Historical Group Receives Award

The Coke County Historical Commission (CCHC) received a Distinguished Service Award (DSA) at the 1976 Annual Historic Preservation Conference, held in Galveston Oct. 29 and 30.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, CCHC chairman, accepted the DSA during awards ceremonies of the conference, which was cosponsored by the Texas Historical Commission and Texas Historical Foundation.

The state commission (THC) administers the DSA program, designed to recognize those county historical commissions who have made outstanding local contributions to preservation within the past year.

In presenting the award, THC Chairman Mrs. Wesley B. Blankenship cited the CCHC for, among other accomplishments, collecting histories of county families and preparing them for publication in the forthcoming HISTORY OF COKE COUNTY.

Commissions receiving the DSA must meet 16 different requirements. These include presenting at least six programs on local history to other civic groups; sponsoring or helping plan a minimum of three guided historical tours; conducting at least one phase of an oral history program; and completing at least one facet of a significant historic preservation project such as a restoration, a written county history, or the creation of county archives.

The THC presents Distinguished Service Awards annually to all county commissions who achieve these standards. The group also sponsors other competitions for the county organizations, including "Best Program of Work," "Best Newsletter," and "Outstanding County Chairman."

Wilson Resigns Principal's Job

Mr. Clifford Wilson, principal of Robert Lee Elementary School since 1969, has resigned to enter into full-time ranching. He began teaching and coaching in Rankin in 1960 and came to Robert Lee as a coach and teacher in 1965. A graduate of San Saba High School, Wilson holds a B.S. in Education degree and a Masters in Education degree from Southwest Texas State Teachers College in San Marcos. He also did undergraduate work at San Angelo College.

Jimmy Bickley, school superintendent, said "The school board accepted his resignation with regret. I, along with the board, appreciate the contribution he has made to our school. We wish him well in his endeavors."

Mr. Wilson's resignation letter stipulated his date of resignation being as soon as we could find a

replacement. We were fortunate to employ Mr. William Hood, a former graduate of Robert Lee High School, a graduate of Angelo State University, who holds a master's degree from A & M University, and he has done graduate work at Angelo State and at the University of Texas at El Paso. He has taught mathematics, coached, and served as assistant principal in the San Angelo School System since 1970. He has served as assistant principal at Lincoln Junior High, and Lee Junior High for three years.

Mr. Hood will begin his duties Monday, November 8th, if arrangements for replacements can be completed in the San Angelo School System. Mr. Wilson will complete his duties Friday, November 5th.

Democrats made a clean sweep from the top to the bottom of the ballot in Coke County, in the general election held Tuesday.

In what was termed as a record turn out, a total of 1389 ballots were counted in the five voting boxes and in the absentee box. Coke County voters approved both of the Constitutional Amendments on the ballot. Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale received 844 votes in their race for President and Vice President, while Republican incumbent President Gerald R. Ford and Robert Dole received 517 and American Party candidate Thomas J. Anderson and Rufus Shackelford received 25. Eugene McCarthy, Independent, received 4 and Socialist Workers Party, Peter Camejo and Willie

SERVICES HELD FOR B. C. MAXWELL

Services for B. C. "Bun" Maxwell, 92, were held Monday, November 1, in the Robert Massie Riverside Chapel in San Angelo, with the Rev. Lyle Pierce, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Robert Lee, officiating. Burial was in the Evergreen Cemetery in Ballinger under the direction of Robert Massie Funeral Home.

He died Saturday, October 30, in the West Coke County Hospital in Robert Lee.

Mr. Maxwell was born January 18, 1884, in Martin, Tenn., and was a retired pharmacist. He moved to Ballinger with his family June 4, 1898 and had lived and operated drug stores in Paint Rock for 30 years, in Monahans for 14 years and in Pecos for 14 years.

He attended the Baylor School of Pharmacy in 1912 and was presented with a citation for 50 years of Pharmacy work in 1972. He also had farming and ranching interests in Concho and Tom Green Counties.

Survivors include a daughter, Dorothy Maxwell of Pecos, two nephews and three nieces.

Senator Lloyd Benson, the Democratic incumbent, won easily in his race with 980 votes compared to Republican Alan Steelman's 364. American Party, Marjorie P. Gallion, 7 and Socialist Workers Party, Pedro Vasquez, 0.

