Military services were held Monday at 2:30 p.m. for Sgt. Gerald Fritz, 21, of Junction, who was killed in a helicopter crash near Nak Hon Phanon in Thailand on May 13. Services were held in the First Baptist Church in Junction with burial in London Cemetery.

He was born May 6, 1954 in Mason, was reared in the London Community and was a 1972 graduate of Junction High School. His wife,

Linda, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pete (Clema Cowley) Rampy of Junction and is a granddaughter of Mrs. Lem Cowley of Robert Lee.

Sergeant Fritz had been in the Air Force two and a half years and after being stationed in Montana a year, was sent to Thailand last Nov. 13.

Survivors include his wife; a 10 month old son, Michael Lee Fritz; his parents and a brother, all of London.

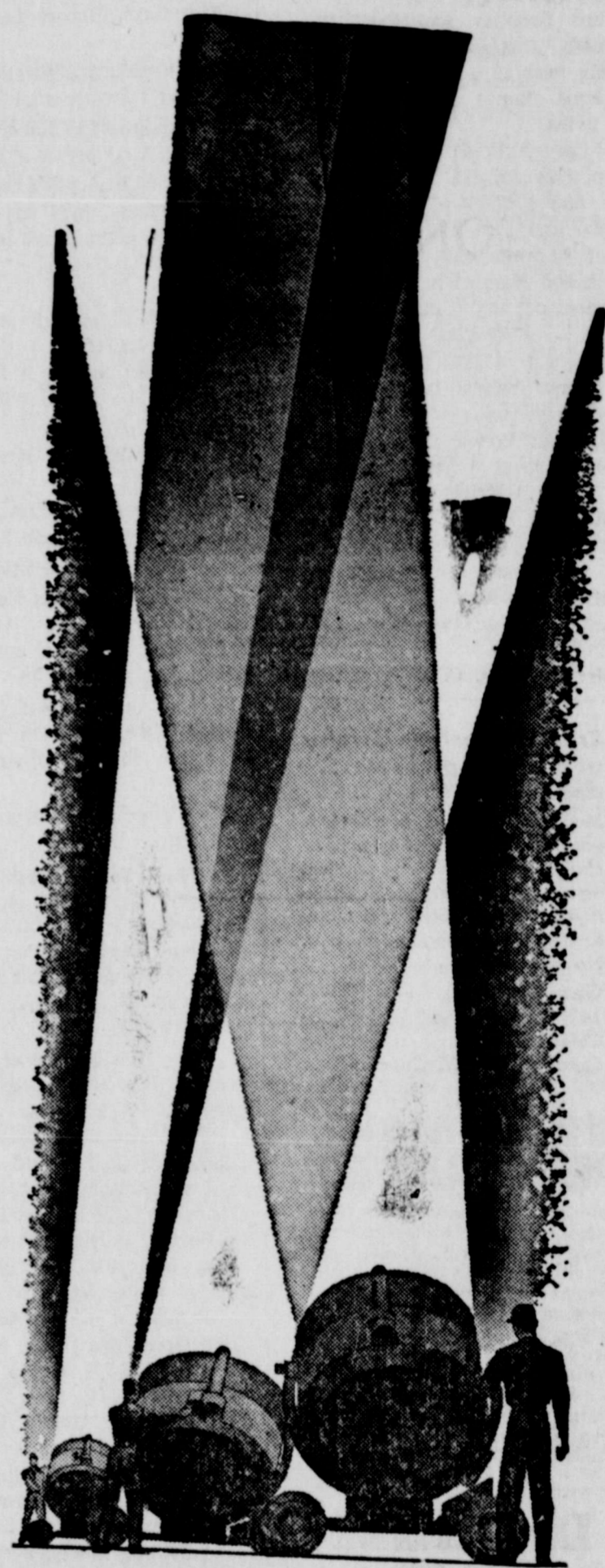
