A planned grazing system is a system in which two or more pas tures are rested from grazing in a
planned sequence through the year planned sequence throush the year
or during the growing season of de sired plants.
sired plants.
The purpose of a planned grazing system is to maintain or speed up raprovemend Grazing systems enable ranchers to use the forage on all grazing units and to improve effi ciency or grazing uniformly, using all parts of each grazng unit. This all parts of each grazng unit. This
insures a dependable supply of forage throughout the grazing system age chroughout the grazing system
and improves the habitat for wild life.
To develop a system, all factors
must be considered. Factors such as the size of the operation, number of pastures, number of livestock, climate, range sites, water facilities and many others that pertain to ranching.
Ranchers in Coke County are working closely with the Soil Conservation Service and are developing system tailored to help meet their objectives. They know the results
will be more forage and more live stock production.
