

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 10, at the United Methodist Church in Blackwell, with burial in Decker Cemetery under direction of Cate-Spencer Funeral Home. The Rev. Wayne Norman, pastor, and the Rev. Kay Corley, Baptist minister, officiated.

Mrs. Lanier was born Sept. 20. 1880, in Alma, Ark., and was married to Bob Lanier Aug. 3, 1898, in Blum. They moved to Runnels County in 1901, to Decker in 1904 and to Blackwell in 1936. They celebrated their 75th wedding anniversary on Aug. 5 and Mr. Lanier died Aug. 23.



Open season on turkey is Nov 17 to Jan. 1. Bag limit is two turkeys of either sex.

Anyone leasing land for hunting must obtain a shooting preserve license which may be obtained from Parks and Wildlife Department, P. O. Drawer 1590, a regional office. The fee

Anyone needing a trapper's license may also obtain it from the Parks and Wildlife Dept. in San Angelo.

All other licenses may be obtained from local license deputies. Duck season for this area is Nov. 10 through Nov. 25 and Dec. 8 through Jan. 20, 1974.

The daily bag limit is reached when the point value of any bird or birds taken reaches or exceeds 100 points. Possession limit is the maximum number of ducks which could have been taken legally in two days.

Daily duck bag limit: one to 10 I want to take this means of ducks in the aggregate based on

100 point ducks: canvasbacks and redhead ducks.

70 point ducks; mallard hens wood ducks and hooded mergan-10 point ducks: blue winged teal,

species of ducks. The season is closed on black bellied and fulvous tree ducks and New Mexican ducks.


