A committee met last week to plan the annual Coke County Fair. Dates were set for Sept. 18-21. The theme chosen was "Today, Tomorrow and Yesterday," which coincides with the Bicentennial theme already being used.

Vaughan Davis Heads IG Cooperative Firm

Earl Dusek, general manager of Independent Grocers, Inc., recently announced the re-election of Vaughan Davis of Robert Lee to the Board of Directors of the company.

In a meeting of the board following the annual stockholders meeting in Abilene on July 17, Davis was named president of the board by his fellow directors.

Davis, one of Robert Lee's prominent merchants and civic leaders, has long been a supporter of the grocery co-op concept. The pooled buying power of a formed independent retailer group allows its members to compete on an equal basis with the larger chain stores in the area.

The home owned independent store is thus enabled to offer its customers the prices and selections of the chain store, while combining the friendly atmosphere that is the trade mark of the home town grocer.

The co-op, Independent Grocers, Inc., now serves 220 members over a 68,000 square mile territory. The members stores do a retail volume of over \$30 million.

Davis has been one of the guidelights of this company for many years. He will assist management in the overall operation of the company and will lend his knowledge and experience to the other retail merchants in the company.

Davis has operated West Way Grocery in Robert Lee for the past nine years and before that he ran a food store at Silver for many years.

Committee Still Has Flags For Sale

The Robert Lee Bicentennial Committee is sponsoring the sale of U.S. Flags as a special Bicentennial project which hopefully will make Robert Lee a "City of Flags." They have sold 48 of the 3x5 flags and four of the 4x6 flags, a total of 52.

They have several more flags on hand to sell and invite everyone in Robert Lee to purchase a flag and fly it everyday.

Mrs. Wilson Bryan, general chairman of the Robert Lee Bicentennial Committee, is chief pusher for the flag project. She has help from several men who have assisted in getting flag poles made and erected.

The fair will again have exhibits in foods, both canned and baked, agriculture or horticulture, crafts, needlework and clothing, hobbies, floriculture, and art. There will be an adult and youth division of each department.

"Best of the show" in each department will be designated, a new feature in 1975.

Plans are being made to continue Beau and Belle Coronation, business exhibits, youth activities, and an evening program on Saturday.

The various committees are being formed and volunteers are needed. "Let us know immediately if you would like to serve in any capacity," said Mrs. Fay C. Roe, County Extension Agent. Sterling Lindsey also will take names of volunteers.

Everyone in the county is urged to get some entries ready for the fair.

Bicentennial Group Orders Medallions

The Robert Lee Bicentennial Committee has ordered antique silver, antique gold and bronze commemorative medallions and pendants. The coins should arrive in five to six weeks.

The design on one side of the coin will be Robert Lee's logo, drawn by Mac Adkins. It depicts the idea of the past, present and future as related to Robert Lee.

The City of Robert Lee is underwriting the initial cost for the minting of the coins. The production and sale of the medallions is an official project of the Robert Lee Bicentennial Committee, with assistance from the '64 Study Club. Profits from the sale of the coins will be used as operating expenses for the committee.

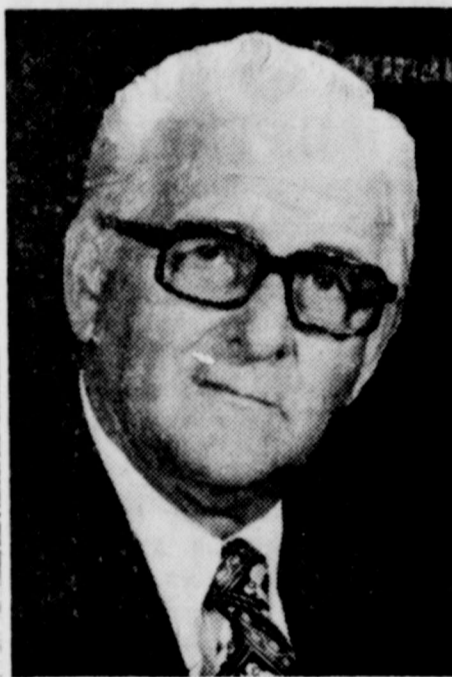
The committee will order additional items such as belt buckles, key chains and lapel pins to sell during the bicentennial year.

