SCREWORM CASES INCREASING IN COKE

Coke County screwworm cases for the year jumped to a total of 21 with four new cases scattered over the county last week.

James Arrott reported one case from his place four miles southwest of Tennyson; a second case from Bryan Gartman eight miles northwest of Robert Lee. The other two cases were from the same proximity between Bronte and Blackwell. O. B. Raper sent in a positive case from his place four miles south of Blackwell and the Chadbourne Ranch, 12 miles north of Bronte, was the site of the other confirmed screwworm case.

During the previous week two cases were reported on the Arledge Ranch 12 miles north of Robert Lee. The other two cases were found in calves by Douglas Gartman, five miles north of Robert Lee, and by David and Joe David Key, from their place 12 miles west of Robert Lee.

Help from cool weather is still several weeks away. All operators are encouraged to check animals regularly for signs of screwworms. Newborn calves and lambs seem to be favored target and need special attention.

Recently, a new and larger sterile fly plant was opened in Mexico. With the addition of this new plant and by making a more narrow buffer zone in Mexico, the program officials hope to eradicate the screwworm from the United States. They anticipate, on the present schedule, eradication will take five to seven years to accomplish.

the Department of Internal Medicine with the Nguyen Van Hoc Hospital in Gia Dinh and six months in the 127-bed St. Pierre Hospital in Saigon.

Steers Fall to Junction, 42 - 12

The record book will show 42 to 12 in the scoring, but 35 to 12 is the real score but whatever, it's a different story, and it's not going to change. The Steers lost another toughie in this 9-A district that produces many outstanding teams. This game proved nothing for the Junction Eagles, but for the Steers it proved they are guilty for the class of ball they are having to play and you have to hand it to them, they are young men with a certain amount of pride that will take on just about anybody. Oh, yes does anybody know a good clock man?

1st Quarter

The Eagles received the opening kickoff and quickly made their presence known, as their outside speed ate up the yardage and in 3.1st downs they scored from the 9 yd. line starting from their 49. The extras were good and it was 7 to 0. The Steers received at their 9 yd. line and Allen returns to the S 32. Junction holds for little gain and Gartman punted to the J 15 with no return. Then they do it again as they sweep this end and then he other end and they score again on a 23-yard pass play. The extra was good and it is 14 to 0. Junction kicks off again with Allen returning to the Steers 25. The Steers are penalized which puts them in a hole but they make a 1st down at the S 38. Junction then halts the Steers and Gartman punts to the Junction 20. Junction then tries their pass again and Terry Ross picks it off at the 33 and with some good moves and some good block-

ing, he returns it all the way for 6 points. The extra failed and it is now 14 to 6. The Steers kickoff to the Junction 15 with a return to the J 36. Then Junction displays their speed with a 1st down on the Steers 35, then on the next play they go all the way to score. The extras are good and it is 21 to 6. Junction kicks off to the Steers 5, with Ross returning to the Steers 29 as the 1st Quarter ends.

2nd Quarter

The Steers get a 1st down on the 43. Then Junction intercepts a pass at their 35. Then Anthony Percifull intercepts one of their passes at the Steers 13. The Steers make a big 1st on a 30 yard pass. Baker to Sawyer and they are moving. But fate steps in and the Steers fumble and Junction recovers at their own 49. The Steers then hold for little gain and Junction punts to the Steers 37. The Steers can't move much either and they punt to the Junction 30. Junction makes a couple of 1st downs as the first half ends.

3rd Quarter

The Steers receive the 2nd half kickoff with Anthony Percifull returning it to the 43. Junction holds for no gain and they take over on downs. First play they bust through and speed prevails as they score again. The extra was good and it is now 28 to 6.

Junction kicks off to the Steers 5 with a return to their 29. The Steers get a 1st down at their own 44, but then Junction intercepts again at their 47. The Steers then hold on downs and the Steers take over. The Steers can't move and

they punt to the Junction 20 with a return to the Junction 49. They then start another drive moving to the Steers 9 where they fumble and Clay Allen recovers for the Steers. The Steers can't move the ball and the punt attempt is fumbled and they get the ball at the 9. In three plays Junction scores again. The extra was good and this made it 35 to 6.