In the race for a Congressional seat, from the 21st District, incumbent Democrat Robert "Bob" Krueger was the winner with 1158 votes in Coke County compared to Republican candidate, Bobby A. Locke, 171. Raza Unida Party, Ramon Carrillo, 3. American Party, Ed Gallion, 4. In a bid for Railroad Commissioner, Jon Newton won handily with 1053 votes compared to his opponents, Walter Wendlandt, 219, Fred Rodriguez Garza, 4, and Pat O'Reilly 0.

The Robert Lee Steers will be idle this week following their 12-2 loss to Menard last Friday night. The Steers close out the season November 12 when powerful Wall comes to town.

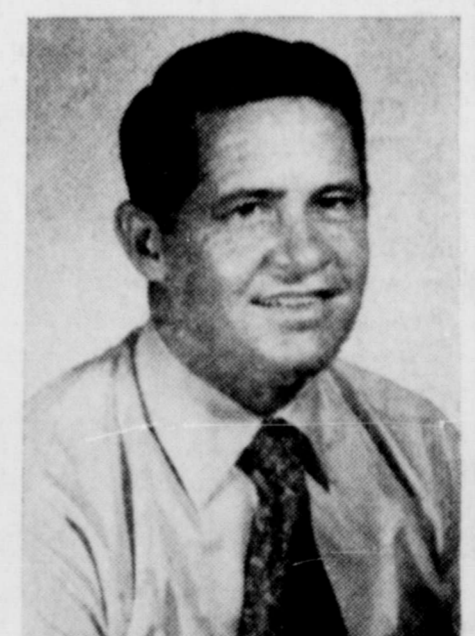
The Steers are in District 9-A cellar following last week's defeat. They are 0-5 and are 2-7 for the season.

RAINS COVER COKE CO.

The front which moved through our area last week left Coke County soaked with moisture. Rains amounting up to 4 inches were reported over most of the county. Three days of wintry skies, chilling winds and slow rain blanketed Robert Lee from Wednesday through Friday of last week.

August sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Coke County were reported today by County Bond Chairman G. C. Allen. Sales for the eight-month period totaled \$17,233 for 38% of the 1976 sales goal of \$45,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$26,412,532, while sales for the first eight months of 1976 totaled \$188,888,470 with 69% of the yearly sales goal of \$272.4 million achieved.

MORE SCREWORM CASES REPORTED

The screwworm threat no doubt has been lessened by the onset of cooler weather, but six additional cases have been confirmed in Coke County during the past 10 days. The yearly total for the county now stands at 48 cases, most of which came in October.

The most recent cases were reported by Paul Burns, from his place on the north side of Lake Spence; Roy Tinkler, 12 miles southwest of Robert Lee; and Bobby Roberts, from his place six miles

south of Robert Lee. Also, Bryan Gartman, from eight miles north of Robert Lee near Sanco; Barton Waldrop, from his place near Hayrick; and one case by Bill Blair from his place 3 1/2 miles west of Bronte.

The threat of screwworms has been lessened by the cool weather, but probably not stopped. During the warm part of the day temperatures will climb high enough to activate insects. We still need to watch for and report possible screwworm cases.

The members of Congress have declared that a potential public health emergency exists; and taxpayers' monies have been appropriated for the development and distribution of an effective vaccine against "swine" influenza.

The Texas Department of Health Resources and the First Lady's Volunteer Program, Office of the Governor, have joined in a cooperative effort to deliver effectively the "swine" flu vaccine to every Texan desiring protection.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the months of October, November and December, 1976, as

INFLUENZA IMMUNIZATION MONTHS

in Texas, and urge all Texans to avail themselves of the free protection from the flu.

In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 14th day of October, 1976.

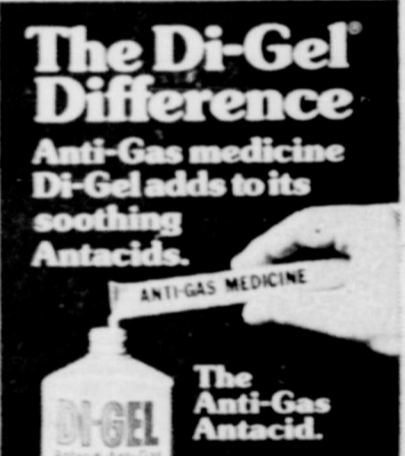
