

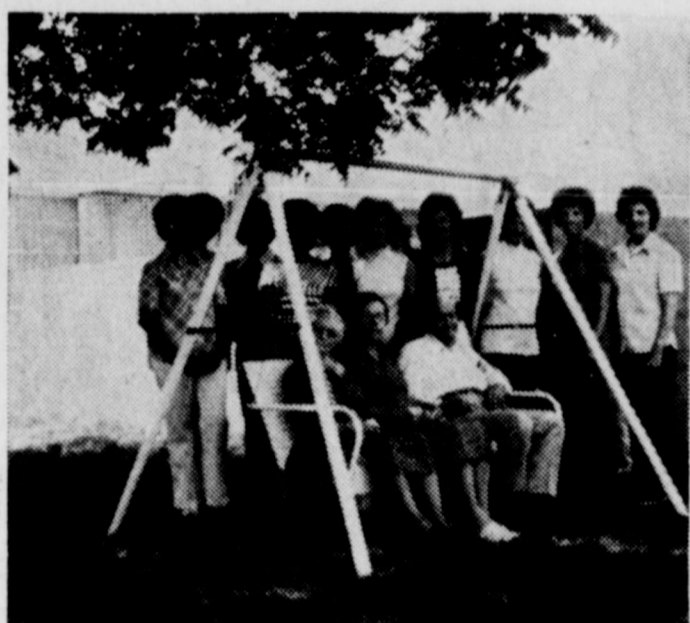

Auxiliary Water Line to Be Laid

A public meeting was held Monday night and the majority of those present voted for laying a temporary line from Lake Spence to Mountain Creek Lake.

Mayor S. E. "Skinny" Adams told the Observer Wednesday afternoon that he expected the pipe to be delivered Thursday (today) and for work to start at once. The mayor said he was hopeful the

temporary project could be completed within a week.

Mayor Adams presided at the meeting with about 80 persons attending. He told those present some of the problems of the City Council in providing adequate usable water for the city. He said the meeting was called so the council might learn the opinions of water subscribers and be advised as to the best solution.

The mayor said until the new line to Lake Spence is completed, or the city lake should catch more water, one of two alternatives could be chosen: to lay a temporary line to Spence or continue to depend on the limited supply of well water.

Water Supt. Sherman Williams said at best, the wells could supply only enough for household use and little could be done to improve the quality of the well water due to heavy salt and mineral content.

Concerning the temporary line, Mayor Adams said that a contract could be made by a San Angelo firm to furnish six inch line and pump installed on a monthly rental basis, to supply a minimum of 300 gallons per minute to the water plant. Cost of rental would be \$600 per mile for pipe and \$500 per pump per month, plus pumping costs, fuel or power. This could mean a monthly cost of \$3,000 to \$5,000. To cover this expense, a monthly surcharge of approximately \$4 to \$5 per meter might have to be made, Adams stated.

After a good discussion of the pros and cons, the general feeling seemed to favor a dependable supply of better water, despite the anticipated expense.

After the discussion, Adams called for a vote which showed most of the citizens present favored laying a temporary line.

Great Plains Water Co. of San Angelo and Odessa is already at work on the line.

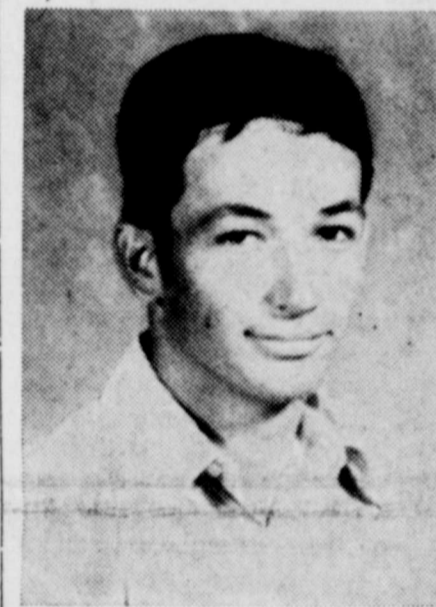
A spokesman for the church said everyone is invited to attend.