Junction kicks off to the Steers 8 with Clark returning it to the 33. But Junction gets the ball back at their own 49 and in one play the 3rd Quarter ends.

4th Quarter

The Steers hold at the Junction 45, the punt attempt was blocked and the Steers have it on the Junction 36. Junction holds for little gain and Gartman punts to the Junction 6 where they fumble and Randy Bessen recovers for the Steers. Then the Steers carry it in from the 3 as Mickey Baker pounds it over for another 6 points. The extra failed to make it 35 to 12.

Buddy Wallace kicks off to the Junction 15 with a return to the 38 where a hard hit jars it loose and Bessen gets another fumble. Then the Steers make a 1st down at the Junction 20, but Junction then holds and they start their final drive as time is ticking away.

They drive all the way to the Steers one yard line as the time runs out, but hold it they get another play, and they score from the one. The extra kick is good and the score is 42 to 12. I guess?

Dr. Do was drafted in March of 1966 to the Quang Tin Providence. He served as commanding officer of a 1-00 bed field hospital. Medicine Chief and Chief of Staff for the 450 bed Province Hospital, attending physician for the government employees of the Province Headquarters, Province Public Health Officer (400,000 inhabitants), Expert for the local court on medical legal expertise and worked daily for five years with the U. S. Navy Milhap Team.

Dr. Do received numerous decorations while serving in the service, including three Purple Hearts. He is the founder of the Public Library in Quang Tin and has written and published several medical papers.

In 1970, Dr. Do moved to Saigon where he taught in the Military Medical School, was Chairman of Internal Medicine and Chief of Staff, Medical Battalion Commander for 400 cadets, worked part time for the civilian medical school (American built and supervised medical school) as chief of the laboratory in the Department of Parasitology and Mycology. In 1972 he resumed private practice in Saigon and remained there until he came to the United States.

Dr. Do came to the United States in May of 1975, working for a time with Neil C. Christopher, M.D., of Gunterville, Ala. Since that time he has been practicing GP in the Motley General Clinic in Matador.

In January of this year Dr. Do passed the ECFMG in Dallas with the high score of 465. Passing score is 290. In June he took the FLEX in Houston and received his full license to practice surgery and medicine from the Texas State Board of Medical examiners.

Dr. Do and his wife, Simone, have five children, three boys and two girls, ranging in age from 3 to 10. Plans were made earlier this week for moving Dr. Do and his family to Robert Lee on Wednesday.

Mrs. W. T. Stovall is a patient in the Sterling City Hospital.

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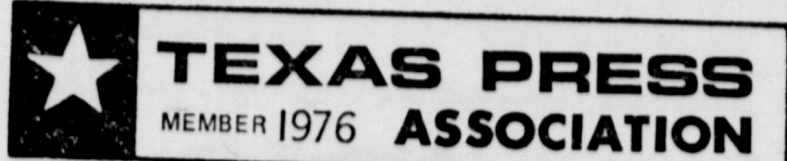
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Billy Wayne Roe Wins European Trip

(Editor's Note: Billy Wayne Roe, sales manager for Ivey Motor Co., recently won a trip to Europe for his sales accomplishment record, based on new car and truck sales. The article below was written by the Roes, highlighting their memorable experiences. We found the article to be extremely interesting and believe you will enjoy it too.)

After a short flight to Dallas - Fort Worth via Trans-Texas from San Angelo, we joined the Ford group for our charter flight aboard Pan Am World Airlines to Nice, France. We departed D-FW at 5:10 p.m. and flew in stormy weather to Philadelphia where we stopped for fuel. We were to fly direct from Philadelphia to Nice but on the trip from Dallas we cracked a windshield on the plane and had to fly at low altitudes to JFK Airport in New York to change planes. After a two hour lay over in NY, we were finally on our way. We arrived at Cote de Azil Airport at Nice France at 1:30 p.m. or 6:30 a.m. Texas time on Friday, the 10th, and were taken to buses for a 45 minute trip to Monte Carlo, Monaco. Everything is built on sheer cliffs from the top of the mountains to the turquoise blue Mediterranean. On arrival at the fabulous Loews Monte Carlo Hotel we were given a champagne welcome and assigned our rooms.

