DISD adopts grade-points

After canvassing the election results and swearing in Charles Wales and Glenn Odom, the Dimmitt School Board Monday night approved proposals which will change the way high school students' class rankings are determined.

The new grade-point system will be used only for determining class rank, especially valedictorian and salutatorian, and other scholastic honors, such as membership in the honor society. Numerical grades and report cards will not be affected.

"We give letters and other recognition in sports, choir, band and other activities, but academics are often overlooked," said School Board member Deanne Clark.

"This new system will not only recognize those with top grade averages, but will also allow for those who are taking harder courses," she added.

For ninth, 10th and 11th grade students, the system will go into effect in the 1982-83 school year. Implementation on the 12th grade level will begin with the 1983-84 school year.

All courses in high school will be classified into three different levels: college preparatory level, regular level and basic level.

The basic level will include English as a second language, Fundamentals of Math I and II, office duplicating, physical science, Plan A Resource remedial courses, and vocational education for the handicapped (engine repair).

College-bound courses include college-preparatory government, Algebra II, analytical geometry, chemistry, physics, trigonometry, college-prep free enterprise, Spanish II, English IV, and college-prep English I, II and III.

The regular level includes all courses not in either of the above categories.

Grade points will not be given for correspondence courses or activity courses such as annual, athletics, band, cheerleading, choir, library aide, office aide, physical education or teacher aide.

Grade points will range from 0.00 to 5.00, with different grade points being assigned to different numerical grades on each level of courses. On all levels, a grade below 60 gets 0.00 grade points.

A numerical grade of 100 in a college-bound level course yields 5.00 grade points, while a 100 on a regular level is worth 4.50 grade points. On the basic level, a 100 brings 4.00 grade points.

The same 4.00 grade points can be gained by earning a numerical grade of 90 in a regular level course or an 80 in a college-bound level course.

In discussing the new system, Supt. Robert Ryan pointed out a case in which a student who took all college-bound level courses and struggled through with 80's or low 90's was outranked by students who took easier courses and made high 90's.

"It's a lot harder to get a 90 in trig than it is to get a 100 in fundamentals of math, and we want to recognize the students who make that extra effort," Ryan said.

Jim Plain and Don Percy from the Region XVI Education Service Center in Amarillo explained to the board the capabilities of the IBM System 34 computer.

"Applications of the system for school use can eventually include everything from financial accounting and payroll to student records and scheduling," Plain said. He added that he was especially impressed with the system's tax appraisal applications.

Ryan said that the school would like to be able to sell computer time on the system to other local government bodies.

Plain told the board that even with the basic 34 system, programs for the city, county and tax appraisal district could probably be handled on a time-sharing basis, but he said that all the records could not be held on line at the same time unless an expanded system is used.

Plain said that the service center has had a hand in developing or finding some of the software programs that can make the System 34 so adaptable for school use.

He told the board, however, that the scheduling program will probably not be available until September. He said they are also looking to the future development of a program for handling personnel records other than payroll.

Percy gave a "ball park figure" of \$70,000 for the basic System 34 including the hardware, software, license for use of the software, and a [See DISD, Page 15]

CUFUPU's crusher wants your old car

"I'm for CUFUPU" is the sign that will be seen throughout Dimmitt. It will be seen on wrecked cars and on old appliances to designate them as future property of the Clean-Up, Fix-Up, Pride-Up project.

The red and black stickers will mark junk that the committee gets permission to haul away on Saturday, April 24 — dump day.

This will be the second year for the city-wide campaign to encourage citizens of Dimmitt to make this a "nicer, cleaner, prettier place to live."

Last year's drive was in March, and the weather was bad on the big day. Co-chairman Dorothy Hopson said that the committee hopes the

weather is much better on collection day this year.

Other changes have been made to improve the campaign, she added. The biggest change is the addition of a car-smasher for metal debris.

Co-chairman Chuck Braafladt said that Fred Cariker of Amarillo Auto Crushers will bring his equipment to Dimmitt to smash cars and appliances on dump day. It will be located on a vacant lot located in the 200 block of Northeast Second.

Cariker said that he needs to have 12 bundles of crushed metal to make it worthwhile to come to Dimmitt. He must have at least two cars in each bundle, one on bottom and one on top to sandwich the

appliances and other metal.

CUFUPU campaigners are asking local citizens to take wrecked cars to the lot. The Chamber of Commerce will pay \$15 for each vehicle hauled in and delivered to the lot on Northeast Second. If representatives of the campaign must pick up the wrecked car, the owner will still be paid \$7.50.

