Elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1960 and first elected to the Texas Senate in 1964, he was again elected to the Senate in 1968, 1972 and 1974.

Glenn Honored As ities Conservationist

E. F. Glenn of Bronte has been selected as conservationist of the year for 1975 by directors of the Coke County Soil and Water Con- lative Advisory Council. He is also servation District. He was recog_ mized at a recent meeting of the Bronte Noon Lions Club for his work in conservation of soil and water on the places he operates in East Coke County.

Royce Fancher explained the work that had been done by Glenn and explained the importance of management in applying a conservation program

He then presented Glenn a plaque on behalf of the Lions Club and the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Glenn has been a cooperator with the district since 1949. Since that time, according to Soil and Water District officials, he has done an excellent job of controlling mesquite by rootplowing and of improv_ ing forage production by reseeding. Grasses such as Kleingrasss sideoats grama and K. R. bluestem

have been planted. Management practices are the most effective part of maintaining an effective conservation program. Some of these important practices consist of proper grazing use, de_ ferred grazing, conservation crop_ ping system, crop residue use, and contour farming.

Practices such as fencing, diversions, maintaining terraces, and pond construction for livestock water have also been carried out to complete the conservation pro_ gram.

In addition to his ranching operations, Glenn also serves as president of the First National Bank in Bronte.

The parents of the bridegroom hosted the rehearsal dinner at Lowake Inn, Rowena.




