



Clean Pot Makes Better Coffee If your coffeepot makes bitter trating collee, it may not be caused upcoming energy problems, a ed by the brand of coffee you're using.

An oily residue from previous brews builds up inside the coffeepot causing the bitter taste.

To prevent this buildup, wash the coffeepot with detergent after etch use. Rinse and dry it well. Use a long, narrow brush to scaub the spout and basket stem.






