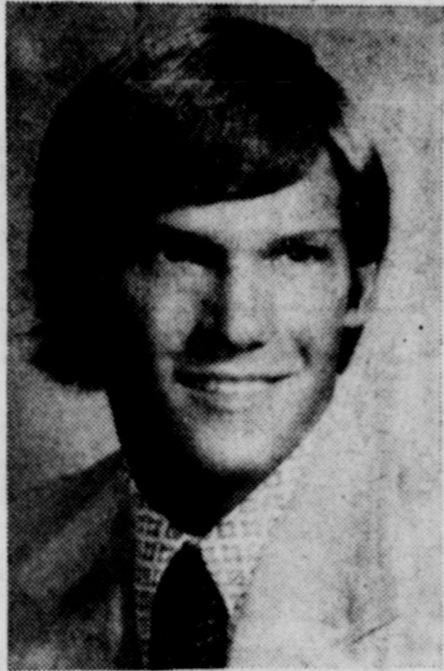

Officials of the Upper Colorado River Authority and the City of Robert Lee were to open bids at 4 p.m. Wednesday on construction of a pipeline from Lake Spence to the city's water treatment plant. At press time the meeting was still in session and no information was available.

Marker Dedication Set for Tuesday

A program to dedicate the Lucian Bartholomew Murray grave marker will be held Tuesday in the Robert Lee Recreation Center immediately following the noon BCD luncheon.

Murray was an early day Coke County sheriff and tax collector. The marker is located in Robert Lee Cemetery.

Sterling Lindsey will be master of ceremonies for the program and Highway Patrolman Bobby Hart will give the main address.

The program will be concluded by unveiling the marker at the cemetery.

The Texas Highway Department has awarded a contract to J. D. Burk Construction Co. of San Angelo for the construction of a new maintenance Warehouse in Robert Lee.

Work began last week and the new section warehouse should be operational by late 1974, according to D. R. Watson, district en-

gineer for the Texas Highway Department in San Angelo.

"The opening of the new facility will be with the least inconvenience to present employees," said James R. "Bobby" Evans, district maintenance engineer. The present subsection in Bronte will remain operational and will be under the supervision of the maintenance supervisor in Robert Lee, who will be named at a later date.

The new maintenance building of concrete masonry block will be on State Highway 158 east of Robert Lee. Included in the over 8,000 square feet will be offices, a meeting room, shop, stock room, equipment and material storage areas.

Some additional personnel will be needed to staff the Robert Lee facility, and Evans said anyone interested in applying for a job with the Highway Department should make application through J. B. Arrott, maintenance foreman in Ballinger.

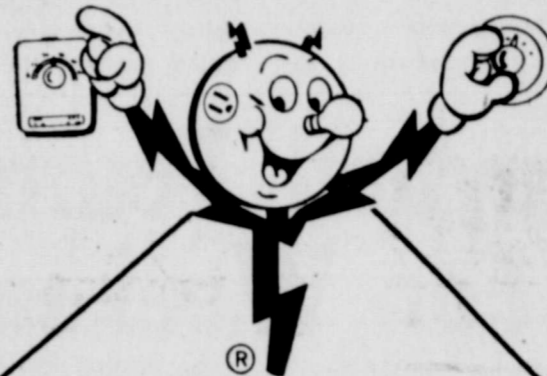

64 STUDY CLUB HOSTS GOLDEN AGE TEA

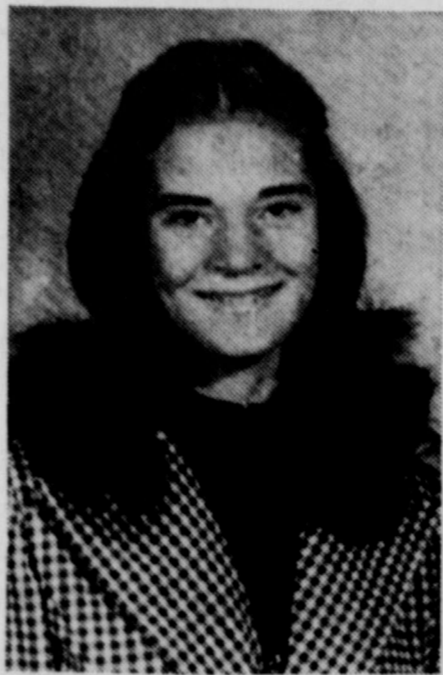

Following the program, club members had their regular business meeting at the home of Mrs. W. T. Roach, president.