"We're desperately in need of those wrecked cars by (Friday) the 23rd," Braafladt said. In addition to the 24 cars, the crusher will need about 120 appliances, he added.

Cariker will strip the cars of their motors, tires, wheels and gas tanks. Those will be [See CUFUPU's, Page 15]

Plains Memorial gets 26 remote-control TV's

Plains Memorial Hospital has 26 new RCA color TV sets — more than \$11,000 worth — thanks to the Hospital Auxiliary.

The new sets will make it easier for patients to watch TV. They'll be wall-mounted, patients will be able to operate them by remote control.

The TV sets will be wired into a new nurse-call system which the hospital is installing. A patient will be able to communicate with the nurse's station and operate the TV set by using buttons on a bedside "pillow speaker" unit.

Until now, cart-mounted TV sets have been wheeled into patients' rooms as ordered, and they had no remote speakers or controls.

The new wall-mounted sets will be key-operated. Rental fees will go to the Hospital Auxiliary to buy more equipment for the hospital in the future.

When the crated TV sets arrived Monday, Hospital Auxiliary President Irene Blanton and Treasurer Marie Fleming were on hand to present Administrator Marshall Cook with a check for \$11,090.73 to pay for them.

The check represented funds from the Auxiliary's Operation Christmas Greeting, Holiday Bazaar and Dinner, gift shop and TV rentals.

The Auxiliary has spent more than \$33,000 in just the last two years at the hospital. Last year the "Pink Ladies" paid for \$22,000 worth of repainting and refurbishing in the hospital's patient rooms and hallways.

DHS Band scores 29th Sweepstakes

Dimmitt High School's Bobcat Band won its 29th Sweepstakes award after earning a Division I rating in both the concert and sight-reading competitions in the regional spring band contest held here last Wednesday and Thursday.

The Dimmitt band also had a I rating in marching, awarded earlier in the school year. The Sweepstakes award is given to schools scoring a I in all three contests.

Class AA Hale Center was the only other area school to earn a Sweepstakes award this year. Muleshoe in Class AAA won a special award for earning two I ratings (concert and sightreading).

In Class A, the Nazareth High School band rated a III in concert and a II in sight-reading. Hart High School rated a III

in concert and a III in sight-reading in the Class AA competition.

Other schools and their ratings, with the concert rating listed first, are:

Class A — Lazbuddie III, I; Smyer III, III; Anton II, I; and Sudan II, I.

Class AA — Farwell II, II; Springlake III, II; Kress II, III; Petersburg II, I; and Bovina V, III.

Class AAA — Littlefield I, II; Olton II, II; Floydada II, II; Lockney II, II; Friona II, III; and Idalov IV, III.

Judges for the event were Warren Thaxton of Abilene, James Streit of Quanah, Sam Robertson of Snyder and Joe Hill of Abilene.

Judges' comments concerning Dimmitt were "very complimentary," according to DHS Band Director Ralph Smith.

until now. The station is located near Earth. He told the group that the station is approximately two months away from start up.

Absentee voting begins

Absentee voting is now under way for the May 1 primary elections, for both Democrats and Republicans. The voting began Monday and will continue through April 27.

Absentee ballots may be cast at the Castro County Clerk's office on the ground floor of the courthouse.

Any county citizen who expects to be out of the county for the entire absentee voting period may request that a ballot be sent to his or her out-of-county address. Other persons who may vote absentee by mail include those who will be unable to vote in the courthouse due to sickness, physical disability, religious beliefs or because they are 65 or older.

Those who qualify for voting by mail may request ballots from the clerk's office, 647-3338. All other residents who do not expect to be here on election day may go to the clerk's office to vote absentee.

Smith said that the band will play one performance, with 20 minutes time allowed. Activities planned for the outing include a ride on the train.

Four charter buses will carry the group on the trip at a basic cost of \$155 each. Some of these funds were raised through various band projects.

return April 25 sometime around 6 p.m.

Junior Bobcat Relays to be staged Saturday

Fourteen area schools will enter their seventh, eighth and ninth grade boys in the big Dimmitt Junior Bobcat Relays Saturday.

Competing in the big meet will be young athletes from Farwell, Friona, Hereford La Plata, Hereford Stanton, Littlefield, Lockney, Muleshoe, Nazareth, Olton, Plainview, Springlake-Earth, Slaton, Tulia and Dimmitt.

