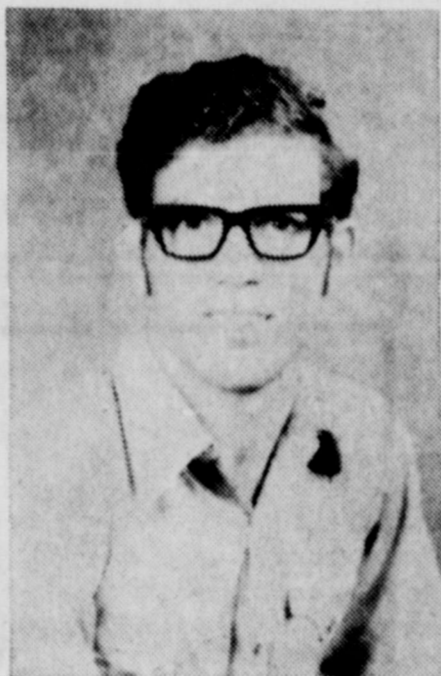

Banana Punch

- 1 46 oz. can pineapple juice
- 1 12 oz. can frozen orange juice—dilute as directed on can
- 6 cups water
- 4 cups sugar
- Juice of 2 lemons
- 5 large bananas, blended
- 3 quarts gingerale

Heat water and sugar until sugar is dissolved. Add other ingredients except gingerale. Cool and put into suitable container and freeze. When ready to serve, set out of freezer 3 hours before serving. Put into punch bowl and add chilled gingerale. Serves 50.

Agriculture Is Big Business in Texas

"Texans are invited to take a close look at the agricultural industry of their state during the month of November, which has been designated as 'Food and Fiber Appreciation Month.' It's a fitting tribute to an industry that serves as the lifeblood of humanity," points out Charles Baker, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Texas should be proud of their agricultural industry which contributes more than \$10 billion to the state's economy each year and employs about 30 per cent of the state's labor force. Of the state's 168 million acres of land area, 142 million are devoted to agriculture," Baker said.

What are some of the facts and figures that make Texas an agricultural giant?

Here are a few:

- * Texas ranks third nationally to only California and Iowa in total agricultural income.

- * Texas leads the nation in producing cotton, grain sorghum and rice.

- * It is the top cattle producer and also leads in the production of sheep and wool, goats and mohair.

- * Texas ranks third among agricultural exporting states and is the leading exporting state in rice, cotton, hides, tallow and cottonseed oil. About 21 per cent of the state's 1972 cash receipts from agriculture came from exports.

- * Texas is second only to Georgia in peanut production and is a major producer of other oilseed crops such as cottonseed, soybeans, flaxseed and castors.

- * Texas is the third leading vegetable producing state behind California and Florida. It ranks first in cabbage, watermelon and spinach productions and second in onions, carrots and cantaloupes.

- * The state is second in producing grapefruit and third in oranges.

- * Texas leads in native pecans and is third in overall pecan production.

- * Honey production is also big-business, with Texas being third in the number of bee colonies.

- * Texas is among the top 10 dairy states in the nation.

- * The state is a leading producer of poultry and eggs.

Other enterprises that are important generators of agricultural income in Texas are timber, horses, fish farming and recreation. Texas is the leading state in horse numbers and is among the leading states in fish farming.

"Agriculture is indeed 'big' in Texas," notes Baker, "and it continues to grow to meet the ever-increasing demands for high quality food and fiber products."

Please Mail Early, Shandley Asks

With Christmas mailing time at hand, and with slower transportation because of the energy crisis, Ray Shandley, officer in charge of the Robert Lee Post Office, issued the following statement this week to patrons of the local office.

The Christmas season is always a test and a challenge to postal people everywhere. As a 25 year veteran of the Postal Service and having worked several seasons in a large office, I can testify to the fact that I still don't know how all the mail is handled with such a small percentage of errors. The only answer I've found lies in the dedication and pride of postal people to get the job done. They welcome the challenge and meet it headon.

Nationally speaking, this Christmas season presents an even greater challenge, due to the "crisis" we are all aware of. The President has asked all government vehicles to conform to the 50 mph standard and this includes contract vehicles which are the kind that brings the mail to our office. This will no doubt cause some added congestion at all larger offices and sectional centers such as San Angelo, Abilene and Midland. Thus we are

anticipating some additional slowing of the Christmas mails.

In addition to this, our local office will be missing a long time experienced worker, H. S. (Bub) Lewis, who recently retired as postmaster. His service will be missed. However, our newly appointed clerks, Mrs. Joann Runion and Mrs. Carol Foust, are doing a great job and improving daily. We ask you to please bear with us, and we welcome all complaints. This is the only way we can find out what mistakes we are making, so let us know about it.

Now the real purpose of this message is to inform our people of the situation we face locally and nationally, and the Service has asked me to stress the urgency of mailing very early this year. We are thinking in terms of 10-15 days earlier than you normally do. This will spread out the volume of mail over a longer period and hopefully avoid the large pile-ups during the peak of the rush. Your cooperation in these matters will be appreciated by all, and enable us to do a better job for you, our patrons.

Steers Drop Season's Ender to Mason, 20-0

What was figured to be a ground battle between the large Mason team and the smaller Steers turned out to be quite different when they met here Friday night and the Mason lads took home a 20-0 win.

The Punchers from Mason went to the air 17 times for 249 yards and carried the ball only 26 times. On the other hand, the Steers penetrated the monster size line of Mason for 171 yards, mainly on the running of converted tackle Mitch Cooley who rushed for 149 yards of the total. The Steers were crippled to the point where the only thing they had going for them was desire and guts. The coaching staff should be commended for keeping the boys together under the circumstances.

Out with injuries in the final game were Darrell Copeland, Mitt Rogers, Bill Rowoldt and Mike Davis, and if I went down the injury list of the boys who did play, the medical book would have to be rewritten.

This was the final game for 10 Steers and it wasn't a happy occasion after the game. Seeing action for the last time were Jesse Eads, Bill Rowoldt, Rick Mashburn, Mitt Rogers, Darrell Copeland, Wibby Millican, Cliff Cole, Jeff Eubanks, Jesse Costilla and Mitch Cooley. These young men should be commended for their efforts and it wouldn't hurt to tell them to their faces.

First Quarter

Mason received the opening kickoff at their 14 and returned it to the 29. They went to the

air quickly and made 1s downs at their 49, the Steer 39 and 21. A hard rush by the Steers caused a fumble at the 26 with Jesse Costilla recovering. The Punchers soon got it back on a short pass recovery at the Steer 17, but again the Steers held and took over on downs at their own 14. The new fullback went to work behind the quick Steer line and the Steers moved to their 40, making two 1st downs. Then the Steers fumbled on their 41 on 1st down. Mason recovered and the bomb came in the fashion of a 41 yard TD pass for the Punchers. The extra kick was good and it was 7-0.
