## DR. OUISENBERRY WORKING ON NEW <br> COTTON FOR WT

Dr. J. E. Quisenberry, son of of Mr. and Mrs. J. E Quisenberry of Robert Lee, is one of the scientists who is working on a new strain of cotton that hopefully will be a daptable to West Texas.
Dr. Quisenberry warks at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock.
Dr. Quisenberry, and his colleagues at the Lubbock station, are trying to develop a cotton plant with certain characterits of Mexi can cotton, which dan withstiand periods of drought. However, this type of Mexican cotton may grow to be 10 feet tall, and that's one of the problems of the experimenters. They don't want cotton 10 feet tall, but they would like to have some of the characteristics of this type cotton, mostly f
sistant abilities.

Quisenberry salid most of the va rieties of Texas High Plains cot ton were derived from varietie primarily bred for humlid areas of the Southeast.
Characteristics useful for drought tolerance were probably, Quisen berry sad, during this development pertiod. But with these wild cot But with these wild cotton varie ties, itt's a different story the sci entists say, as their enzyme sys tems are able to adapt to condi tions so that all phases of the plant's growth are carried out on with ability to withstand moisture stress