All the schools will enter seventh and eighth grade teams, and all but Farwell, Nazareth and Olton will have freshman teams in the meet. Plainview will enter two freshman teams.

Field events will begin at 9 a.m., and preliminary running events will start at 9:30.

Finals in the running events will start at 2 p.m. and continue until 5:30.

All events will be conducted at Bobcat Stadium, using the University Interscholastic League scoring system and rules. Ken Cleveland is the meet director, Jerry Durham is the coordinator, George Rasor is the meet referee, and members of the Dimmitt Public Schools coaching staffs will supervise the events.

Service clubs will provide volunteer workers to help with the starting, timing and placing. Those who worked at the Bobcat Relays three weeks ago are asked to help in Saturday's meet.

Workers are asked to meet Friday night at 7:30 in the

DHS cafeteria to coordinate assignments.

The Dimmitt Athletic Booster Club will operate the concession stand, selling coffee, soft drinks, sandwiches, nachos, gum and candy.

In addition to the standard running events, the meet will feature two "just for fun" races. They are the "weight man's 100-yard dash" for those who don't usually get a chance to run, and a mile medley relay event. Neither event will be scored.

In the mile medley race, each team will be composed of five runners. Two will run 110-yard dashes, one a 220, one a 440 and the anchor will run an 880.

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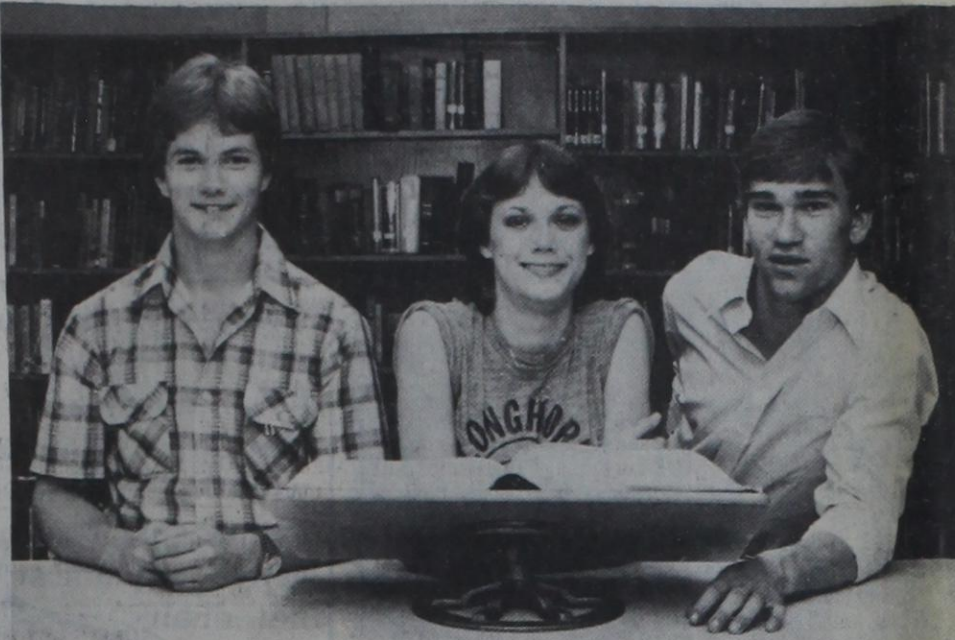

Heller discusses taxes at meeting

Chief Appraiser Jerry Heller told Rotarians Friday that the Tax Relief Amendment of 1978 provided for homestead exemptions of \$5,000, a tax freeze for taxpayers over 65, open-space evaluation and reappraisal in all Texas counties.

"There is no tax relief to this amendment," Heller said, adding that the tax burden was simply shifted somewhat.

The tax burden has been shifted away from the farmers and ranchers to urban dwellers. Home values will probably double this year for most people in Dimmitt, he said.

"Our appraisals are about 90 or 95 percent of market value," Heller added.

Legislature has provided for

another optional homestead exemption. It must be approved by either a county, city, school or other board for it to take effect locally. Heller said that the Dimmitt School Board may discuss it.

Legislature has also provided for the exemption of farm machinery and cattle this year. The Attorney General said two weeks ago that this particular exemption must be altered — lessened. With the exemption as it presently stands, Heller said that cattle communities such as Happy "may die" for loss of tax revenues on cattle.

This area will be hard hit by the exemption, he added, since about 70 percent of all cattle in Texas are in Castro, Deaf Smith, Swisher and Farmer Counties.

