



Mrs. Coalson Sends Word from Alaska

(The Observer received the following letter from Mrs. Pauline Coalson, former Robert Lee teacher, who is now teaching in Alaska.

Here I am in Alaska, "The Last Frontier," teaching school again "for Dan Turner, former Robert Lee principal. He called me Sept. 15 and explained that a professor and his wife from the University at Anchorage had resigned and that he needed me and my traveling cousin, Virgie Sparks Hunter of Slaton, to fill the vacancies out here 147 miles east of Barrow.

Just as last fall, when I flew to Kenai from "the Lower 48," I did not feel far from home since our flying time from Lubbock was only 61/2 hours on a big jet to Anchorage, where Jim Harger met us. I taught with him last veer. He assisted us in purchasing \$483 worth of parkas, snow Loots, insulated underwoar (made in Texas), wool socks and gloves. We also bought \$114 worth of groceries and paid \$45 excess baggage to Barrow.

At Barrow we were met by Barbara and Dan Turner. He is now superintendent of the huge north Slope Borough covering 89,000 square miles. He has charge of seven viilage schools, visited only

by planes. The largest one is at Barrow, which is a \$50 million complex. All these schools and modernly equipped and nice.

Arriving here at Nuiqsut, our small single engine plane was met by the president of the Village Council and a host of Eskimo students, who we love already.

I am teaching in the junior high! grades in a new, well heated (diesel oil) and electrically lighted building. We have all modern teaching equipment and native addies to assist. There is a cafeteria serving hot lunches.

Our new teacherage (an \$80,000) structure) is only 25 yards from the school building. We wear rubber boots on this soggy tundra, and there is not a tree in signt. All buildings are constructed about three feet above the ground because 18 inches below is solid ice and heat from the building, otherwise, would cause the foundation to sink right down into the ice (perma frost).

We miss telephones, television, radios, etc.; however, we get the daily piper and mail flown in three times a week. Time on our hands will surely promote more visitation with the natives, and good fellowship should abount up north in the 49th state, with our Big Brothers*

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
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
