





Tornado Season Is Here Tornado season has arrived in Textas, and certain precautions can save lives.

Tornadoes are violent wind storms that usually grow out of threatening clouds. In Texas, the peak tornado season is during the months of April, May and June, but tornadoes may occur anytime.

Although terniadoes may occur alt any hour of the day or night, they are most frequent during the warmer hours of the day.

When the possibility of a tornado exists, the National Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City. Mo., sends out a tonniado watch to the threatened area. The message is teletyped to radio, television and Nattional Weather Service stattions in the area.

A "tornialdo waitch" allerts people to the possibility of a tornado. When a watch is announced for cur larea, there is no need to interrupt normal activities except to llisten for weather advisories and watch for threatening weather. Be injury if it is overturned. sure a battery powered radio is available in case power is lost.

A tornado waitch identifies a specific time and area, but everyone in the general area should be make calls so that lines can be plert for threatening conditions.

The warning tells where and when a tornado was sighted, the direction it is likely to move, and the time it is expected to move gas leaks. through the warned area.

If a tornado warning is issuel! for your airea move immediately to a cellar, besement or civil defense shelter. If you are in a home or other building with no basement, go to the lowest level in the center of the house or other buillding. Take shelter in a small room or closet or unite: heavy furniture.

Here is a list of other safety precautions:

At home, open a few windows to flow for sudden air pressure changes. Then find shellter.

Stay away from windows art buildings with wide, free span

In open country, escape by moving at a right angle to the tornado's patth.

If there is no time to escape, lie flit in a ditch or ravine but do not stay in your car.

Get fair enough away from a trailler or mobile home to avoid

When you observe a tormado, report it promptly to the nearest llaw officer or National Weather Service Office. Otherwise, do not kept open for emergency informa-

After a tornado, always wear shoes and gloves in cleanup opcrations and damage inspections. Watch for hazards like broken or Flowned electrical wires and broken gas pipes. When entering a storm damaged building, watch

Never light a match, smoke or carry open flames into a building unitial you are sure there are no


