
VANCED - A House education committee recommendation for the state to assume \$600 million in added school costs over a six year period went to Speaker Daniel and Briscoe last week.

"What we are trying to do is relieve the local taxpayers and shift the burden to the state," said Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale, committee chairman. "The local districts are at about their (taxing) limit."

Kubiak said overhauling the school finance formulas can be accomplished without any immediate new taxes, because \$109 million in unexpended funds rests in the state treasury.

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




