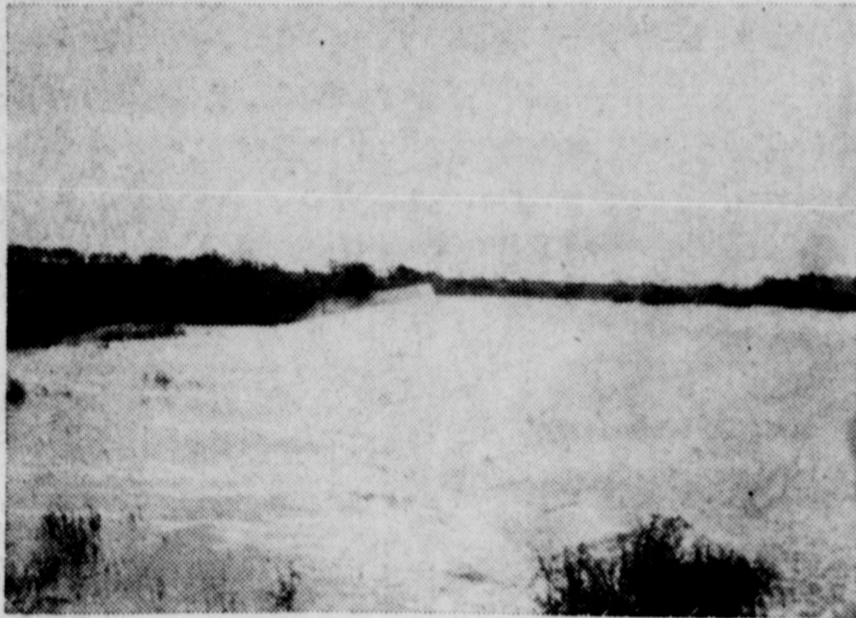

Former Silver Men Have Sad Meeting

Two young men who attended school together at Silver had a sad meeting last Wednesday when the vehicles they were driving were in collision near Andrews. One of them was killed and the other is in serious condition.

Anthony (Tony) Kennard, 23, of Mission was apparently killed instantly in the accident which happened about 11:30 a.m.

Driver of the other vehicle was Russell (Rusty) Jameson of Odessa. He is in Permian General Hospital at Andrews with chest, back and pelvic injuries, plus multiple contusions and lacerations.

According to Dept. of Public Safety Officer Buff Engel, who investigated the accident, Kennard was driving north on Highway 115 when he was in collision with a wireline service truck southeast bound on Highway 181. Kennard was trapped inside his car which was nearly severed in two. He apparently died instantly. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Andrews Justice of the Peace Bob Matthews.

Jameson was thrown some 30 feet clear of the spot of the accident. His truck overturned and landed on its left side, according to Engel and two eyewitnesses.

Jameson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ramey Jameson of Andrews. His wife is the former Nancy Bag-

well of Robert Lee. He is a grandson of Mrs. Homer Jameson of Silver.

Funeral services for Kennard were held in Mission Church of Christ at 3 p.m. Friday, Sept. 13. Wilson Funeral Home was in charge. The family requested that those wishing to send memorials, send them to Sunny Glen Children's Home at San Benito.

Kennard is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Drew Kennard, of Mission. His father is McAllen District Production Superintendent for Sun Oil Co. He was plant engineer at Sun Gas Plant at Silver before going to Mission several years ago. Tony attended Silver School when they lived in Coke County. He had recently graduated with honors from the University of Texas in mechanical engineering.

Fine rains have fallen over Coke County this week with total amounts of 4 to 10 inches reported over this area. Mountain Creek Lake gained enough runoff to fill up and run over the spillway by early Wednesday morning. The much needed mois-

ture continued to fall until about noon Wednesday.

The rain started Saturday with mist and light showers and continued through Sunday. By Monday morning heavy rain was falling and at the end of the day Robert Lee had gauged 3 to 3½ inch-

es. Light rain fell intermittently through Tuesday with the two day total reaching 4 inches. Steady rains fell Tuesday night and Wednesday morning, adding another 4 to 5 inches and bringing the three day total to between 8 and 9 inches at Robert Lee (the measurement varied over town).

At press time Wednesday, a mist was falling, off and on, and with the heavy clouds still present, it looked as if the weatherman's prediction of more showers in this area would be right.

All the Creeks of the area were reported to be up big. Water was running over the spillway at Mountain Creek Lake, and the creek was running bank full down by the golf course. Parts of the golf course were under water.

