

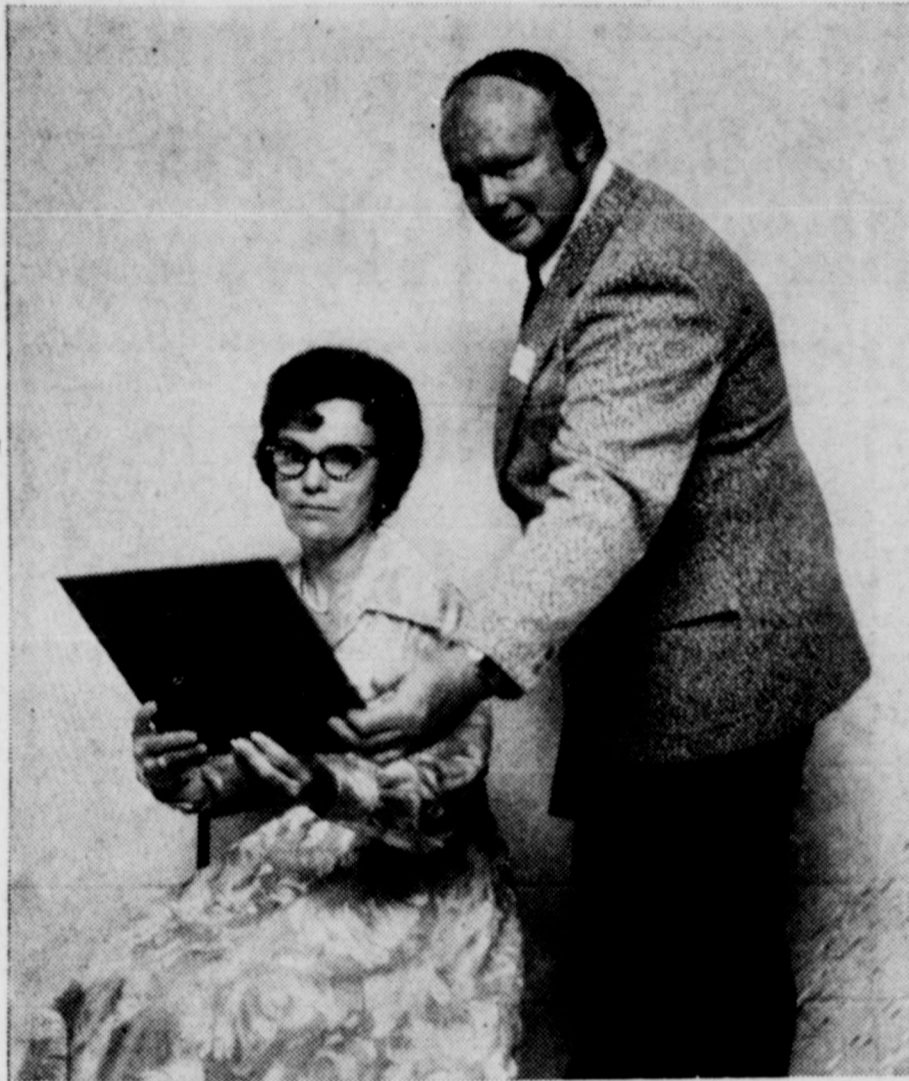

Area Receives Nice Shower Saturday; Not Enough to Ease Water Shortage

Robert Lee received some rain Saturday night and high winds did damage to shed buildings and broke tree limbs over town. The rain was not heavy enough to help Robert Lee's water shortage.

Work has been underway the first of this week laying the temporary line from Little Spence to Mountain Creek Lake. City officials said Wednesday morning that unless problems developed the line should be complete by Wednesday night and delivering water to Mountain Creek Lake.

Trouble developed at the city well over the weekend and water had to be taken from the city lake. The lake supply, however, is not sufficient to last more than a few days.

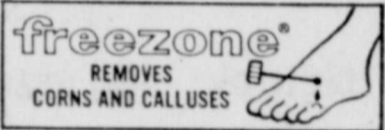

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Our Newsletter

Our military posture was given a boost when the House last week approved our annual military procurement bill. The measure covers all military hardware, like tanks, planes, guns, ships, research and development, and a multitude of related items. Total costs for the next fiscal year runs about \$22.5 billion.

As happens each year when this annual authorization bill is debated, a number of amendments to cut back and weaken its provisions were offered by critics of the military. But each amendment was soundly defeated this year.

This procurement bill now goes to the Senate where a somewhat similar measure will be approved. Differences between the two versions will then be compromised and resolved by a conference committee.

