Everyone's Help Is Needed (An Editorial)

The medical care situation in Coke County has reached a tragic low. Something must be done to remedy the situation in both Robert Lee and Bronte. Both towns have fine facilities to take care of people in their areas, but the lack of attraction for doctors has made the whole investment of many thousands of dollars a farce and left the entire county and area without adequate medical care.

The West Coke County Hospital in Robert Lee remains open with a few hours' visit each week from Air Force Base doctors, but the Bronte Hospital is now completly closed since the death of Dr. John R. Harris and the subsequent retirement of Dr. Robert Baldwin.

One might say that both towns are without medical care facilities. The Robert Lee hospital has struggled along since the death of Dr. John McDaniel, and, with the help of tax money, has been able to stay open. However, the Bronte Hospital, which has always been privately owned, didn't have this tax money cushion on which to ride over a long period of time. The Harris heirs told tery. this newspaper that they lost over \$12,000 in two months after their father died.

Several organizations have expressed an interest in providing medical care for the residents of Coke County, but they want to take over the operation of both hospitals, in Bronte and Robert Lee.

There is also the matter of the nursing homes in each of the county's two towns. Both of them are assets to the cities and provide a humane and needed service to our communities. But, they, too, have to have the services of a doctor. Their services, alone, should provide enough incentive for all of us to work together and work out a solution to this problem.

annual income of \$50,000. How can I use HR-10 to provide myself with a good income at age 65?

With HR-10, the maximum income allowed for computation is \$100,000 and the lessor of 15% of this or \$7,5000; however, you can't exceed your actual income. Many choose to use a smaller percentage. For example, a man, 45, with 3 employees has earned income above \$50,000. His 3 employees earn \$21,600 annually. 7% of \$50,000 is \$3,500 and 7% of \$21,600 is \$1,512 ... a total of \$5,012 off the top of his income. This is a fair and legal application of HR-10, yet 70% of the total contributions go to him. Money, invested at age 45. in a flexible annuity paying 7% will yield a monthly income at 65 of \$1,175.



BELLS TO TOLL OVER NATION TO CELEBRATE 200TH ANNIVERSARY

A simultaneous, nationwide ringing of bells on July 4th will herald the country's entrance into its third century. Communities, churches, schools, fire departments, and individuals will toll bells in conjunction with the ringing of the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia at 2 p.m. (EDST). A Congressional Resolution determined this as the most appropriate hour to ring the bells symbolizing the moment in history in the year 1776 when the Liberty Bell proclaimed the signing of the Declaration of Independence. The bell ringing will last for two minutes in commemoration of the nation's first two centuries. Time span will be from 2 p.m. to 8 a.m. making it possible for all Americans to participate in ringing the bells at the same time.

John W. Warner, administrator of the American Revolution Bicen_ tennial Administration (ARBA), announced the bell ringing, saying:

"There is great interest across the land in a symbolic national effort to commemorate our 200th anniversary, and many communities have already begun planning bell ringing ceremonies as part of their Bicentennial activities. Now we are askig all Americans to icin together on this historic occasion, and let every bell in the country ring out to declare our freedoms and signify our unity."
