DOVE SEASON OPENED HERE WEDNESDAY

Dove season opened Wednesday, Sept. 1 and will continue through Oct. 14. The hours for hunting will be from 12 noon to sunset.

Game Warden R. L. Flanagan noted that the daily bag limit is 10 and that doves may not be hunted with any shotgun not plugged to a three shell capacity; also it is unlawful to shoot dove with any rifle. He pointed out that dove season will reopen Jan. 1 through 16, and that hours are 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset.

License fees also unchanged: \$8.75 for a combination hunting and fishing license, \$5.25 for resident hunting and 25 cents for a resident exempt license. Sportsmen are reminded that all hunting licenses expire Aug. 31 each year.

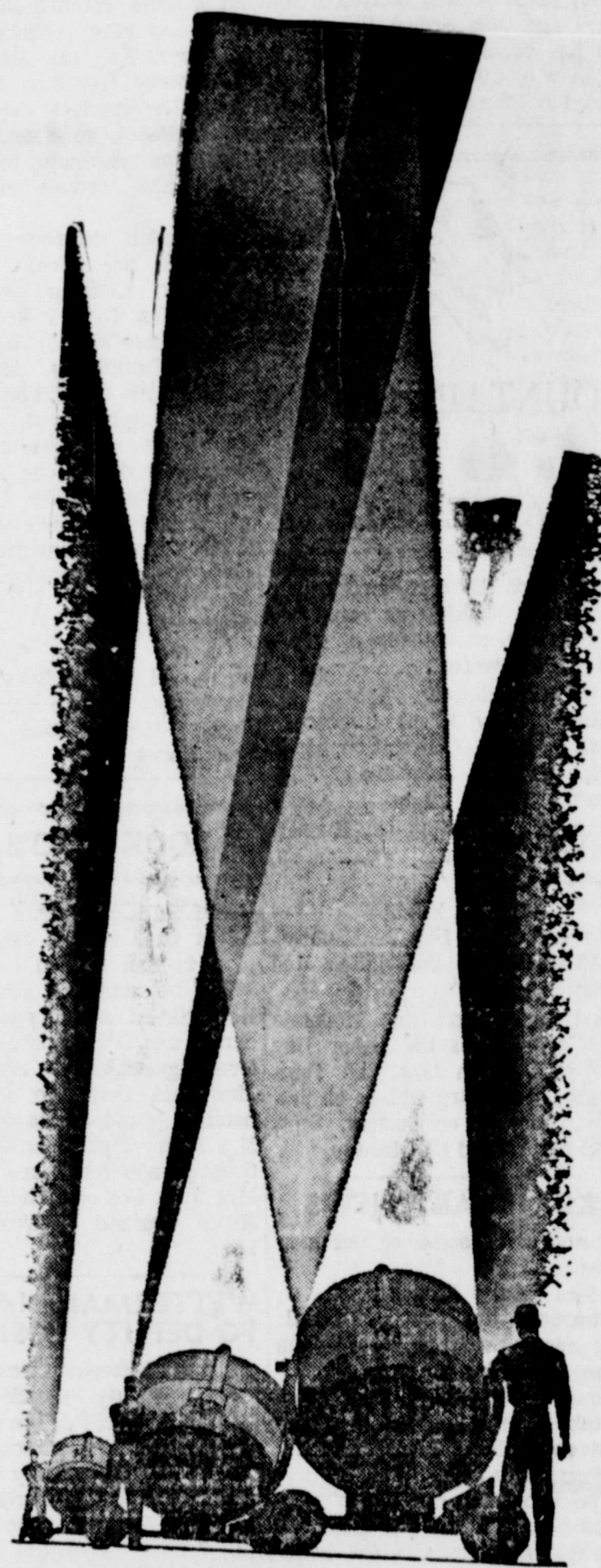

Coke Ladies Report on European Tour

(Editor's Note: The article below was written by Mrs. Charlie Boecking of Bronte and relates the experiences she and Mrs. W. T. Roach had on a recent tour of Central Europe. We found her story very interesting and believe our readers will enjoy it.)

We left Dallas-Fort Worth Airport about 2 p.m. June 27 and arrived 3½ hours later in Bangor, Maine, for a fuel stop and change of crew before we crossed the Atlantic. Everyone, lawyers, dentists and bankers, all 219 of our party stormed the souvenir shop to buy cards to write home that we were finally on our way.

We had a very smooth flight over the Atlantic, England and France and our first view of the Alps was with early morning sun on the snow. This view was from 37,000 feet and we saw them in all their majesty. That was a sight I shall never forget.

When we arrived at the Hotel International in Zurich, Switzerland, the keys were in our respective doors so most of us, after checking out the bathroom, etc., got about two hours sleep before going on an afternoon tour of the city of Zurich.

The city is very clean. The lake that is in the center of the city is clean and clear. The weather was very warm and sunny and people were out in the parks and there were many sail boats on the lake—motor boats are not allowed on the lake because of pollution.

