courts have reversed convictions where excessive publicity made fair trials improbable.

Repatriation of U. S. blacks to Africa? A New York Times reporter recently wrote a feature story entitled "U. S. blacks built new life in Africa," in which he told how pleased "a few thousand black Americans living permanent-

ly in Africa" are with what one immigrant described as the "ageless, rhythmic vibrations" of the dark continent.

How extensive this repatriation move may be remains to be seen. Not long ago Rep. Robert Nix, a black congressman from Philadelphia, introduced a bill to authorize our government to negotiate with African states for undeveloped land where U. S. repatriates would be settled. The African nations would be well compensated. Free transportation would be offered along with other benefits—a sort of foreign aid for the countries involved.

This plan is really nothing new. The idea was advanced by Thomas Jefferson, later by Abraham Lincoln, and some Negro leaders have proposed in the past that repatriation to the fatherland be sponsored by our government. But unless more interested is manifested it is not likely that anything will be done to promote

repatriation, other than voluntary moves such as was described in the New York Times article.