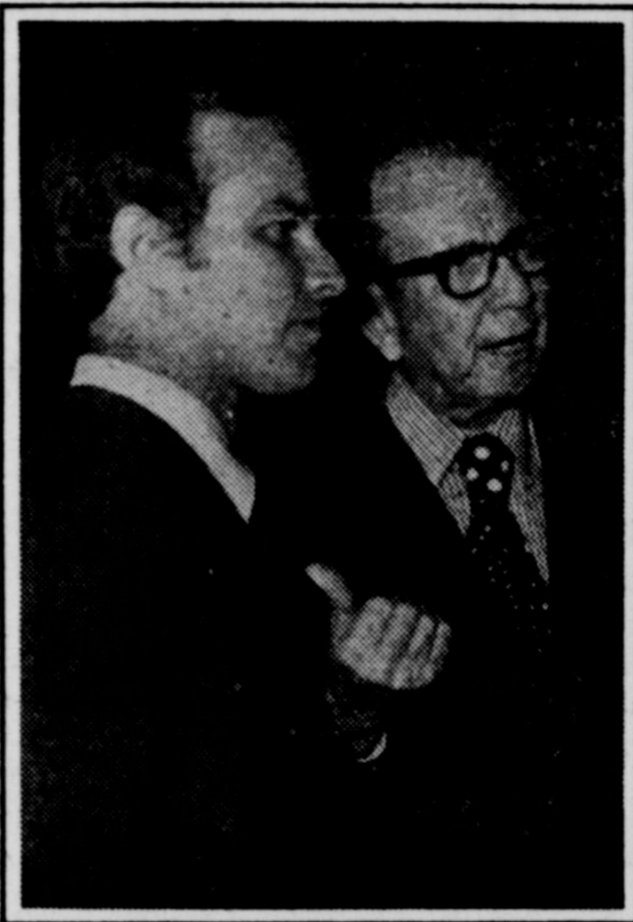

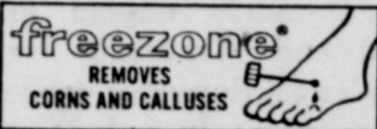

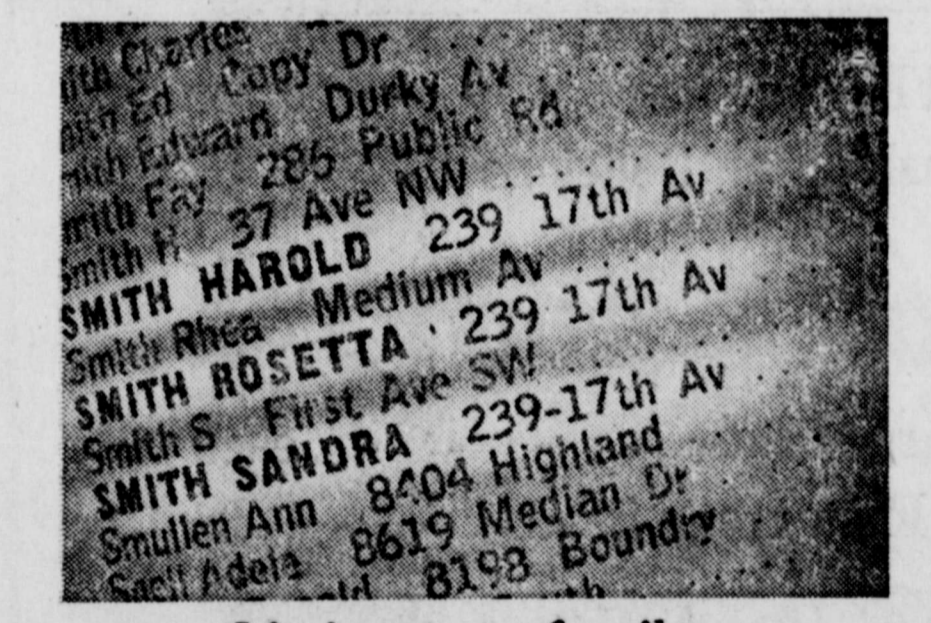