Vehicle exemptions are optional throughout the state, and all local entities in Castro County decided to tax vehicles except City of Nazareth.

Heller ended his talk by encouraging Rotarians to "write your senators."

Rev. Ed Freeman reported on the CUFUPU 2 planning meeting held last week. He said that the committee hopes that the Rotary Club will support the clean-up project.

Emmett Broderson reported on the sketching contest for children in the county. The sketches must have something to do with the circus, and the winners will be given tickets to one of the circus shows held on Sunday, April 25.

If a business or individual has not been called on and would like to make a donation, call Henry at 647-3108 or contact any choir member.

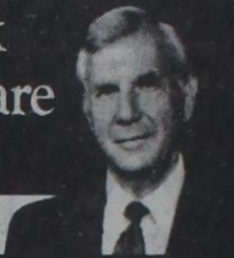
All types of music will be sung, including sacred songs, secular, folk, popular, country, jazz, classical, rock, patriotic, show tunes, old favorites and new pop tunes.

Leagues to organize Monday

Bronco-Mustang baseball to replace Little League

Dimmitt boys 7 through 12 won't play Little League baseball this summer. Instead, they'll play Bronco League and Mustang League ball, which has different rules.

Although Dimmitt boys 13 and older once played Pony and Colt League baseball, the city's program for boys 12 and younger has been affiliated with Little League for many years.

Some of the differences in Bronco-Mustang League rules are that base runners can lead off and pitchers can throw from the stretch.

"This will be real baseball," said John Brooks, who is serving as president of the new Bronco and Babe Ruth Leagues.

Pony Baseball, Inc., also allows local leagues to charge admission to games, but Brooks said that rule won't be invoked for regular season games here.

"Under Pony Baseball, the local league is given a lot more freedom to run its league, raise funds, and so forth," Brooks added.

He added, "We think the change will be to the kids' advantage because they'll be playing by real baseball rules."

Bronco League is for boys 11 and 12, while the Mustang League is for those 9 and 10. Separate all-star teams will be chosen from each age group.

"And if enough interest is shown we can start a Pinto League, which is tee-ball for 7- and 8-year-olds," Brooks said.

Organizational meeting for the new leagues will be at 7:30 Monday night in the city hall meeting room.

The interesting thing about this music is that many of the old, old melodies still hang around, albeit, in disguised form, in our contemporary "country and western" music that we hear on the radio.

Deficiency checks due any day now

Grain sorghum farmers will get deficiency checks this month for 48 cents per hundred pounds on their 1981 production. Commodity Credit Corp. is mailing checks totaling about \$232 million.

Texas sorghum producers will receive the largest share with \$71.5 million, while \$65.4 million will go to Kansas growers and \$44.8 million to Nebraska.

"USDA has informed us that the checks were mailed Saturday," reported Grain Sorghum Producers Association Executive Director Elbert Harp.

The payment is the difference between the national average loan rate and the sorghum target price. The 48-cent payment is the maximum amount permitted by law because the average price to farmers during the first five months of the marketing year was below the loan level. It is a result of a provision

written and sponsored by GSPA in the 1977 farm bill. This provision sets sorghum target prices in relation to corn according to the relative cost of production.

