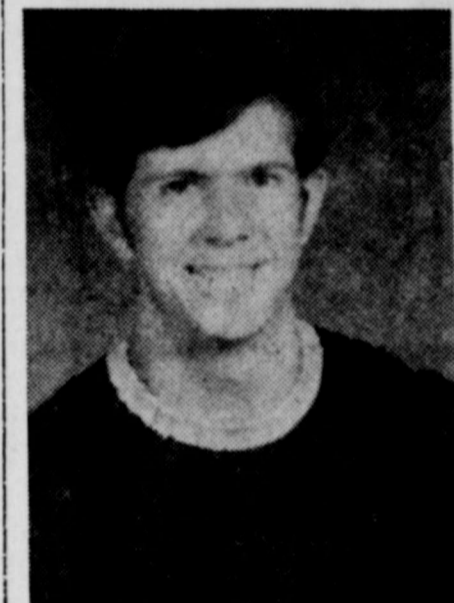

## Mr. and Mrs. Bird To Give Building

Elsewhere in this issue appears a paid announcement stating that Mr. and Mrs. Ulmer Bird intend to deed or to bequeath the Sanco Store property to a non-profit organization for the purpose of perpetually maintaining a museum, reading room, and arts-crafts cooperative center.

In making the announcement, Mr. Bird said, "This is something we have had in mind since the closing of the store and the post office. The building and fixtures are within themselves something of a museum."

"The great increase of vacationers and tourists coming to western Coke County in the Lake Spence area makes it feasible to believe this can be made in considerable part self-sustaining."

"This does not have any connection whatsoever with the Sanco Memorial Fund, but will be a separate project. We cannot yet outline a detailed plan, although we do have one in mind," he said.

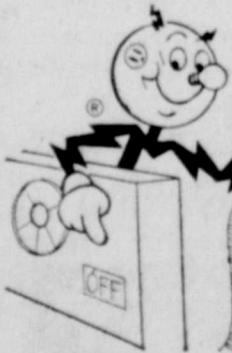

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**Our Newsletter**

(Editor's note: We are running Rep. O. C. Fisher's column this week because it does present a view from the other side of the events which have taken place in Washington the past week. Perhaps it's a good thing Mr. Fisher is retiring. Apparently, he's listening to a different drummer than the one to which his Coke County constituents are listening.)

The historic transfer of the presidency from Nixon to Ford was disarmingly quiet and orderly.

I was among a select group of the President's friends who were invited to the White House for a half-hour meeting with Mr. Nixon shortly before his TV appearance. Other Texans included were Omar Burlinson, Olin Teague, George Mahon and John Tower.

It was an emotion packed occasion. The President expressed his everlasting gratitude for the understanding and loyalty that the group had accorded him. Choking up at times, he emphasized that although his family was unanimous in the desire that he fight to the end, he felt that the nation came first and a Senate trial would consume most of his time and that of Congress for a trial which would likely consume six

months or more. The country, he said, could ill afford a half time President and a half time Congress during a very critical period in our history.

Although loyalty to some of his aides during the Watergate melee got him involved in some aspects of the scandal, his culpability was incidental and, at best, allegations of wrongdoing were nebulous and circumstantial. He had a weakness for trusting some people who proved to be untrustworthy.

On the plus side, Mr. Nixon's decisions won the war in Vietnam, obtained release of POWs, and brought a half million American troops home. He performed brilliantly in the Mid-East war to halt fighting and establish the base for a lasting peace in that war-torn area. His initiatives for world peace exceeded those of any other American President since World War II.

On the domestic front, he changed the complexion of the Supreme Court by appointing four judicial minded men to fill vacancies. This must be recognized as one of his major achievements. A true patriot, President Nixon was profoundly devoted to our country, its preservation and its destiny.

