FUNERAL RITES HELD FOR MRS. I. M. CUMBIE SUNDAY IN BRONTE

Mrs. Irving M. (Rebecca) Cumbie 79, a long time resident of Bronte, died at 2:55 p.m. Friday, Sept. 10, in the West Coke County Nursing Home, where she had been a resident since May 8.

Services were held Sunday at 3 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church of Bronte with the pastor, the Rev. Earle Lewis, and the Rev. Cecil Harper, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

She was born Sept. 9, 1897, in Fulton, Ky. She came to Coke County in 1906 and was married to Irving M. Cumbie, long time merchant of Bronte, in 1916 at Robert Lee. Mr. Cumbie preceded her in death in 1971.

Mrs. Cumbie was a member of the First United Methodist Church and had served as pianist and organist for 55 years. She was recently honored when she was presented with a certificate of recognition in appreciation for her continuous contribution, interests and unselfish services rendered to the community.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. A. E. Claffey of Indianapolis, Ind., and Mrs. R. D. Garrett of Conroe; a son, Irving M. Cumbie Jr. of Houston; two sisters, Mrs. A. M. Tubb of Robert Lee and Mrs. Ernest Ivey of Bronte; a brother, W. H. Maxwell Jr. of Bronte; five grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.

Three more cases of screwworms have been located in Coke County swellings the year's total to 12 cases.

The latest cases were submitted by J. B. Mackey, from his place four miles northeast of Bronte; by Bill Hamilton, five miles southwest of Blackwell; and by Tom Rives from his Hayrick place, 12 miles northeast of Robert Lee.

