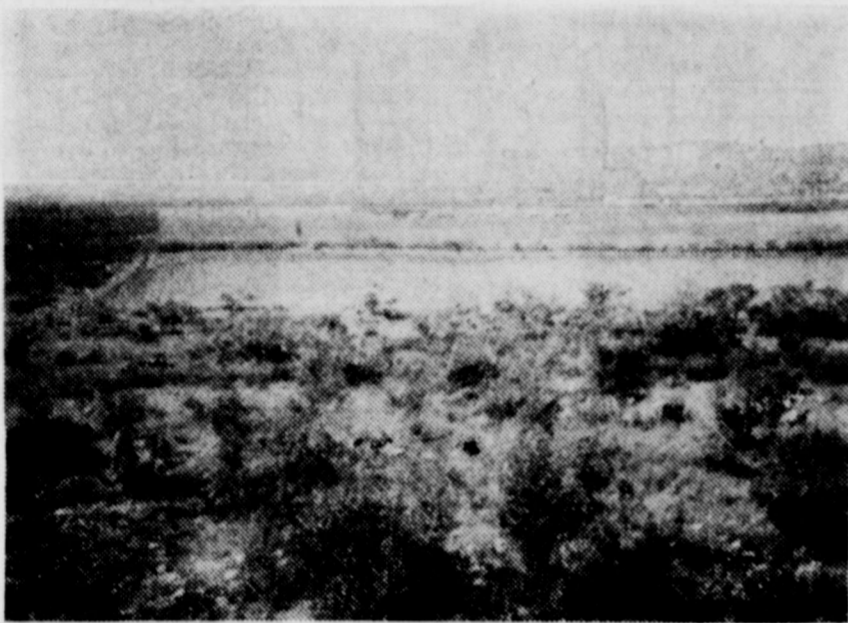

RANCH CONSERVATION — Most of the land shown here on the Conrad Millican Ranch west of Edith, was rootplowed to control mesquite. It was then roller chopped and seeded to a mixture of sideoats grama, blue panic, Kleingrass, and K. R. bluestem. Patches and strips of brush were left for protection of wildlife. This is a part of a complete Great Plains Conservation Program that is being applied on the Millican Ranch. Two ponds and a diversion have also been constructed this year.

The Fair catalogs were mailed out last week to all boxholders in Coke County and they show the divisions, classes, rules and give other information. The catalog also contains a sheet of blank entry forms. The deadline for entries is Sept. 15. Those needing additional entry forms may pick them up at the County Extension Service office or make their own copy.

Funeral services for Mrs. E. S. (Annie Reed) Cummings, 88, were held Wednesday in the First Baptist Church of San Angelo with the Rev. Dr. Jerold McBride, pastor, and the Rev. Jimmy Rogers, former pastor of Pecan Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Terry Memorial Cemetery on the Divide.

Mrs. Cummings was a former resident of Coke County. She died Monday in Baptist Memorial Hospital in San Angelo.

She was born March 10, 1887, in Callahan County and moved to Coke County as a young girl. She had lived in Abilene before moving to San Angelo in 1965.

She was married to Luther D. Terry in June 1910 and lived in Bronte until 1920 when they moved to Sweetwater. Mr. Terry died in 1936. She was married to Judge E. S. Cummings in 1943 and moved to Abilene. Judge Cummings died in 1960.

Mrs. Cummings had a long career as a teacher which began when she was only 19. She taught at Bronte, Sweetwater and Pecan Schools. She was the organizer of the Literary Club of Bronte and the Atheneum Study Club of Sweetwater. She was a member of the order of the Eastern Star and was a Baptist.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. W. D. Powers of Paducah; several nieces and nephews.

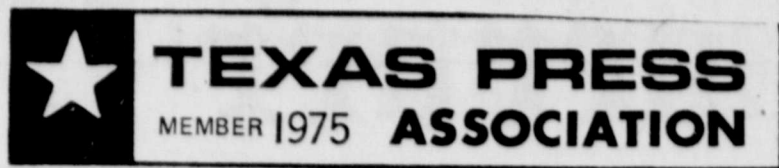

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BIRD BOOK AVAILABLE

People who enjoy having birds around their homes will find a new Soil Conservation brochure "Invite Birds to Your Home," a big help in planning and landscaping for birds.

