





Cold Weather **Aids in Control Of Screwworms**

Cold November weather added another force to efforts being made to educe the massive screwworm population that tormented Texas livestock this year. Coke County escaped the month of Nov. with no new screwworm samples being submitted, but Dr. M. E. Meadows, director of the Screwworm Eradication Program reported that 115 Texas counties submitted 1,988 samples,

bringing the year's Texas case total to 29,070. Coke county reported 49 cases for the year.

With the cold weather forcing the live flesh eating parasites back into the warmer area of South Texas, the program is concentrating its efforts on eradicating the pest in this smaller area with most of the program's sterile flies being distributed in the reduced area, while flies produced in Mexico are being distributed adjacent to the Texas border.