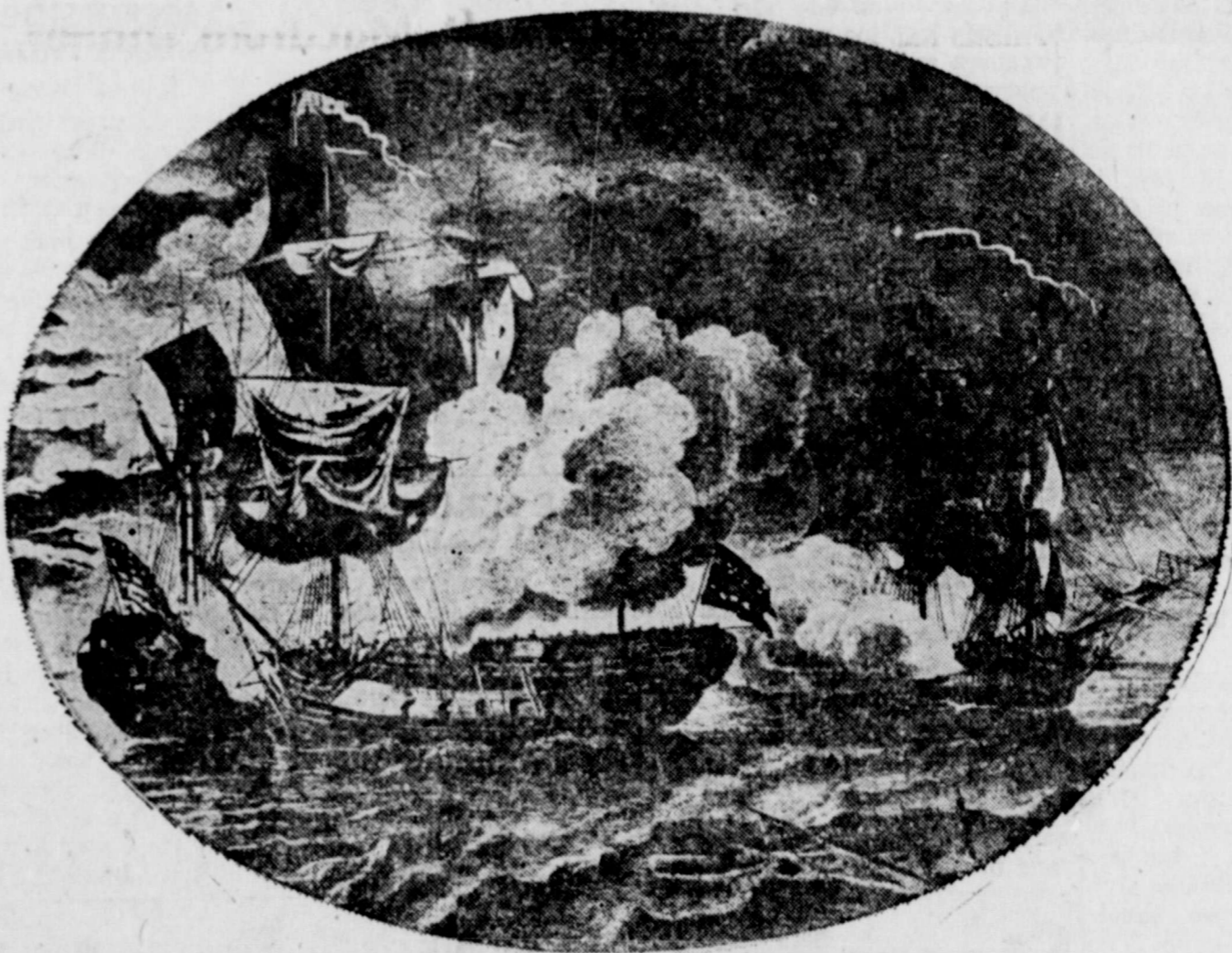

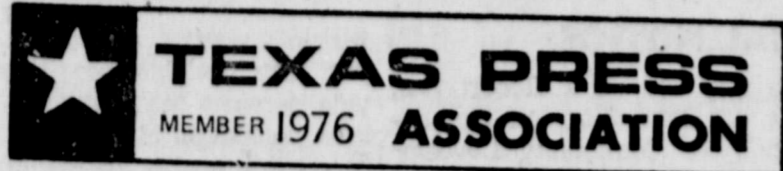

SOIL CONSERVATION PERSONNEL HAVE BRONTE MEETING

David Firor, southern representative of the National Association of Conservation Districts, spoke to members of the West Texas Association Districts at their Aug. 31 meeting at the Community Center in Bronte.

Outlining NACD policies which highlighted his address, Firor said, "We have not abandoned the original goals and programs of soil and water conservation districts which were created 40 years ago. We still believe that the foundation stone of our program is a farm to farm, district by district approach to conservation. We are emphasizing voluntary participation and incentive programs to reach our objectives as opposed to the ever spreading use of federal regulatory powers we see today."

He said that NACD is trying to improve and develop natural resources in an intelligent and creative way and emphasized that the only new source of wealth is in the nation's natural resources.

George Marks, who is the top administrator of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service in Texas, briefed the group on the agency's current programs and policies.

Other special guests included Joe Antilley, vice chairman of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board; Kenneth Kuykendall, vice president of the Texas Association of Soil and Water Districts; and Harvey Davis, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Kuykendall briefed the district directors on the state association activities and discussed items of business to be presented at the state meeting to be held in McAllen Oct. 12-14.

The West Texas Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts consists of 14 districts. The organization's purpose is to promote the work of districts and to serve as a vehicle whereby district directors can discuss conservation problems similar to this area.

The association elected new officers, including: president, J. M. Sterling of Colorado City; president-elect, J. D. Crawford of Midland; re-elected treasurer, Cone Robinson Sr. of Norton.

Sixty-five persons attended the meeting.

LEGAL NOTICE

The City Council of Robert Lee, Texas, has determined to file an application for Community Development Block Grant funds.

The primary objective of the Community Development program is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment and expanding the economic opportunities of persons of low and moderate income. This objective is to be achieved through the elimination of slums and blight and detrimental living conditions, conservation and expansion of housing and housing opportunities, increased public services, improved use of land, increased neighborhood diversity, and preservation of property with special values. Thus, the program is versatile. A community, after determining its own problems, can determine how best to solve those problems itself.

Cities and counties are eligible to seek these funds. The Dallas office of the Department and Urban Development which administers the funds has established a maximum amount available based on population. \$100,000 is the maximum for which the City of Robert Lee is eligible to apply. Because of the many applications filed, not all applicants can be funded. HUD has established a selection process which will help determine who gets funded. That process requires HUD to review every application to insure that an effort is being made to satisfactorily perform previously funded tasks, to implement previously accepted housing plans, and that the current request is for activities which are eligible. If HUD is favorable to our application on those three factors, the application will receive points based on six items. The points will be totaled and funds will be awarded the cities and counties with the highest number of points. The six items are: 1) the extent of substandard housing; 2) the proportion and extent of poverty in the area; 3) the extent to which the activities benefit low or moderate-income families; 4) the extent to which the proposed activities expand or conserve low or moderate-income housing; 5) the effort to alleviate a serious threat to health or safety; and in some cases, 6) if the funds will be used to acquire Federal or State grants.