The brochure, written by Olan W. Dillon Jr., SCS biologist, tells the bird lover how to satisfy habitat needs of nesting and wintering birds with trees, shrubs and food. It tells how a conservation landscape plan used in the selection of trees and shrubs will beautify your yard and attract the kinds of birds you like.

"A conservation landscape plan will guide you in placing bird-attracting features near a window, patio, or terrace so you can observe the many variety of birds that accept your invitation," Eph Cummins, SCS district conservationist at Robert Lee, states.

Even birdlovers in dense residential areas can attract birds by providing water for drinking and bathing and living fences and other shrubs for cover. "A single plant, the elderberry, is used by 51 species of birds and will dress your yard nine months out of the year with its white flower clusters and red-black berries," Cummins said.

"Invite Birds to Your Home" will tell you the kind of food preferred by different kinds of birds, and how to provide for them during food-short winter months.

Single copies of the booklet are available free at the Soil Conservation Service office.

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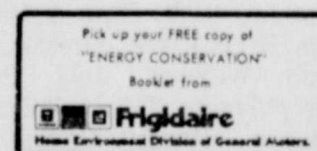

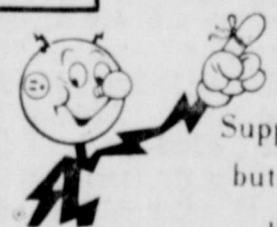
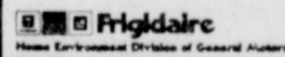
- ★ Avoid wasting hot water while laundering. Use the cold and warm water setting as much as possible to cut down on the energy needed to heat water.

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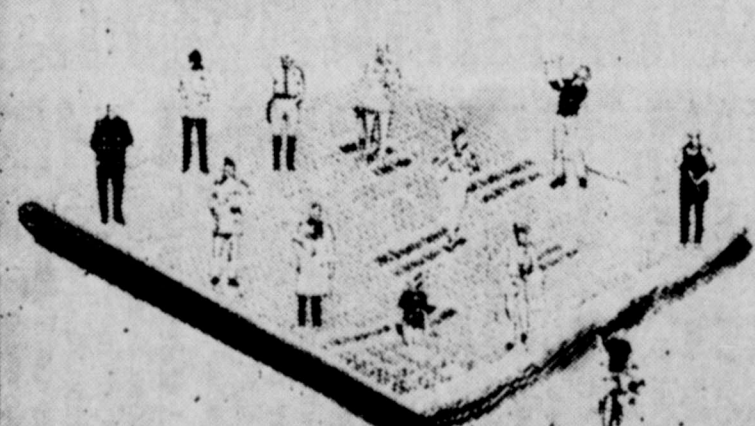

Business spaces must be reserved by Sept. 17. In the catalog, it states that business spaces must be reserved by Sept. 10, but the time has been extended to Sept. 17.

Exhibits should be put up on Thursday afternoon and Friday morning in order to be ready for visitors by 4 p.m. Friday, Sept. 19. The exhibit hall will be open to the public from 4 to 7:30 p.m. on the opening day of the Fair, Sept. 19; 9 a.m. to ? (till everybody is ready to go home) on Saturday, Sept. 20 and 1 to 4 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 21.

A "Best of Show" ribbon will be awarded to the highest scoring exhibit of all classes in each division.

Several "starving artists and craftsmen" are being invited to participate in the Fair. Also, plans are to have an educational display of livestock in the show barn with representation from several breeds and species of livestock.

The Saturday night program will include: posthole digging contest, bubble gum blowing contest, country and western music, Beau

and Belle Coronation and square dancing.

More than 2,000 persons attended the Fair last year and Fair officials anticipate that number or more will attend this year's extravaganza.