RL Steer Band To Start Practice

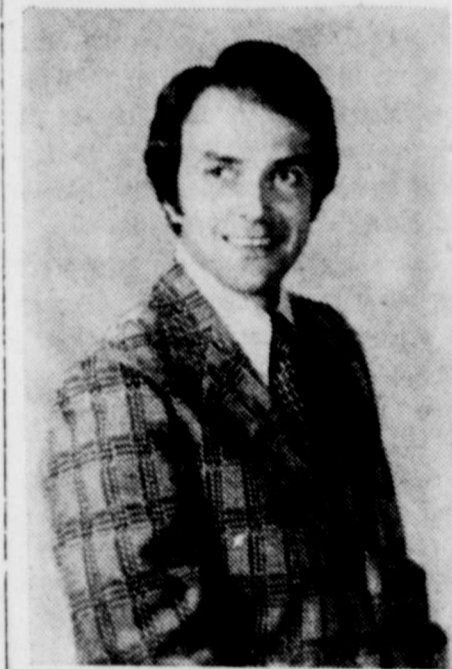

R-Lee to Receive Bicentennial Flag

In May 1975, Robert Lee was confirmed as a State and National Bicentennial Community. As a follow-up of this confirmation, the Robert Lee Bicentennial Committee is making plans for a flag and certificate presentation.

At this ceremony the community will receive National and State certificates and the National Bicentennial Flag which will be flown under the U. S. Flag at the City Hall.

Tentative plans are for the program to be held on the Coke County Courthouse lawn Aug. 15 at 7 p.m. Definite program plans will be announced later.

The program being planned is a very special and important event in the Community Bicentennial celebration and the committee invites everyone in Robert Lee to make plans to attend.

Silver Homecoming Draws Big Crowd

A large crowd attended the Silver Homecoming last Sunday at the Silver Baptist Church Fellowship Hall. A noon barbecue meal was served and visitation and a short business meeting were held in the afternoon.

One hundred nineteen persons were registered and attended from Silver, Sandoz, Robert Lee, Colorado City, Big Spring, Midland, San Angelo, Mason, Sweetwater, Abilene, Monahans, Pampa, Snyder, Andrews, Eden, Lubbock, and Seminole. Also Manila Philippines; Lovington, N. M., and Laverne, Okla.

President Ernest Clendennen presided for the business meeting. Mrs. Raymond Bloodworth, secretary-treasurer, read the minutes and gave the financial report. Dwain Walker was elected president of next year's homecoming, which will be held the fourth Sunday in July. His wife, Beth, was elected secretary-treasurer.

Lone Star Gas Co. Asks for Rate Hike

Lone Star Gas Company's local manager, H. K. Russ, has requested Robert Lee city officials to enact an ordinance to raise residential and commercial gas rates by about 19.8 cents per thousand cubic feet. The increase, Russ said, is being requested to offset the increase in Lone Star's wholesale costs to each town it serves in Texas, which was authorized by the Texas Railroad Commission on June 30.

The Railroad Commission authorized Lone Star to increase its intracompany "city gate rate" to \$1.0399 per thousand cubic feet of gas. According to Russ, the city gate rate applies to natural gas delivered by Lone Star's Transmission Division to its distribution divisions for sale to residential and commercial users. The new rate replaces a temporary emergency rate of 94.19 cents per thousand cubic feet set by the Railroad Commission on May 1, 1975.

Russ explained that the new rate would increase Robert Lee residential customers' gas bills by about \$1.24 a month. He also said that his request is a minimum application covering only the gate rate charge.

Included in the most recent Railroad Commission order was the authorization to increase Lone Star's automatic pass-on of increased gas costs to 85 per cent adjusted monthly. Lone Star was formerly allowed to pass on only 65 per cent of their increased costs for gas every six months. Lone Star is also seeking to have this provision included in the new city rate ordinance.

Russ noted that the \$1.0399 figure authorized by the Railroad Commission was arrived at after reviewing the evidence which reflected \$1.20 as shown by the company and 94 cents as testified to by the cities. In addition to the increased rates for residential and commercial customers, Russ said the Railroad Commission's order is designed to provide Lone Star an 8 per cent return on the fair value rate base set by the Commission.