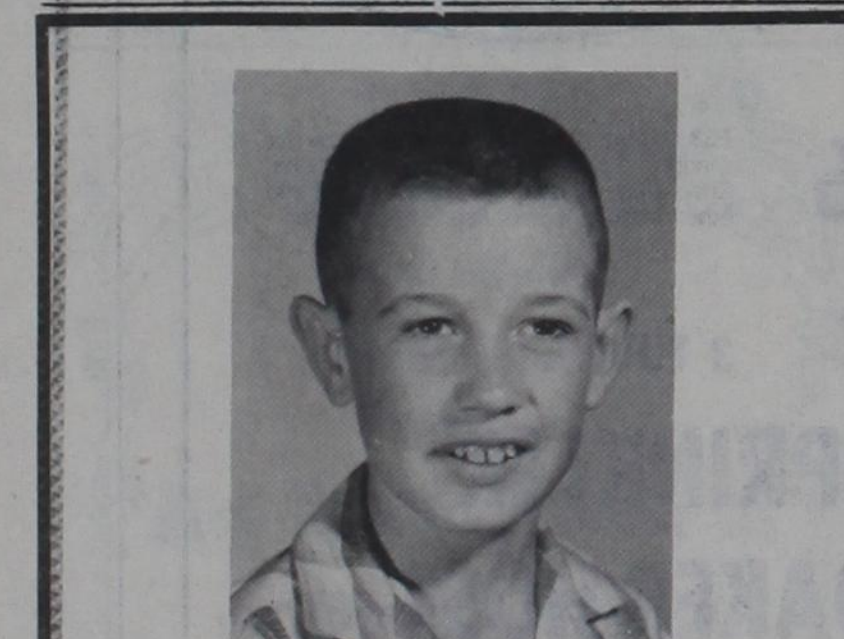

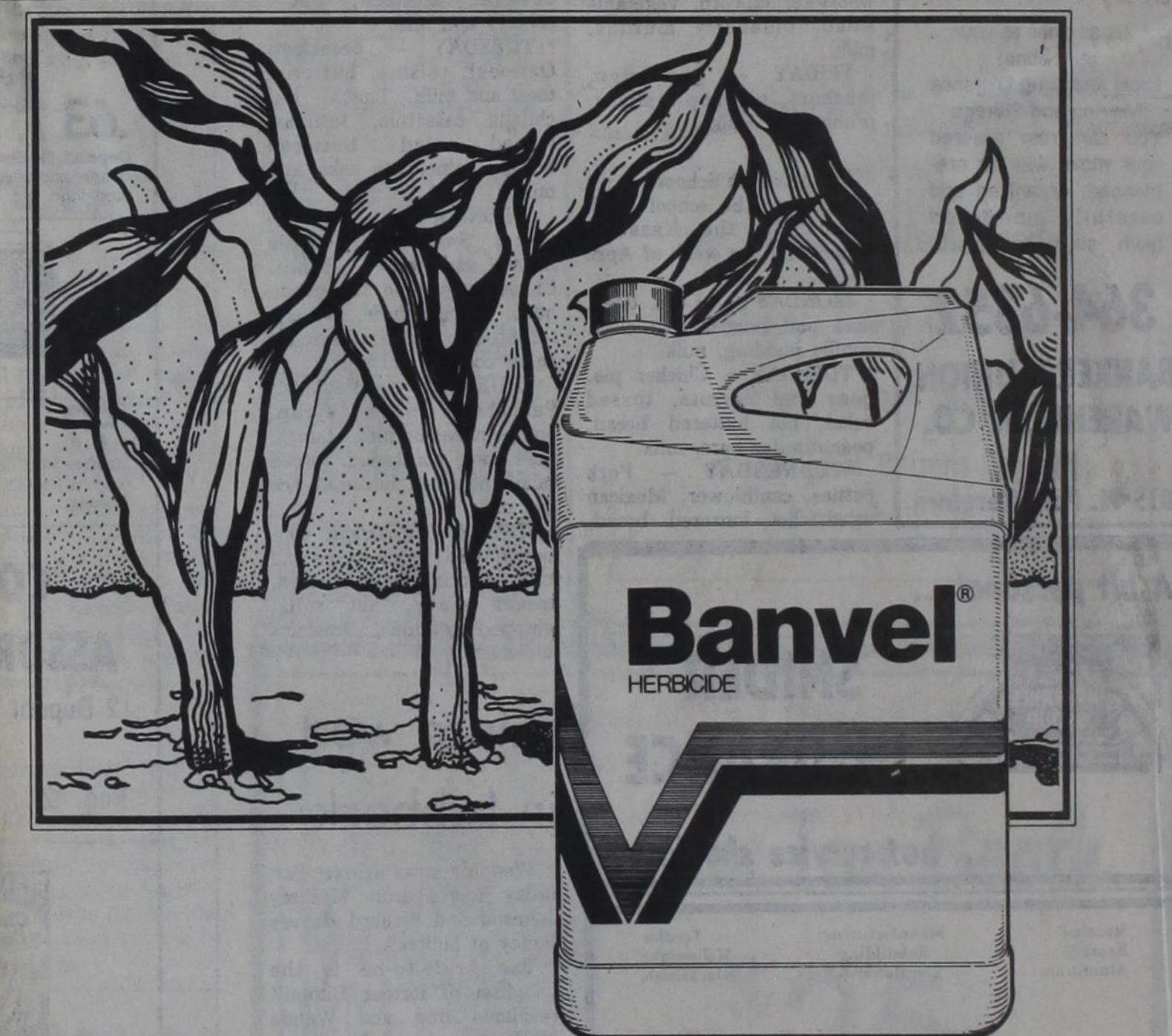

Miller's circus is coming to Dimmitt

In the spangled history of show business, only two persons ever have owned a circus for 46 years — John Ringling and D. R. Miller.