By a majority of 52 to 31 the Senate last week defeated a crucial amendment to a food stamp extension bill. The amendment would have denied food stamps to people on strike.

The argument for this amendment contended that it is unfair for the government to take sides in a labor dispute. For the government to show any sign of favoritism to either side is normally frowned upon.

The Food Stamp program, which began in 1964 at an annual cost of \$200 million is now costing around \$2 1/2 billion a year, and is being expanded under terms of the Senate bill. It is gradually becoming one of the nation's most expensive single super welfare programs.

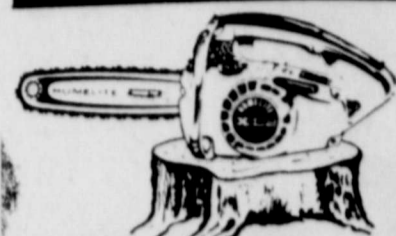
The Senate bill will soon be con-

sidered in the House, where a show down vote will probably be taken on the issue of allowing those who choose to stop work and strike, to be favored with food stamps.

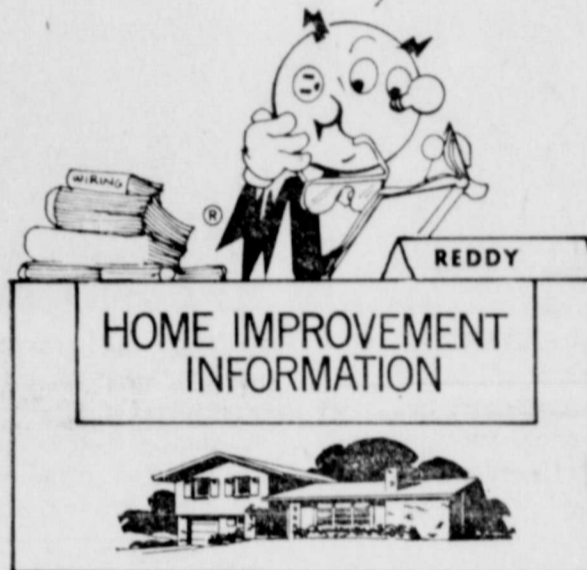

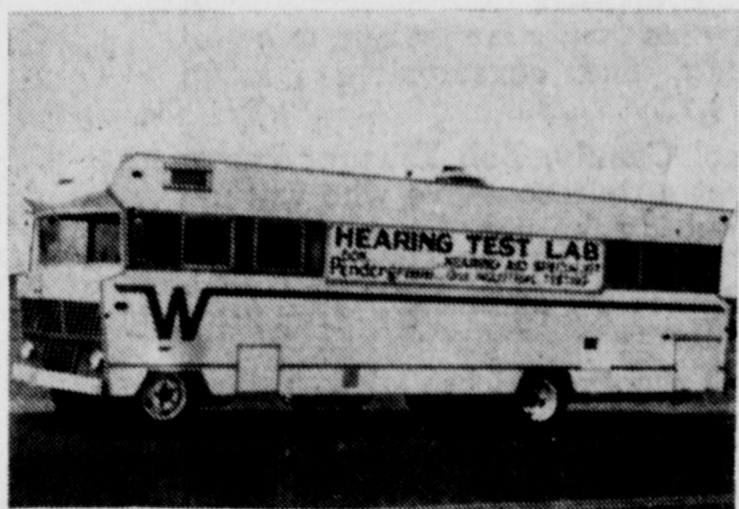
The ceremony was performed in the First Baptist Church of Lansing with the Rev. William Underwood officiating.

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Students Tour Historic Points of Coke

Nineteen students who finished fifth grade at Robert Lee School recently enjoyed a bus tour of historical points of interest. They were accompanied by their teacher, Mrs. D. P. Walling, as sponsor and hostess; their principal, Clifford Wilson, who served as bus driver; and the chairman of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, who served as commentator.

Points visited included the deserted townsite of Hayrick, first Coke County seat; the ghost town of Fort Chadbourne on the railroad; the ruins of old Fort Chadbourne, established Oct. 28, 1852; the ruins of the Butterfield Mail

Station, established by law in 1857; and the old Fort Chadbourne Cemetery. They toured the cemetery on foot.

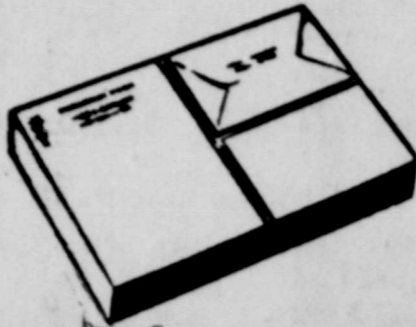
During the stop at the historical marker at the edge of the cemetery, Mrs. Walling served homemade candy and cold drinks to the group.

