### Austin Disappears In Flood Waters

Coke Austin, 48, of San Angelo and a native of Sanco, reportedly was swept away into flood waters in Dry Creek Park near San Angelo last Wednesday. Chief Deputy Ernest Haynes of the Tom Green County Sheriff's Office told the Observer at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday they had not been able to locate the body.

He said boats were going up and down the North Concho River as often as they could and an airplane supplied by Alvin Miller Crop Dusting Services had flown along the surface of the river, but to no avail.

Haynes said they are waiting for the waters to clear and that the water which is running six to eight inches deep, should be run down by Thursday morning if no more rain falls. He said the river banks were too muddy and grown up in high grass for searchers to walk the river banks.

It was reported that Austin and another man were at Dry Creek Park when the rise came. Austin reportedly waded out into the rising waters when he stepped into a hole and the rushing water and debris carried him away. He was not seen from the time he went under the churning waters.

Austin, the son of Mrs. Coke Austin of San Angelo, was born Dec. 23, 1925, at Robert Lee. He lived most of his life between Sanco and Robert Lee.

Wednesday's predicted high in the upper 60s had not been reached by 2 p.m. when the mercury was still in the 50s. No rain had fallen Wednesday by press time and the sun came out for a while in the afternoon.

Lake Spence's elevation Monday morning was reported at 1859.86 feet above sea level, which was 5.9 feet above the 1853.96 feet of Sunday a week ago. This is only 2.14 feet away from the high of 1862.00 reached in April 1973.

Frank Bates of CRMWD said the Colorado River was running at five feet Wednesday morning at Silver. Beal Creek, south and east of Big Spring, was up 12 feet which will run into Lake Spence. Bates said the runoff could possibly raise the level of Lake Spence to a record high.

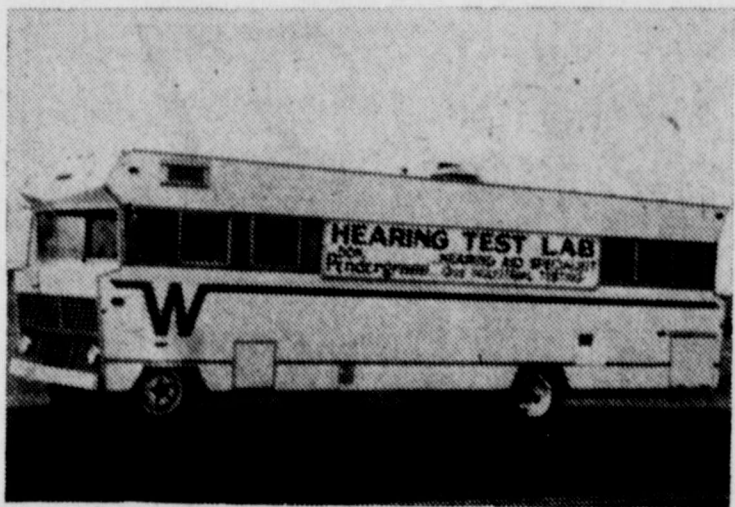

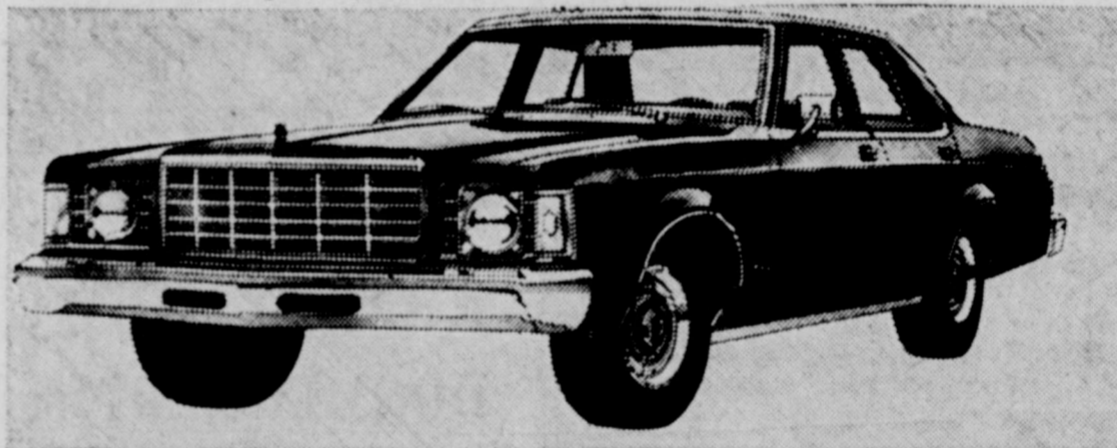

Defense is a word used often in the Steer vocabulary this year, as it seems they are playing 75 percent of the ball games. The Steer offense just can't seem to push it across when they start any kind of drive. On the other hand, the defense seems to know what it's doing nearly all time. That's the way things looked last Friday night when the Steers went to Roscoe and were downed 6-0. There are lots of if's this year, and so, if!

