

Many Robert Lee business will be closed Monday in observance of Memorial Day. The Courthouse, City Hill, Post Office and Robert Lee State Bank will be closed.



To Our Many Friends in Coke County:

- 1. We want to congratulate all you Coke County friends who voted against Glenn (High Tax) Toombs.
- 2. Glenn Toombs raised taxes in some manner every year he was County Judge of Borden County, Texas.
- 3. Glenn Toombs almost caused Borden County to be sued by the oil companies two years ago because of HIS TAX POLICIES.