A planned walk to the Indian Rock Shelter near the cemetery was abandoned for the time being because of danger from rattlesnakes; however, the group plans to visit the shelter sometime next winter while the snakes are hibernating.

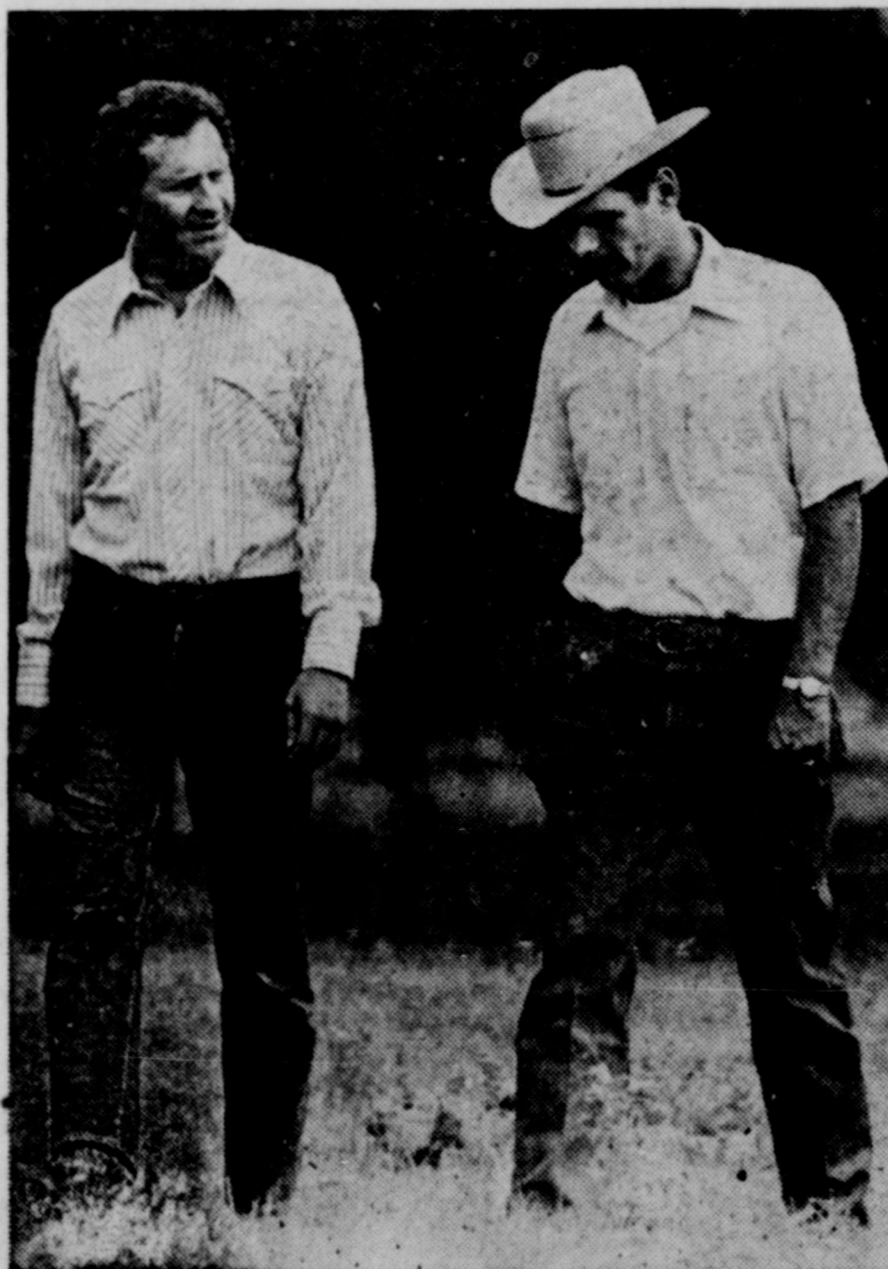

Tornado Season Is Here

Tornado season has arrived in Texas, and certain precautions can save lives.

Tornadoes are violent wind storms that usually grow out of threatening clouds. In Texas, the peak tornado season is during the months of April, May and June, but tornadoes may occur anytime.

Although tornadoes may occur at any hour of the day or night, they are most frequent during the warmer hours of the day.

When the possibility of a tornado exists, the National Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City, Mo., sends out a tornado watch to the threatened area. The message is teletyped to radio, television and National Weather Service stations in the area.

