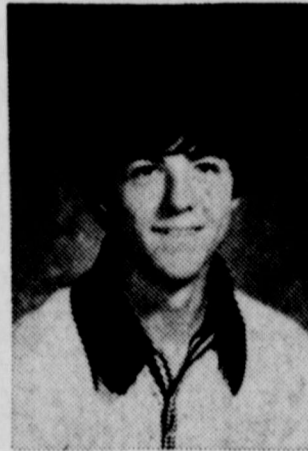

Steer Golfers at Regional Meet

The A golf team of Robert Lee High School is in Stephenville competing in the regional tournament and has the best wishes of everyone in the area for capturing a berth in the state tournament which will be held in May at Austin.

The A team of RLHS came out on top in District 9-A competition by 38 strokes over Eldorado who also qualified a team to the participate in the regional meet.

The last of four district tournaments was held at Eldorado April. Even though the Eldorado golfers took their own with a 288 team score to Robert Lee's 297, they could not overcome the big lead Robert Lee stacked up in the three previous outings.

Gary Womack easily wound up as district medalist with an even 300 for the four tournaments. His top spot put him in as leader of the all-district team, which also was made

up of Randy Bessent and Bobby Duncan of Robert Lee and Billy Donaldson and Clay Williams of Eldorado.

Tickets to the banquet can be purchased from BCD and Lions Club members for \$2.50 each. Everyone in the community is invited to attend this important civic event.

Opening Held for Library-Museum

The newly created Coke County Museum and Library had its formal opening Sunday with approximately 150 visitors coming by to inspect

the project. A total of 18 Texas towns and cities were represented during the open house Sunday afternoon.

The library-museum has unique and picturesque quarters in the old Coke County jail which was erected in 1907. The facility has its own gallows, installed before hanging was outlawed in Texas in 1926. The contraption was never used in Coke County and the trapdoors were welded shut after hanging was declared a bad way to punish criminals.

Volunteers have been working on getting the place ready for weeks and were extremely busy putting on the finishing touches before the Sunday opening. Bars were put over the jailhouse windows (to keep lawbreakers out rather than in); paint, courtesy of Coke County, has brightened up the place; and new carpet, courtesy of the library and museum committees and the Coke County Historical Survey Committee makes the downstairs area attractive.

Mrs. A. J. Roe Jr. heads the museum committee and Hank Baker is chairman of the library committee. Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, chairman of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, has to be given the credit for being the prime mover behind the project. An expert on Coke County history, she has been pushing for this project for many years. Her dream became a reality when the Robert Lee Bicentennial Commission adopted the idea.

Coke County Goes For Amendments

Coke County went along with the state as a whole in the Tuesday election on two Constitutional Amendments.

Amendment No. 1, which authorized increases in retirement pay for public employees and teachers, received 177 votes for passage and 95 against. No. 2 on the ballot, authorizing a hike in pay of legislators, carried with 143 for and 131 against.

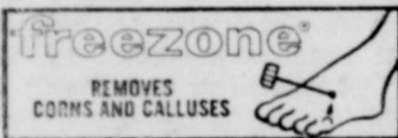

A very successful and popular A.B.C. golf tournament was held last Sunday at the Mountain Creek Golf Course. A total of 17 teams entered the competition.

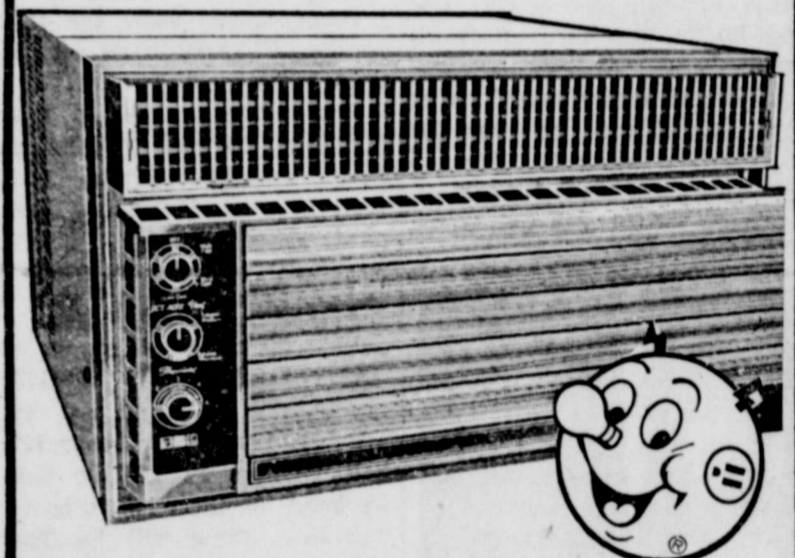
A new record was set Sunday for green fee players (non-members) when 70 persons, mostly from out of town were willing to pay the green fee to play on the Mountain Creek Course.

Music was furnished by Mrs. W. G. Ralston, grandmother of the bride.