Ringling died in 1936, his circus empire decimated by the Depression. Miller brings his "Biggest Big Top on Earth" to Dimmitt on Sunday, April 25 at 2 and 4:30 p.m.

The circus will be sponsored by the Dimmitt Rotary Club. The site for the circus will be on the far north end of Northwest Fifth Street on the east side of the street behind Bruegel and Sons Elevator.

Miller's Carson & Barnes Five-Ring Circus has become the monarch of the tented world while he is a legend in his time.

It hasn't always been easy, though. He went through the hard times of the Depression, difficulties of war years, adversities of all types of weather and other hardships in building his property to the largest and most prestigious of his kind.

Miller began ownership with his father and brother, who are both dead now. He has worked in virtually every department of tented shows, including performances as a tightwire walker and an animal trainer.

He has spent his entire life in motion. He fulfills his love for the circus by daily giving of himself completely in presentation of the world's largest tented show.

In addition to his performance as a circus owner, he has gained world-wide reputation as an expert on elephants — as well he might since he owns more of the animals than any other individual, except perhaps a maharajah or two.

While Carson & Barnes carries the largest group of elephants exhibited by any show anywhere, not all of Miller's elephants are with the big show. He leases other to smaller circuses, animal trainers and zoos. The number carried by the huge five-ring circus varies as the elephants come and go, but usually there are more than 25 of them taking part in daily exhibitions.

A true lover of all types of animals, Miller built the equine department of Carson & Barnes into the largest in the United States. It carries

almost 100 horses and ponies.

Where is he today? Chances are 99 to 1 that he is on the lot of Carson & Barnes Circus. Rarely does he leave the show during the season. He takes an active role in the day-to-day operation, particularly the staggering logistics of moving and erecting the mammoth attraction.

When the season ends, he personally travels to various parts of the world, contacting and contracting the hundreds of performers and other personnel. He finds the rare and unusual animals that inhabit the menagerie and ensures their proper care in transit and in the show. He guides the publicity, advertising, and booking departments, the training of animals and the policies the show adopts as it deals with the numerous governmental agencies that regulate it as it travels.

With the help of his wife, daughter, son-in-law, two granddaughters and the Lord, Miller said he hopes to "stay with it" at least one more year, to set an all-time record for tenure as a circus owner.

