The Hornets came back and scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter but were unsuccessful at extra points. Final score was 26-20.

Coaching the local lads were Coach Chris Frederick and Coach Max Anthony.

The next Steer B Team game is scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 25, at 10 a.m. when Irion County B team comes to Robert Lee.

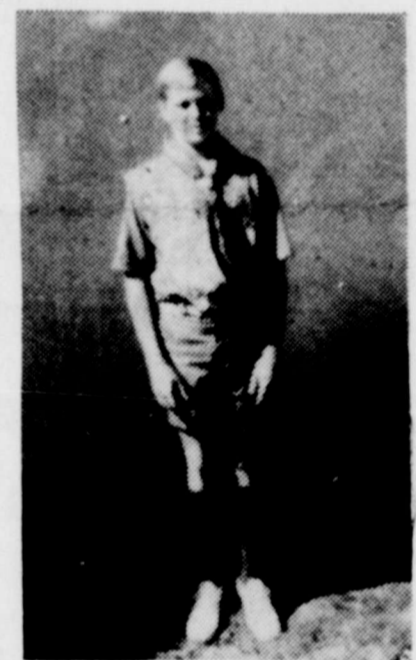