Part of the requirements for obtaining the grant are that citizens be given at least two opportunities to publicly express what they feel our local problems are and how they should be solved if this money is received. Citizens are also to be informed of the purposes of the grant, the selection criteria, the citizen participation requirements, the funding limits, and the possibility that funds are not available to fund every application submitted.

The City in filing this request certifies to HUD that the program, if awarded, will be conducted in a nondiscriminatory manner. Also, the City would certify to the enforcement of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

Activities eligible for the Community Development program are:

- 1. For the acquisition of real property which is blighted, deteriorated, deteriorating, undeveloped, or inappropriately developed properties; appropriate for rehabilitation or conservation activities; appropriate for the preservation or restoration of historic sites, the beautification of urban land, the conservation of open spaces, natural resources, and scenic areas, the provision of recreational opportunities, or the guidance of urban development; to be used for the provision of some public works, facilities and improvements; or to be used for other public purposes where necessary to the community development program.
- 2. For neighborhood facilities

which: a) are designed to serve a particular neighborhood and provide services for that area if the area population is less than 10,000; b) provide health, recreational, social, or similar services; c) may be either single or multipurpose in nature.

- 3. Senior centers.
- 4. Historic properties (including private where public access is available).
- 5. Utilities.
- 6. Streets, street lights, traffic signals, signs, street furniture, and trees.
- 7. Water and sewer facilities but not sewage treatment works.
- 8. Foundations and platforms for air rights sites.
- 9. Pedestrian malls and walkways.
- 10. Parks, playgrounds, and other recreational facilities.
- 11. Flood and drainage facilities where unavailable through other Federal programs.
- 12. Parking facilities, solid waste disposal facilities, and fire protection equipment and facilities under some circumstances.
- 13. For code enforcement in delineated areas which are deteriorating and where such efforts in conjunction with other activities may be expected to halt the decline.
- 14. For clearance, demolition, removal, and rehabilitation of buildings and improvements.
- 15. For special projects which will remove barriers to the mobility of the elderly and handicapped.
- 16. For relocation of families displaced by program activities.
- 17. Funds may also be used to provide other public services needed to support the community development program and for which other Federal assistance is not available.
- 18. Funds may be used to match or acquire other Federal funds for activities consistent with the program.
- 19. Also, for planning necessary to the development and completion of a workable community development program.
- 20. For reasonable administrative costs.

In completing the application for Community Development funds the City will need to determine local housing conditions and the needs of local residents for various type of housing assistance both for owners and renters. Then a program on how the needs should be met will be submitted.

A public hearing has been set for Monday, Sept. 20, 7:30 P.M. in the Courtroom of the Coke County Courthouse.

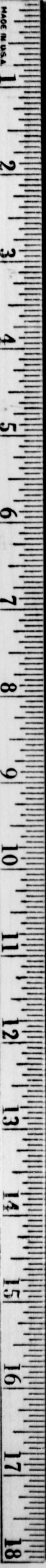

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principal amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

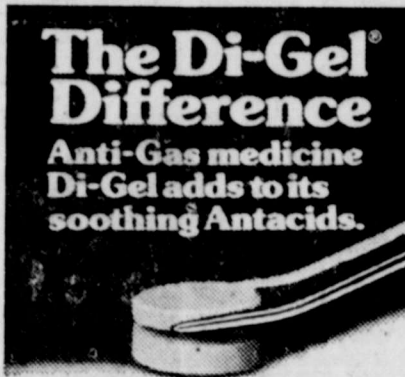
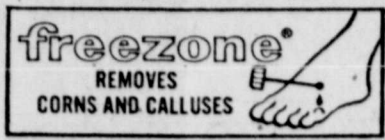

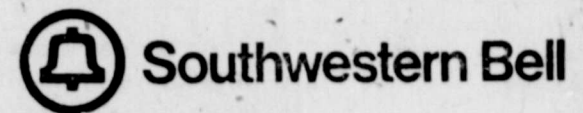

Speaking of the kitchen, you can save gas by planning oven meals around dishes that can be cooked at the same temperature. When using top burners, tailor the flame to fit the pan.

Get your house in order. Make sure you have six inches of insulation in the attic. And check regularly to make sure it hasn't settled. Make sure your exterior walls are insulated. Check the weather stripping around doors and windows, and make sure they stay closed when the heating or air conditioning is on.

No single one of these tips will save you an immense amount of money, but each one helps a little. Add all those little savings up, and it could make a big difference.