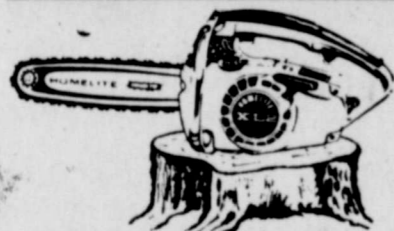

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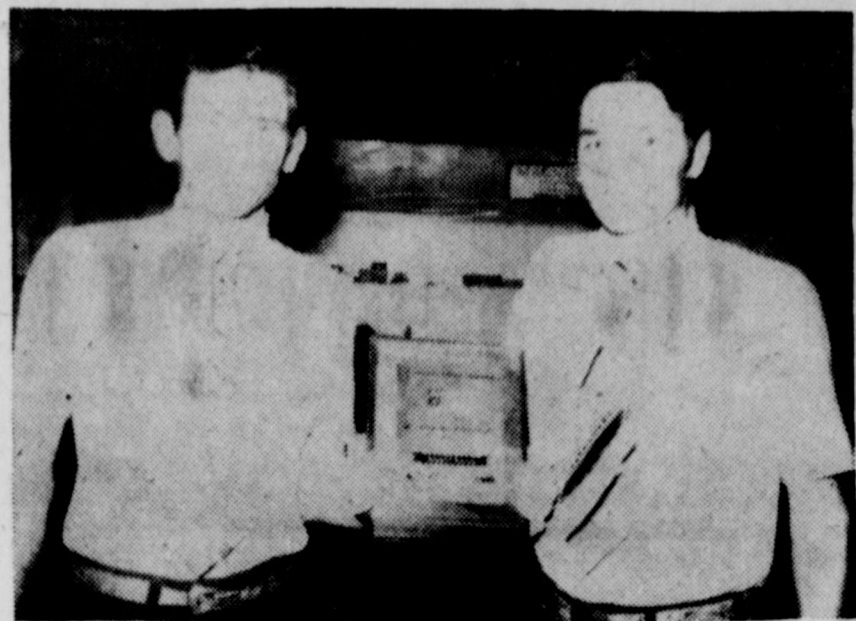

**Clean Pot Makes Better Coffee**  
If your coffee pot makes bitter tasting coffee, it may not be caused by the brand of coffee you're using.

An oily residue from previous brews builds up inside the coffee pot causing the bitter taste.

To prevent this buildup, wash the coffee pot with detergent after each use. Rinse and dry it well.

Use a long, narrow brush to scrub the spout and basket stem.

An occasional special cleaning also helps keep the appliance from making bitter coffee.

If it is lined with aluminum, fill the pot with a solution of one tablespoon of cream of tartar for each six cups of water. Again, perk for a short period of time.

Another method of cleaning is to use a commercial coffee maker cleaner. Follow the directions carefully and be sure to rinse the pot well after any cleaning method you use.

Oil activity in Coke County has continued good the past week. A completion has been recorded in Pearson-Sibert Oil Co. of Texas, of Midland No. 1-PS Millican Reef Unit in the Millican (Strawn Reef) Field 12 miles west of Robert Lee.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of Section 158, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Absolute, open flow was 2,200,000 cu. feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 5,575 to 5,961 feet. The pay was treated with 5,000 gallons of acid. Total depth was 6,240 feet, plugged back to 6,038 feet.

Another gas well, a plug back, is Exxon Corp. No. 67-F Sallie Odom, Account 2. Location is four miles south of Blackwell in the Fort Chadbourne, West (Gardner, South) Field.

It spots 3,641 feet from the southeast and 2,650 feet from the southwest lines of Seth Clark Survey 475.

Absolute, open flow was 506,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 5,306-324 feet treated with 1,500 gallons of acid.

### Wildcat Staked

Staughan Oil Interests, Fort Worth, will drill a 3,700 foot Cisco wildcat eight miles southwest of Bronte. No. 1 Hickman Estate is ½ mile north of the depleted one well Wendkirk North Field and ½ mile northwest of the Elm's No. 1 J. R. Smith, 3,772 foot failure.

Location is 1,230 feet from the north and 8,800 feet from the east lines of William A. Bates No. 1, Abst. 1731.

Mann Rankin of Midland will re-enter and clean out to 6,868 feet for recompletion attempt of a well that was depleted in 1949. It is the No. 2 Lassiter, located in the depleted San Benito (Strawn) Field, 12 miles north-northwest of Robert Lee.

Rankin opened the Arledge field March 8 with completion of No. 1 Cargile, finished for 227 barrels of 45 gravity oil with a gas-oil ratio of 1,935-1. Production is through perforations at 5,198-200 feet.