Coke Historical Markers Dedicated

The Coke County Historical Commission, sponsors of historical preservation in Coke County, dedicated two Official Texas Historical Markers Sunday, Aug. 24, and they now can be viewed by travelers on the Water Valley highway and in the Divide Cemetery approximately 15 miles southwest of Robert Lee.

The dedicatory program began at 4 p.m. in the Robert Lee High School's air conditioned auditorium where the audience could escape the heat and sit in comfort.

Elton Mims, well known Coke County rancher, widely known in Texas historical circles, and a member of several historical organizations, gave the dedicatory address.

Mims was introduced by Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough who is the chairman of the Coke County Historical Commission. She also introduced representatives of historical groups from Mitchell, Runnels and Tom Green counties.

Others assisting with the program included Sterling Lindsey, who served as master of ceremonies and led the Pledge of Allegiance; Supt. Jimmy Bickley, who gave the invocation; Mrs. C. E. Arrott, with Mrs. Wilson Bryan at

the piano, led the singing of "America the Beautiful."

The SHELIVING ROCK marker, at the intersection of the Water Valley highway and the Divide Cemetery road, was unveiled by Alvin Counts, a pioneer resident of the Divide Community, and Victor McCabe, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank McCabe and a grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Q. McCabe, who were among the earliest settlers in the Divide area.

The DIVIDE CEMETERY marker was unveiled by Cooper Chapman and J. H. Ruth, relatives of founders of the cemetery.

From the marker sites, the group traveled to SHELIVING ROCK, once the site of a vast Indian village. It is a scenic, overhanging rock ledge on Walnut Creek, midway between the North Concho and Colorado Rivers.

The geographic site was made famous as the place of rendezvous and camp site for Rangers, scouts from Fort Chabourne and Indian hunting settlers a few nights prior to the Battle of Dove Creek on Jan. 8, 1865. It later was frequented by scouts from Fort Concho and line riders for area ranches. Today the peaceful spot is a shade area for livestock and for occa-

sional picnickers.

The tour was concluded with a reception at the ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. T. K. Whiteside, who were assisted in receiving by members of the Coke Historical Commission, who were co-hosts for the occasion.

Mrs. T. B. ("Dot" McCutchen) Childress, member of a pioneer family, was at the register, while Mrs. Elton Mims and Mrs. C. E. Arrott assisted in serving at the refreshment table.

Mrs. Whiteside conducted a tour of the home, much of which was built with the Whitesides' own hands and is one of the most attractive homes in Coke County.

Mrs. Fay Roe and Miss Gladys Waldrop were on hand to make photographs of the activities.

No state funds may be used to remove surface water from the river basin of origin if the surface water is necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable water requirements of the basin for the ensuing 50 years, unless the removal of water is sufficiently replaced to the point of removal from outside the state or is on a temporary, interim basis. The seaward beaches of the Gulf of Mexico and coastal submerged lands belonging to the state are held by the state in perpetual trust for the people, and subject to reasonable limitations prescribed by law, the public has the free and unrestricted right of use and benefit of the beaches. The provision is continued that, except as otherwise provided by law, a rate of interest in excess of ten percent a year is usurious, and that if a contract does not specify a rate of interest, the rate under the contract, and a goal of one state is established to provide every resident for cities, towns, coun-

Revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution. AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF ROBERT LEE, COKE COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED BY IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROBERT LEE.

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Robert Lee by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas Corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows.