Everyone was so exhausted from our flight that we all went to our rooms and slept until dinner in Le Grand Salon in Loews Hotel. After dinner we milled around the Casino and watched everyone lose his money. We noticed that the roulette wheel and table were sporting American money.

Everyone retired early due to an early flight to Paris on Saturday morning. We arrived at Orly Airport in Paris and boarded buses

for our tour of the grand city. We saw the Notre Dame Cathedral, the Louvre Museum, Eiffel Tower, Arc de Triomphe, and the famous Moulin Rouge. We had lunch at La Mere Catherine Restaurant on Artists' Square. It was raining and cold, so everyone went shopping for coats, sweaters and umbrellas.

In the afternoon we were taken to the Nikko Hotel to freshen up, then boarded the Bretagne - a dinner boat-for dinner and a cruise down the Seine. While floating down the Seine we passed many beautiful sites, ornate bridges, centuries old buildings, The Eiffel Tower, which by the way, is chocolate brown, and a copy, seven times smaller, of the Statue of Liberty.

After dinner we boarded buses for return to the airport for flight back to Nice. Two buses went to Orly and two to DeGaulle. We went to DeGaulle and were detained two hours due to the hijacked plane from Chicago being on the runway. We finally arrived at our hotel in Monte Carlo at 1:00 a.m. One of the most spectacular sights on the trip to Paris was the French Alps looming above the clouds, all covered with snow. Sunday we had a free day so most of us slept until noon. Then we had lunch and rented a car with a couple from Austin and toured Nice, EZE and Monte Carlo. We shopped in a fortress in EZE that was centuries old, and had something to drink at a sidewalk cafe in Nice.

One of the most beautiful sights in Monaco is the palace where Prince Ranier and Princess Grace live high on a mountain looking down on the city of Monte Carlo.

Sunday night we had a Mystery Dine Around, where they took three buses and each group went to a different place to eat. We were in the group that went back to the fortress in EZE and climbed to the top of the fortress to a restaurant called Chateau de la Chevre d' (or The Golden Goat), where we had a typical French dinner and cheese tasting party.

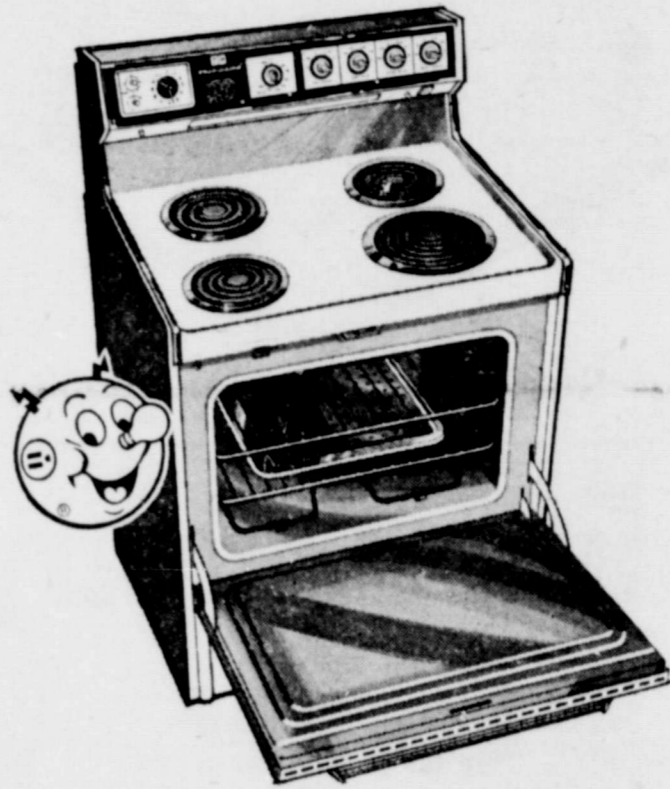
A meditation "We See People," was led by Mrs. Herford.