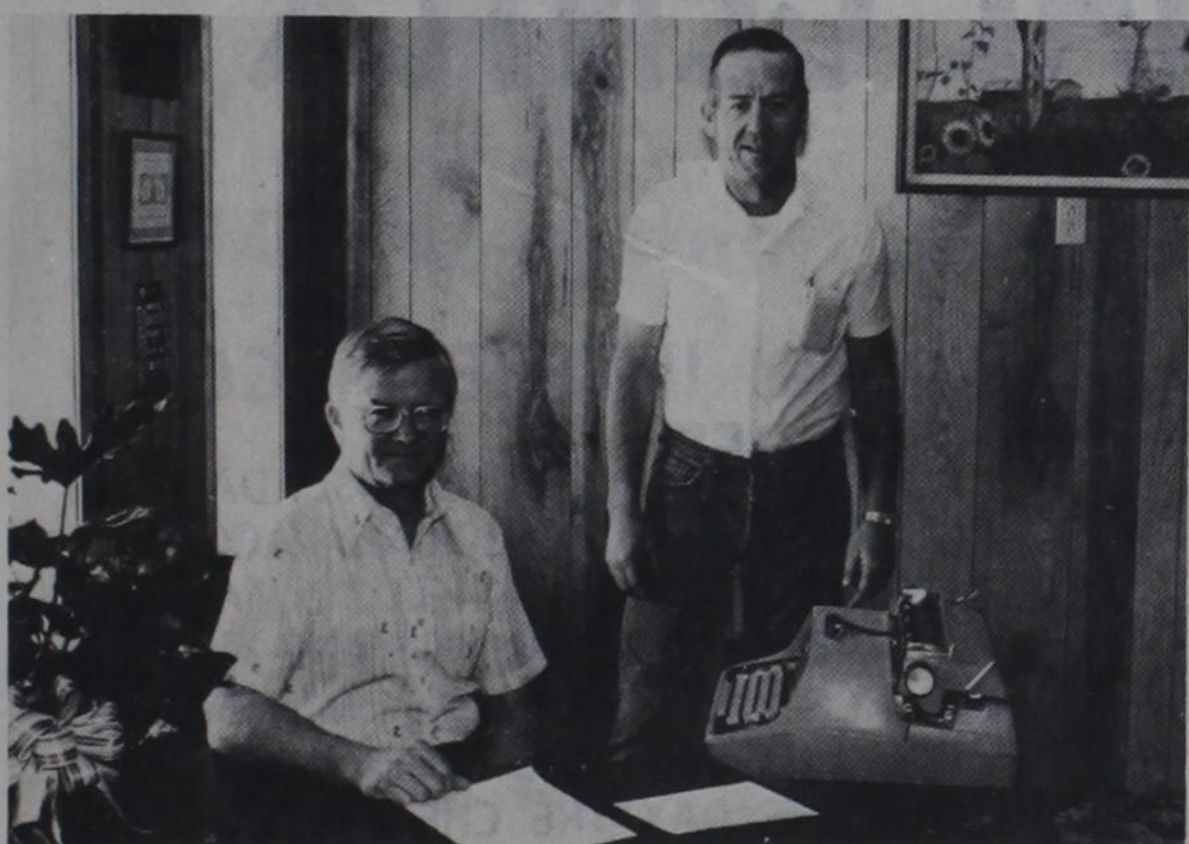

religious perspective Bingo and morality

It has been some time since this article has appeared in the Castro County News. When it first appeared in the News, there was little response to it. However, I feel like Mr. Kaderly recently expressed in his letter to the editor, that surely there must be some genuine concern in the community regarding issues that affect all of us, whether they be financial, religious, political or otherwise.

There was little response to the bingo issue in the recent election, even though only one precinct in Dimmitt was allowed to vote on the issue. It was admitted in the last issue of the News that there was considerable confusion and lack of proper notification of the public regarding the bingo election. To say the least, it is very questionable as to whether or not the election is legally valid due to lack of public notification about the bingo election.

In contrast, the newspapers of Canyon, Lubbock and Amarillo ran full page ads regarding the bingo question. Even on television, both pros and cons were presented on the issue. Commissioners review Expo Building no-no's

County Commissioners on Monday once again discussed the policies, rules and regulations concerning use of the County Expo Building and of the community room of the courthouse.

They gave authority to the County Judge Polly Simpson to determine whether an organization requesting use of facilities is charitable or profitable.

During the lengthy discussion, Mrs. Simpson read from the original regulations for usage of the Expo Building, dated Jan. 27, 1975. They stated that "there will be no use of the building for private gain, for illegal purposes or for doubtful purposes" where legality is questionable.

Regulations said that "nominal fees will be charged for each situation," and "there will be a \$100 deposit." There will be additional charges for the use of the kitchen facilities, they added.

Alcoholic beverages are banned from county premises, and anyone using the Expo Building is responsible for any damages, the regulations state.

The commissioners disagreed among themselves about how much to charge and who to charge for usage of the Expo Building and the community room, but they did agree that Mrs. Simpson should determine whether the groups want to use the facilities for non-profit or gainful purposes.

In other business, the county governing board: —Read a letter informing the Castro County Historical Society that the county's history book was selected as one of the best publications of 1981 in the narrative category by the Texas Historical Commission. Winners will be announced at a luncheon Saturday during the commission's annual Historic Preser-

vation Conference in Brenham. The history book of Castro County was among 30 volumes considered.

—Canvassed the votes and approved the tallies of the bingo legalization election in Justice of the Peace Precinct 4. The issue carried, 139-10.

—Approved Commissioner Jimmy Butler's motion to impose a 2% gross receipts tax on bingo games within the county.

—Elected three new members to the Child Welfare Board. They are Nancy Bowden, Precinct 1; Ina Cleavinger, Precinct 2; and Carolyn Bermea, Precinct 4.

—Sold a 1960 Chevrolet

tank truck to high bidder C. J. Wood for \$705, and approved Commissioner Ed Bennett's motion to donate the \$705 to the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept.

—Decided to send \$50 to the Happy Volunteer Fire Dept. as a thank-you for helping fight a fire in Castro County during January.

—Decided to send \$25 to the Sept. 29 dedication of Site No. 1 of the Lower Running Water Draw Water Shed.

—Went into executive session with County Attorney Jimmy Davis. No statement was given to the media after the session.