CRMWD personnel at Lake Spence reported no increase in the level of the big lake, but it is expected to come up some from the creeks in the area nearby that run into it. However, no big gains are expected, since the rains around Colorado City and other parts of the Spence watershed have been lighter than in Coke County.

Two Screwworm Cases Reported

Coke County recorded two cases of screwworms during the past two weeks as the numbers over the state continue to mount.

Gerald Sandusky reported the first case about 10 days ago. The case was taken from his place northwest of Bronte.

Last week, Bryan Gartman found screwworms in a baby calf on his place northwest of Sanco.

Both areas were treated with sterile flies brought in by a representative of the Texas Animal Health Commission. The flies were flown to San Angelo, then carried to the operators with worm cases in this area. The two infested areas were to receive a follow up application of sterile flies to be dropped by plane the following week.

Dogies Downed By Menard Lads

The Dogies were defeated last Thursday night by the Menard Junior Jackets by a score of 30 to 0. The game was played at Menard.

The Jackets scored their first TD when they intercepted a Dogie pass and scored again in the first quarter on a pass play. They scored a third touchdown in the second quarter, making the score 18-0 at halftime.

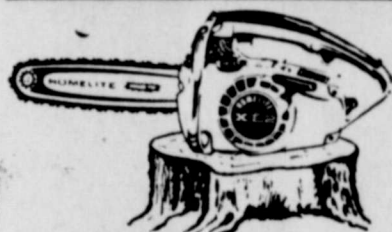

Robert Lee BCD Items of Interest

The Robert Lee BCD had a full session of discussions when 17 met for their third Tuesday meeting at the HiWay Cafe Tuesday afternoon. President S. E. Adams presided over the meeting.

Cumbie Ivey Jr. reported on his recent trip to Yukon Territory in northwestern Canada. He reported the country is pretty and fishing and hunting were good.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley announced the Steers will play Roscoe Friday night.

Oct. 18, 19 and 20 were announced as new dates for the Coke County Fair. It was brought out that the fair is in dire need of support from Coke County business firms. All businesses in the county are urged to reserve space and set up exhibit booths.

New projects for the BCD to work on were discussed. Among these is improving the tennis courts at the County Park. President Adams appointed Bill Allen, Roy Epperson and Cumbie Ivey Jr. as a committee to work on this project.

A committee, appointed at an earlier meeting, is working on a project of getting street markers erected on unmarked streets and replacing markers which have been hit by vandals.

Electric Meters Increase

W. D. McAdams of West Texas Utilities Co. reported an increase in customers in the Robert Lee area. At the end of August there were 718 meters served by the Robert Lee office, an increase of 62 over a year ago.

Further growth of the city is anticipated when the new Texas Highway Dept. building is completed. Some 20 new families are expected to move here.

Reports indicate housing is scarce all over Coke County at this time.

Good progress is being made on the new pipeline from Lake Spence to the city water treatment plant. Residents of Robert Lee were cautioned not to drive where ditches have been dug for the new line. Recent rains have washed out and numerous cars have had to be pulled out. A warning was also given about bad places in streets where the temporary line was laid earlier in the summer. The places have also washed and can cause damage to automobiles.

Mayor Adams reported that the city lake has caught 5 1/2 feet of water from recent rains.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough announced the dedication of a historical marker in San Angelo on Oct. 19. The 12 counties, including Coke, which were cut out of Tom Green County will be recognized.

Mrs. Yarbrough also announced that the Coke County Historical Survey Committee would recognize the birthday of the Bronte Post Office Thursday.

It was reported that the Commissioners Court accepted the new Bronte Recreation Center at a meeting Monday. The new Recreation Show Center in Robert Lee is expected to be accepted in a few days, as soon as some repairs and adjustments are completed.

and returned it to the Steer 23. The Steers made a 1st at their 36 and then they fumble and Bronte recovers.

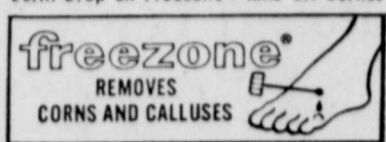

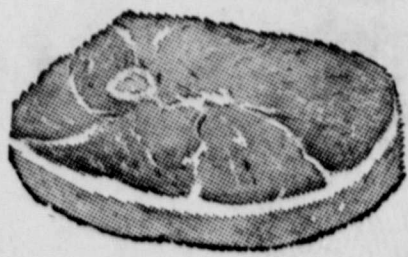
