L. Sockwell Listed In HS Who's Who

Lyn Sockwell, a senior at Robert Lee High School, was recently notified that he is to be featured in the Eighth Annual Edition of Who's Who Among American High School Students, 1973-74, the largest student award publication in the nation.

Students from over 20,000 public, private and parochial high schools throughout the country are recognized for their leadership in academics, athletics, activities or community service in the books. Less than three per cent of the junior and senior class students nationwide are awarded this recognition.

Lyn is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis L. Sockwell of Robert Lee. He is active in football, basketball, and track and is president of the Steer Band. He has been listed on the all-district first offensive and defensive teams, and the all-area defensive team. He was named as an all-West Texas running back. He is also an Eagle Scout.

In addition to having his biography in Who's Who, Lyn is also listed in the Robert Lee Observer.

Board Approves \$491,179 Budget

In a called meeting July 25, the Robert Lee School board of trustees approved the 1974-75 budget in the amount of \$491,179.

The tax rate will remain at \$1.50 per \$100 valuation.

Fortunately, oil values in the school district increased more than \$3 million over last year. The increase in value defrayed the run away inflationary costs in education and allowed the school district to maintain its present program without increasing the tax rate or property valuations.

Quarterback Club Sets First Meeting

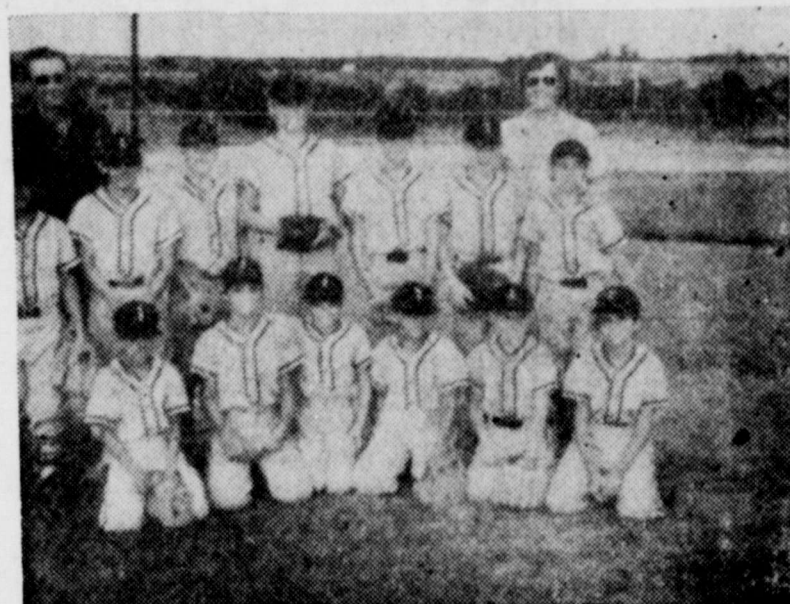
The Quarterback Club has set its first meeting of the year for Monday, Aug. 5, at 8 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

FISHING REPORT from Lake Spence

Trotliners at Lake Spence have been taking some large yellow catfish and some heavy stripers lately. Top line users are going to deep water regions of the Coke County lake and the majority are baiting with large minnows.

Stripers have also been caught by lure casters. The largest last week was a 12 pounder taken by a bass fisherman who was cast-

ing a top water bait at the time the big striper hit.

Black bass fishing has been good at Spence also. Blacks are deep and the better catches have been at the hands of fishermen using plastic worms.

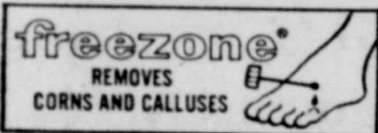

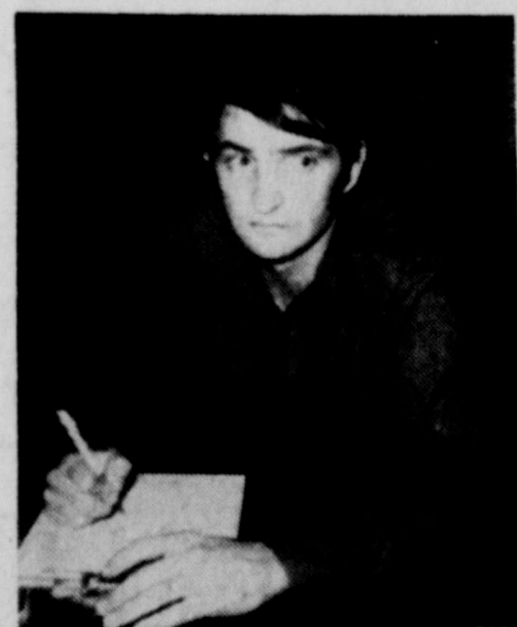

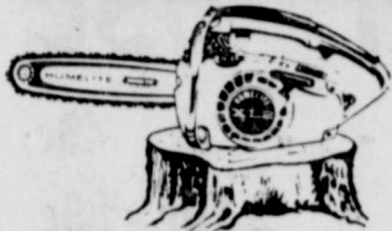