A "tornado watch" alerts people to the possibility of a tornado. When a watch is announced for our area, there is no need to interrupt normal activities except to listen for weather advisories and watch for threatening weather. Be sure a battery powered radio is available in case power is lost.

A tornado watch identifies a specific time and area, but everyone in the general area should be alert for threatening conditions.

When a tornado has actually

been sighted or (detected by radar, a "tornado warning" is issued. The warning tells where and when a tornado was sighted, the direction it is likely to move, and the time it is expected to move through the warned area.

If a tornado warning is issued for your area move immediately to a cellar, basement or civil defense shelter. If you are in a home or other building with no basement, go to the lowest level in the center of the house or other building. Take shelter in a small room or closet or under heavy furniture.

Here is a list of other safety precautions:

At home, open a few windows to allow for sudden air pressure changes. Then find shelter.

Stay away from windows and buildings with wide, free span roofs.

In open country, escape by moving at a right angle to the tornado's path.

If there is no time to escape, lie flat in a ditch or ravine but do not stay in your car.

Get far enough away from a trailer or mobile home to avoid injury if it is overturned.

When you observe a tornado, report it promptly to the nearest law officer or National Weather Service Office. Otherwise, do not make calls so that lines can be kept open for emergency information.

After a tornado, always wear shoes and gloves in cleanup operations and damage inspections. Watch for hazards like broken or downed electrical wires and broken gas pipes. When entering a storm damaged building, watch

for ceilings and walls that may be ready to fall.

Never light a match, smoke or carry open flames into a building until you are sure there are no gas leaks.

Do not sight see in disaster areas. Your presence will only hamper rescue and cleanup operations.

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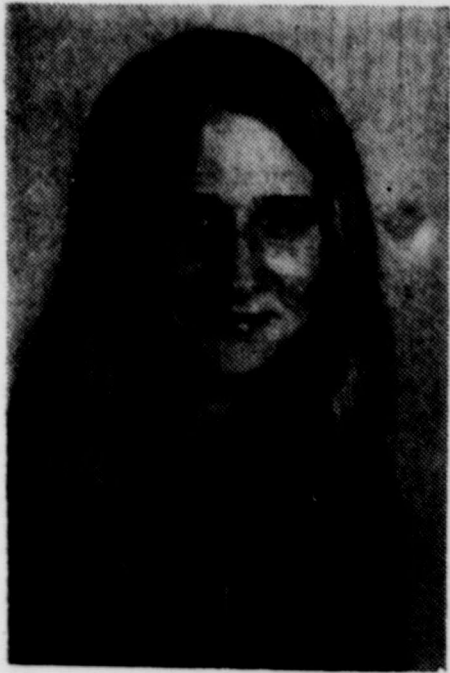

FmHA Offers Low Interest Financing For Home Improvement in Rural Areas

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has initiated a program to further encourage the use of existing housing and provide better homes for low income rural families through low interest home improvement loans.

The agency can now provide "interest credits" to reduce the effective interest rate on loans made to rehabilitate or repair a dwelling that a borrower already owns, and either lives in or will live in since it is brought up to standard.

Loans of up to \$7,000 will be made for repairs that will improve and modernize substandard dwellings, so as to provide adequate homes in rural areas. Terms for repayment of the loan may be as long as 25 years.

To be eligible for a FmHA home improvement loan with interest credit, the housing must be located in rural countryside or a rural town of not more than 10,000 people. The loans are designed especially for low income families.

Under this program, interest credits can reduce the effective interest rate paid by a borrower to 1 per cent if the adjusted fami-

ly income is less than \$3,000. If the adjusted family income is more than \$3,000 but less than \$5,000, the interest rate will be 2 per cent. If the adjusted family income is between \$5,000 and \$7,000, interest will be 3 per cent.

The policy of making interest credit and repair and rehabilitation loans is another method of utilizing the existing supply of housing to improve living conditions for low income rural people.

Farmers Home Administration is the Department of Agriculture's rural credit agency for family-farm agriculture, town and country housing, community facilities and business enterprise supportive of rural community development. Loans are made through 1,785 county offices throughout the country. Local persons interested in a loan of this type should contact Alton R. Pyburn, county supervisor for Coke and Nolan Counties, Box 406, Sweetwater.

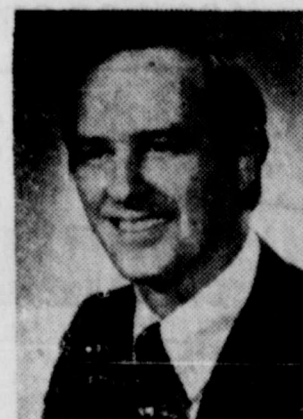
