The new grade-point system will be used only for determining class rank, especially valedictorian and salutatorian, and other scholastic honors, such as membership in the honor society. Numerical grades affected.

"We give letters and other recognition in sports, choir, band and other activities, but academics are often overlooked," said School Board member Deanne Clark.

"This new system will not only recognize those with top grade averages, but will also allow for those who are taking harder courses," she added.

For ninth, 10th and 11th grade students, the system will go into effect in the 1982-83 school year. Implementation on the 12th grade level will begin with the 1983-84 school year.

All courses in high school different levels: college preand basic level.

The basic level will include tax appraisal applications. Fundamentals of Math I and II, office duplicating, physical science, Plan A Resource remedial courses, and vocational education for the handicapped (engine repair).

College-bound courses include college-preparatory government, Algebra II, analytical geometry, chemistry, physics, trigonometry, college-prep free enterprise, Spanish II, English IV, and college-prep English I, II and

The regular level includes all courses not in either of the above categories.

Grade points will not be given for correspondence courses or activity courses such as annual, athletics, band, cheerleading, choir, library aide, office aide, physical education or teacher

Grade points will range from 0.00 to 5.00, with different grade points being assigned to different numerical grades on each level of courses. On all levels, a grade below 60 gets 0.00 grade points.







## **Deficiency checks** due any day now

Grain sorghum farmers will get deficiency checks this month for 48 cents per hundred pounds on their 1981 production. Commodity Credit Corp. is mailing checks totaling about \$232 million.

Texas sorghum producers will receive the largest share with \$71.5 million, while \$65.4 million will go to Kansas growers and \$44.8 million to

"USDA has informed us that the checks were mailed Saturday," reported Grain Sorghum Producers Association Executive Director Elbert Harp.

The payment is the difference between the national average loan rate and the sorghum target price. The 48cent payment is the maximum amount permitted by law because the average price to farmers during the first five months of the marketing year was below the loan level.

It is a result of a provision

written and sponsored by GSPA in the 1977 farm bill. This provision sets sorghum target prices in relation to corn according to the relative cost of production.

#### Insects of interest -Spray apple trees to control codling moths

actually have a predisposing The codling moth is one of factor that causes obesity, our most serious insect pests of apples and pears. The presence of apple blossoms means that the small grey and brown moth will soon be seeking fruit trees on which to

The codling moth survives the winter as a full grown larva, hibernating on or near apple trees. Pupation takes place in the spring. Moths begin emerging about the time apples are in bloom. Eggs, which are about pin head size, are laid on leaves and fruit between sundown and about 10:00 p.m., if temperatures are above 60 degrees F. Tiny larvae hatch from the eggs and tunnel into the fruit leaving brown cast-Agricultural Extension ings on the surface. The

about 3 weeks with the result being the traditional "wormy apple." Larvae are white, with a slight pink color and have brown heads. Mature worms tunnel out of the apple and spin cocoons in crevices of bark, fences and soil. About two weeks later a new generation of moths emerge to infest fruit again.

A well-timed spray program must be followed to protect apples from codling moths. applied when 90% of the flower petals have fallen. Never spray trees in bloom this will kill bees necessary for pollination and fruit set.

Spray again 10-12 days after 90% petal fall and continue spraying at 10-14 day intervals until 1-2 weeks before harvest." necessary as codling moths are present throughout the summer, and missing a scheduled spray can result in larvae grow and feed for wormy apples.

> Malathion and Sevin® (carbaryl), or a fruit tree spray containing one of these insecticides can be used to control codling moths. Spray the tree thoroughly. Use Sevin® only for the third and later sprays as it may thin apples if used within 30 days of bloom. Always read and follow the label instructions carefully when using any insecticide.