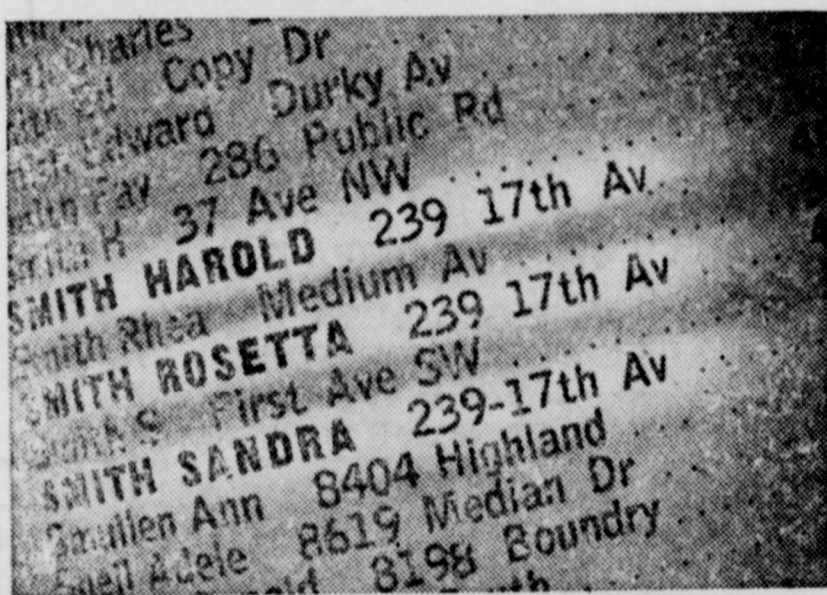

FISHING REPORT from Lake Spence

(Editor's Note: The following article was written by John Gill in his "West Texas Outdoors" in Sunday's San Angelo Standard-Times.)

Big striped bass have a habit of going on feeding sprees at Lake E. V. Spence near Robert Lee and now seems to be one of those times. The Coke County lake is chuck full of the tackle busting stripers, but until they go on a feeding rampage, fishermen doubt their existence.

Recent catches, however, point out that huge stripers are for real in Lake Spence. Probably the most noted catch of the week was that of Richard Arthur of San Angelo.

Arthur was fishing for crappie from the bank when his 18½ pound striper hit. The San Angelo fisherman was casting with light line and a crappie jig. A fish of this size normally makes shambles of light tackle, but Arthur was fortunate enough to maneuver the saltie to the bank and land him.

The majority of all stripers hooked at Lake Spence are never landed. They smash lures and live bait like no other fish in fresh water and when hooked they pull like a locomotive.

Most of the serious striper fishermen go after their favorites armed with tackle suitable for fishing in the surf or blue water Gulf, but one can never estimate when one of the lunkers will hit. They are just as likely to go after a minnow baited cane pole as silver spoon being fished in 40 feet of water.

At this time of year, stripers at Lake Spence can pretty well be tracked. They are now in shallow water sections of the lake and most anything cast on the flats has a good chance of being seen and taken by a striper.

They also have been seen schooling on the surface at Spence. Schooling stripers will normally take to the same type baits used for white bass.

Over 300 Students Attend Career Day

Student population on the Bronte High School campus took a sharp upward sweep Monday when high school students from Robert Lee and Sterling joined Bronte high schoolers for a Career Day program. The program was sponsored by the Coke County Extension Service under direction of Extensions Agents Sterling Lindsey and Mrs. Fay C. Roe. In excess of 300 students participated in the day's events.

Supt. C. B. Barbee welcomed the students to Bronte and a keynote address was given by James C. "Curly" Hays of the public relations department of West Texas Utilities Co. in Abilene.

In addition to attending the general session which opened the gathering, students had an opportunity to confer with four consultants in fields in which they are interested. A total of 35 consultants in 22 fields were present to talk with the students and answer their questions.

Students had a chance to learn something about careers almost from A to Z—actually from agriculture to welding. Other consultants invited their interest and questions included persons connected with careers in wildlife conservation, forestry, interior decorating, Peace Corps, education, business, electronics, law enforcement, social work, mechanics, carpentry, engineering, nursing home economics, coaching, law, secretarial work, beautician work, journalism, veterinary science and careers in the armed forces.

Representatives from area colleges were present making an effort to interest students in their institutions of higher learning. Present were persons from Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene Christian College and McMurry College, all of Abilene; Howard College at Big Spring; Western Texas College at Snyder; Cisco Junior College and Texas State Technical Institute, which has several campuses in various areas of Texas.

as one of its projects for celebrating the 200th birthday of the U. S.

The Bicentennial organization is headed by Mrs. Wilson Bryan; Mrs. Yarbrough heads the Heritage '76 committee; Mrs. Edna Havins is chairman of the Festival U.S.A. committee; and Fern Havins is head of the Horizon '76 committee.

The library already contains more than 1,000 books and is outgrowing its quarters. Volunteers are being lined up to keep the library open from 3 to 7 p.m. on weekdays and 1 to 4 p.m. on Saturdays.

The museum already contains a large number of interesting artifacts, including a 100 year old coffin donated by Newby Funeral Home. A shadowbox is on display which contains a compass carried by a Confederate captain during the Civil War, and other items.

Other collections on display included old tools, coins, arrowheads, razors and a license plate collection dating back to 1915.

Items resurrected from the cornerstone of the original courthouse in Robert Lee and on display included an 1891 copy of "The Rustler," whose name was later changed to the Robert Lee Observer, and other documents.

Mrs. Yarbrough displayed parts of her large collection of pictures and other items of interest concerning the county's history.

The Bicentennial Commission plans to construct a replica of an early day dugout on the museum grounds. An original dugout at Fort Chadbourne will be used as a pattern for the structure.

By special request, the Rev. and Mrs. Gene Moore sang "I Like to Go Wandering" during the open house. They were here conducting a weekend revival at the First United Methodist Church.