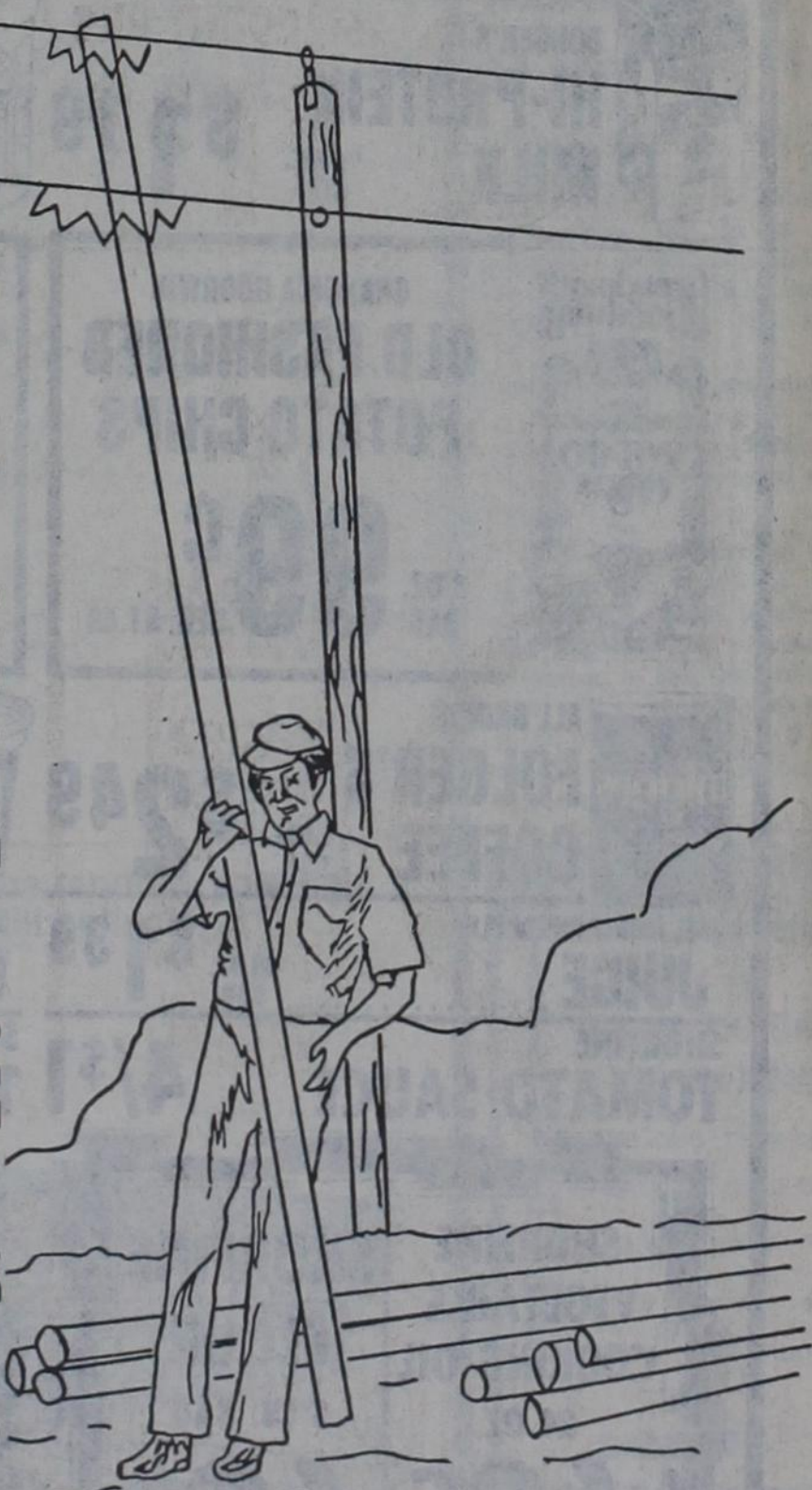

Also, the center will hold its monthly covered dish supper Tuesday at 6 p.m. The sunbonnet quilt will be given away at the supper.

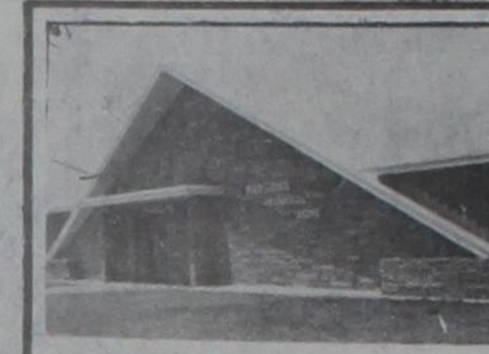