- First 1,000 Cu. Ft. or Fraction Thereof \$3.1277 Gross; \$2.8149 Net
- Next 3,000 Cu. Ft. @ \$1.9054 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.7149 Per Mcf Net
- Next 6,000 Cu. Ft. @ \$1.7832 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.6049 Per Mcf Net
- Next 15,000 Cu. Ft. @ \$1.6943 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.5249 Per Mcf Net
- Next 75,000 Cu. Ft. @ \$1.6388 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.4749 Per Mcf Net
- Over 100,000 Cu. Ft. @ \$1.6054 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.4449 Per Mcf Net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period, except that where customer's only use for gas service is in an outdoor grill and/or a fireplace starter, the amount shown for the first consumption block shall constitute a minimum monthly bill.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the \$1.0399 per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to July 1, 1975, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. 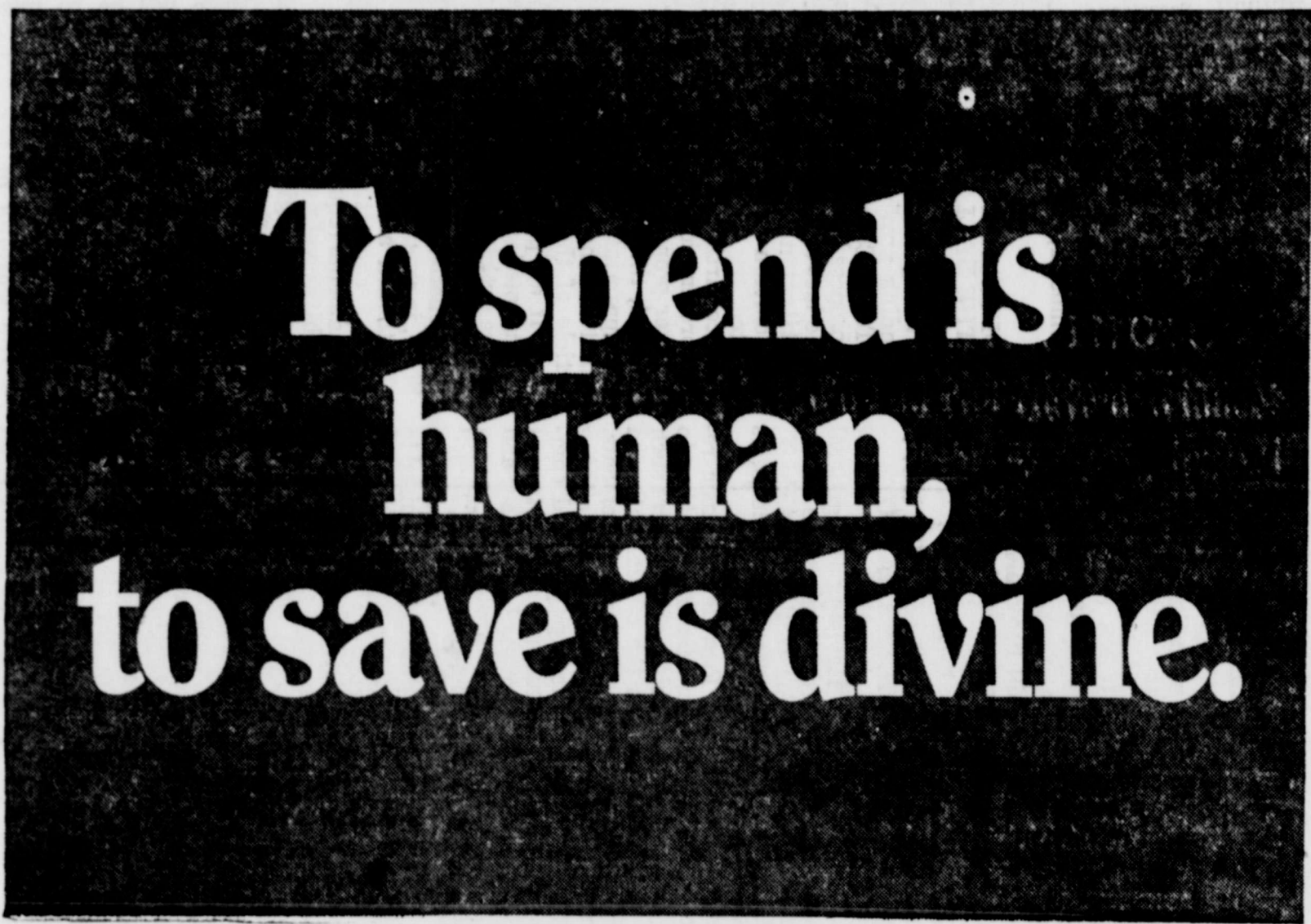