I expected the banks to be outstanding in appearance because Zurich is the financial and banking capital of the world. But they were just large, square buildings with heavy bars on the windows. Not a numbered account in sight. One outstanding thing about Zurich is the high cost of houses—\$100,000.00 up. The average person lives in an apartment. The average worker's income is approximately \$600 per month but they have high taxes, including a church tax.

After a good night's rest, we left at 8 the next morning on an all day tour. We passed through the Swiss countryside to reach the shores of Lake Lucerne where they put our buses on a large ferry and we crossed the lake. By this time we were deep in the Alps. Such beauty is impossible to describe. As one of the very charming tour guides so aptly put it, "Here your eyes have something to do." After driving through Engleberg Valley to Engleberg, we ascended by funicular (cog rail) and three changes of cable cars to Mount Tellis,

Central Switzerland's highest peak. The view from there was fantastic. It was like being on top of the world. After enjoying this for about two hours, we descended for lunch and then on to Lucerne for sightseeing and shopping.

Their highways are very modern and functional. They have completed their highway program at a very high cost. It was a tired but happy group that returned to the hotel in Zurich that evening.

The next morning at 8:00 we boarded buses for Liechtenstein and what they called the Grand Alpine Tour.

I don't know what the Swiss do with their clutter and trash around their farm houses, but they absolutely don't have any. Their places are immaculate. The window boxes spill over with colorful geraniums and petunias without exception. They also pamper their Brown Swiss cows. I wished that Charlie could see those well tended cows. The people farm every tillable square foot of soil whether it is on a hill or almost straight up.

We reached Liechtenstein about 11 a.m. and there in Vaduz, the capital, we had about 40 minutes shopping time. The setting of Liechtenstein is like a jewel. The Alps are so towering and majestic here that it was hard to think about going into a shop. All I wanted to do was look at the surroundings. Liechtenstein is famous for their colorful postage stamps. I was a little slow and didn't get any cards mailed but bought some stamps.

Before we left this lovely place we tasted the Prince's wine in a large vineyard. The Prince and his wife and four children live in a large castle high on a mountain above the town of Vaduz. They shop like anyone else in the village and this delights the people. The Prince is a handsome young man who is a descendent of the Hapsburg family.

The reason one never sees Liechtenstein on the map is because if it is a Swiss map, they include Liechtenstein. If it is an Austrian map, they color it with Austria.

Reluctantly we boarded the bus for Klosters, a renowned mountain resort where we took a cable car ride to the top of a mountain for a delicious Swiss lunch and folklore.

After lunch we continued by coach to Davos and all along the way saw many quaint Alpine villages. There is one, Lenzerheide,

that I feel I must see again and spend more time there. We saw another town that dates back almost 1500 years, named Chur (pronounced Coor). We returned to our hotel about 7:30 p.m. and I felt like I had seen the most gorgeous part of the world that day.

We had time the next morning to get out and explore around our hotel area. Right in behind our hotel was a market place that is set up twice a week. The country people bring in flowers, vegetables, arts and crafts to sell. That was a sight to see. Everything was perfect. Great big strawberries—Oh!

About 2 p.m. we motored through the hilly Zurich country and the gentle farm lands to Steckborn on the lower Lake Constance. We entered Stern am Rhein and strolled about there looking at the murals on those medieval age old buildings. On our way down cobble stone streets to the place where we were to board our launch to cruise the Rhine, there in and out of the way place was a store displaying a special on dishwashers. Wouldn't Dayton and his boys like to have the job of installing a dishwasher in one of those old castles!

We thoroughly enjoyed our cruise down the Rhine. The castles on the high hills along the banks were interesting and colorful. The day was warm and people were swimming in the Rhine River all along the way to Schaffhausen. We left the boat here and motored back to Zurich.

We found the people of Switzerland to be very courteous and friendly. I have already had a card from one couple we met. Nearly everyone around the hotel area speaks some English, but in some of the stores they don't speak one word of English.

We must get our luggage ready and outside the door by 10 p.m. because we leave by chartered train for Germany at 7:30 a.m. in the morning. Their trains run on time!

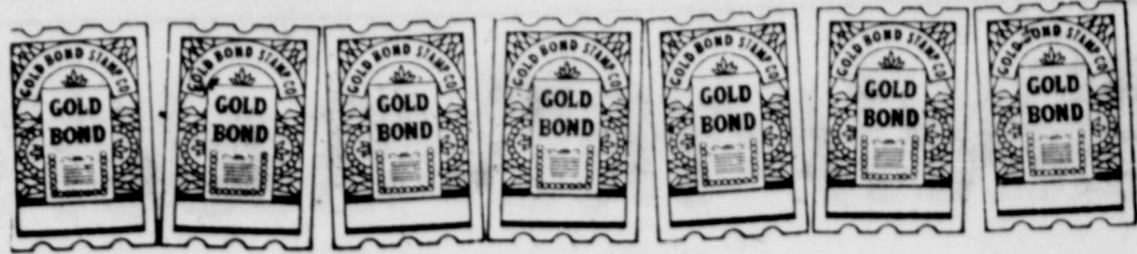