## First Quarter

The Steers received the opening kickoff at their 13 with only a 3 yard return. They made a quick 1st down on two plays to their 38, but Roscoe held at that point and Sockwell punted to the Roscoe 25. The Plowboys returned the punt for a TD, but a clipping penalty brought it back to the Plowboy 26.

They made a few yards in two plays, and on 3rd down, Craig

Bessent threw the Plowboys for a loss. Roscoe punted to the Steer 40 with a return to their own 46. Then Roscoe intercepted a pass at their own 21. They made a 1st at their 44, then another at the RL 39. The Steer defense held and Roscoe punted to the Steer 19 with no return. Roscoe then intercepted another pass at the Steer 49. The Steers made a 1st on their 40, then Roscoe held and Williams punted to the Roscoe 26. The Steers held at that point and Roscoe punted to the Steer 30. The Steers made a 1st down at the 50 yard line, then Roscoe held

on three pass attempts and Williams punted to the Roscoe 21. The Plowboys made a 1st at the 41 and he Steers held them at the 46. They got off a punt just as the half ended.

## Third Quarter

Roscoe received the second half kickoff at the 19 with a return to their own 44. The Steers held at the 49 and Roscoe punted to the Steer 31. The Steers made a 1st at their 43 and then Roscoe held. Roscoe ran one play and fumbled it back to the Steers with Shell Williams recovering at the 38. The Steers returned the ball to Roscoe with another fumble at the 37. Roscoe made a 1st at the Steer 47. The Steers held on downs, then the Plowboys held on downs at the Steer 33. They made a 1st on the Steer 15, and one play later the game ended.

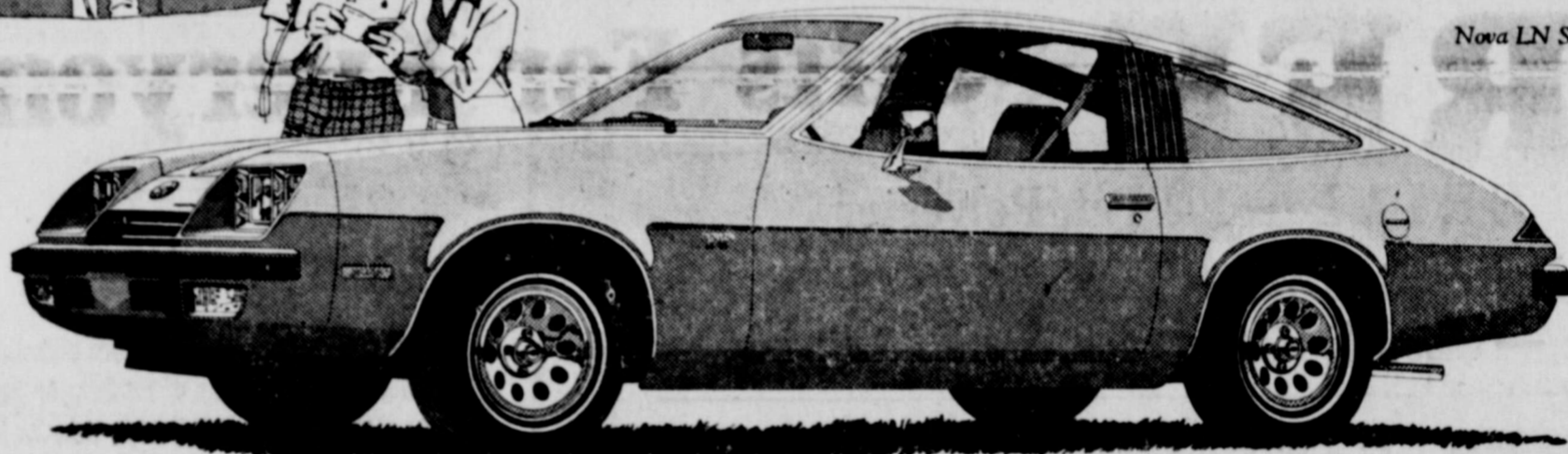
