





Parks and Wildlife Department fisheries biologists stild four years elgo that striped bass stocked in Lake Spence might scimeday reach weights of 35 pounds or more.


Stripers in the 14 pound class are now being taken on a reguiar bosis at the Coke County Lake, and the experts are still predicting even greater weights in the near future.