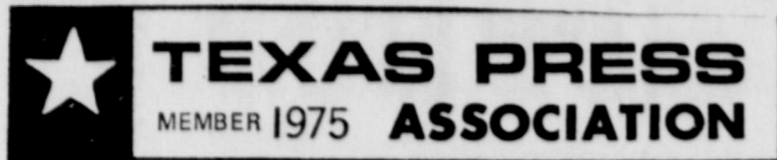

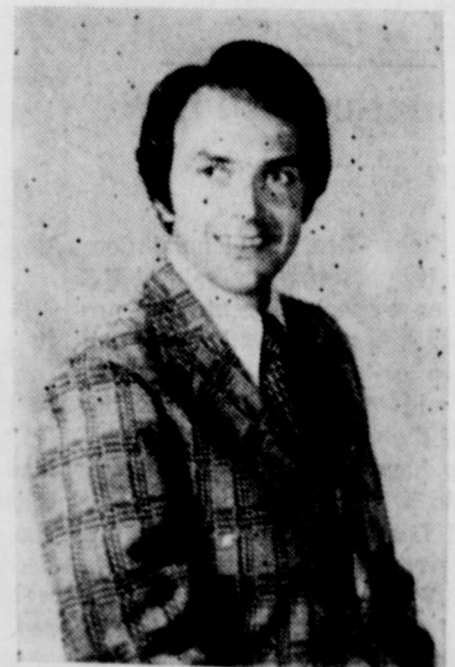

Flag Waves Proudly at Mrs. Tubb's Home FLAG HAS DISTINGUISHED HISTORY

When the large American Flag was raised to the top of the high pole at Mary Tubb's home, it unfolded many memories. It is a flag with a history which makes it a special flag to its owner and to her friends who also remember.
This 4 foot by 6 foot flag had been draped on the casket that contained the remains of three American airmen, members of a five-man crew, whose lives had been snuffed out suddenly while serving their country.

The three airmen were: Lt. Orville Garrison, co-pilot of Poplar Bluff, Mo.; Sgt. Henry M. Worley, engineer of Fort Worth; and Frank M. Tubb, radio-gunner of Festus, Mo., formerly of Robert Lee. Their bodies could not be identified individually as were those of Robert Jensen, pilot of Glenbrook, Conn., and Robert H. Waggy, tail gunner of Charleston, W. Va., and were sent to their homes for burial.

The B-25 in which the crew of five was flying had dropped a bomb load on an enemy ship in the China Sea. Flying at low altitude the repercussion from the explosion damaged the plane, and it crashed into a mountain a few miles from the bombing site.

Frank Tubb's wire relayed the tragic message to his parents, Arthur and Mary Tubb of Robert Lee. "The entire crew died in action March 15, 1945."

Men from small villages near the crash rushed to the scene and removed the bodies and buried them in a group in a cemetery in Shanghai, China. Later they were removed to Schofield Barracks in Hawaii to determine individual identification, which proved to be impossible.

After 3½ years had passed the final word came from the U. S. Government that the final burial place will be "in the National Cemetery in Fort Smith, Ark., on Sept. 21, 1949."

Mary had this flag draped on the casket of her late husband, a World War I veteran, who died April 1, 1970.

Mary Tubb said, "This flag flies in memory of my beloved son, Frank M. Tubb, and millions of others who lost their lives in the ravishes of war."

Land Use Bill Dies In Committee

The Federal Land Use Bill which has been in committee and was voted down is of particular interest to farmers and ranchers of West Texas. Horace L. Scott Jr. has been leading a campaign against the bill and received an Air Mail-ogram from Congressman John Young dated July 15. It stated:

In view of the interest you have heretofore expressed in opposition to Federal Land Use Planning Legislation, I am pleased to advise that the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs has today voted down the Federal Land Use Bill and laid on the table a motion to reconsider. This action ordinarily would spell the doom of the legislation. For many reasons with which you are familiar, it is hoped that this is the case; but no relaxation of vigilance on the part of those of you who are fully aware of the adverse effect of such legislation is warranted.

In rejecting the bill the vote in committee was 23 to 19 with one member voting present which, under the circumstances, represents a rather substantial margin. I must

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caution, however, that these matters have ways of changing and "rising from their own ashes." You may be assured that I will continue to follow closely and carefully any further legislative development on Federal Land Use Legislation, and I know you will want to do so from your end.

Scott also received a letter from Dee E. Brune, president of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation, which read, in part:

For your information this is how the (Texas) Committee Members voted: Eckhardt (D) and Steelman (R) both for; Kazan (D) and Patman (D) both against.

Brune continued: "These 23 votes were the most important ever cast in behalf of the private landowners of America. A 'thank you' letter to each of the 23 would certainly be appropriate. A kind of 'special thank you' to Congressmen Abraham 'Chick' Kazan, Wright Patman of Texas and Sam Teiger of Arizona is a MUST! These three men worked their hearts out in your behalf. My special thanks to each of you for all your help and support."

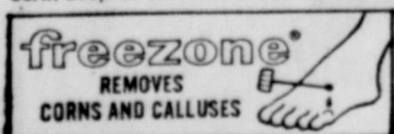

From The Oil Field



Texas Pacific Oil Co., Inc., announced completion of its No. 1 I. A. Bird, Coke County Canyon "B" discovery, 10 miles northwest of Robert Lee was gauged to pump 22 barrels of 40-1 gravity oil plus two barrels of water. Gas-oil ratio was 180-1.

Production was through perforations at 5,231-39 feet which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and fractured with 12,000 gallons and 13,000 pounds of sand.
