1. Now comes Mrs. M. C. Berry, a widow, Mrs. Pearl Gaines and husband, Wiley Gaines, George W. Berry, Ode P. Berry, Grover C. Berry, R. L. Berry and Harry Berry, who reside in Callahan County, Texas, hereinafter called plaintiffs, complaining of William Bate Berry and the unknown heirs of William Bate Berry deceased, Andrew Jackson Berry and the unknown heirs of Andrew Jackson Berry deceased, Lizzie Mankins and the unknown heirs of Lizzie Mankins deceased, Margaret Makenson and the unknown heirs of Margaret Makenson deceased, Mattie Pope and the unknown heirs of Mattie Pope deceased, Sarah Hall and the unknown heirs of Sarah Hall deceased, Jane Hall and the unknown heirs of Jane Hall deceased and Eunice Johnson and the unknown heirs of Eunice Johnson deceased, hereinafter styled defendants, the residence of each and all of said defendants herein named are to these plaintiffs unknown; and for cause of action, plaintiffs represent to the court:

2. That on or about the 1st day of January, A. D. 1927, plaintiffs were lawfully seized and possessed of the following described land and premises, situated in Callahan County, Texas, to-wit: The North Half and the S. E. 1/4 of Section No. 106 State School Lands as surveyed by the B. B. B. & C. R. Co., Certificate No. 554, Abstract No. 1399, and containing 480 acres of land, more or less.

3. That on the day and year last aforesaid defendants unlawfully entered upon said premises and ejected plaintiffs therefrom, and unlawfully withholds from them the possession thereof, to their damage Five Thousand dollars.

4. That the reasonable annual rental value of said land and premises is One Thousand dollars.

5. That plaintiffs acquired title to the above described tract of land on or about the 31st day of July 1899 by inheritance by and through A. J. Berry, deceased, who was the husband of Mrs. M. C. Berry, one of the plaintiffs herein and who inherited an undivided one half interest in and to said land and premises as the community property of herself and deceased husband, A. J. Berry; and the other plaintiffs herein inherited the other undivided one half interest in and to said land and premises as children of said A. J. Berry, deceased, and that these plaintiffs have had, held,

occupied and been in possession of said land and premises continuously since on or about the 31st, day of July 1899.

Plaintiffs alleges and say that they have good and perfect right and title to the land hereinabove described, and that they have had and held peaceable and adverse possession thereof, using or enjoying the same and paying the taxes thereon and claiming under said law of inheritance for a period of more than five years after defendants' cause of action accrued, before the commencement of this suit.

Plaintiff further alleges and says they have had exclusive, peaceable and adverse possession of said land, cultivating, using or enjoying the same and paying all taxes thereon, continuously for more than ten years after defendants' cause of action accrued, before the commencement of this suit.

Plaintiffs further allege and say that they have had exclusive, peaceable and adverse possession of said land, cultivating, using or enjoying the same and paying the taxes thereon, continuously from the sovereignty of the soil, for a period of more than twenty five years after defendants' cause of action accrued before the commencement of this suit.

Plaintiffs therefore plead the five, ten and twenty five year statutes of limitation as against these defendants, and all other persons claiming said land and premises or any part thereof.

Plaintiffs further allege that said A. J. Berry, deceased during his life time was first married to Rhoda Berry in Williamson County, Texas, and from said union the above named defendants were born to said A. J. Berry and Rhoda Berry and that said Rhoda Berry died in Williamson County, Texas, some time during the year 1865; that there was a community estate between the said A. J. Berry, deceased and his wife, Rhoda Berry at the time of the death of said Rhoda Berry, which was situated in Williamson County, Texas; that after the death of Rhoda Berry, A. J. Berry married Mrs. M. C. Berry and removed with her to Callahan County, Texas, some time during the year 1881, and accumulated a community estate between himself and the plaintiff M. C. Berry, and thereafter wards to-wit, some time along about the year 1888, said A. J. Berry made a complete, full and final settlement of his estate with the children of his deceased wife, Rhoda Berry by turning over to his children, these defendants' all his interest in the community estate of himself and deceased wife, Rhoda Berry in Williamson County, Texas for their interest in his estate he then had and owned and might acquire until his death situated not only in Callahan County, Texas, but any other county where he might acquire title to lands and property; that this settlement was evidenced by proper written receipts and acquittances of title; that said settlement and partition by and between said A. J. Berry and his children by his deceased wife, Rhoda Berry, these defendants has been recognized as final and complete for more than thirty five years. That some time after said settlement and partition of the estate of A. J. Berry with the children of his deceased wife, Rhoda Berry, to-wit, on or about the 31st day of July 1899, A. J. Berry died in Callahan County intestate and no administration has been had upon his estate.

Wherefore premises considered, plaintiffs prays for citation in accordance with the law on each and every one of said defendants and that an attorney ad litem be appointed as provided by law, and that upon final hearing they have judgment against all or said defendants, and for title and possession of the said land and premises, and for their damages and for such other and further relief in law or in equity, general or special, to which they may show themselves justly entitled, either in law or in equity.

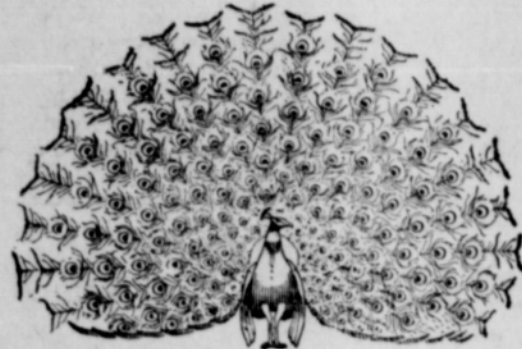

You are Hereby Commanded to summon George Mitchell by making publication of this Citation once in each week—for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in the nearest County where a newspaper is published, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Callahan County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Baird, Texas, on the Fourth Monday in February A. That defendant was a man of violent temper, who would lose all sense of reason and restraint and go into a fit of rage and anger without provocation, and during these fits of rage he would abuse this plaintiff most cruelly in that he would slap her in the face with his open hand, strike her with his fists, kick her on the legs with the tips of his shoes, and call her all manner of ugly and mean names, cursing her with the most opprobrious epithets. That on or about the 14th day of April, A. D. 1926, defendant came in late at night in a rage and fit of anger and he did there and then curse and abuse plaintiff, and struck her in the face with his open hand and also upon the nose with his fist, of all which circumstances showed an utter disregard of plaintiff's health if not her life. ## ABRAHAM LINCOLN

Tomorrow, February 12th, is the 118th anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln, sixteenth President of the United States. Born in Kentucky February 12, 1909; Died by the hand of a crack brained assassin April 15, 1865. The Military Department is very active and is offering to the young membership a military training almost equal to that obtained in barracks maintained by the various states.

# Callahan County Agent Shows Satisfactory Work In County For the Past Year

After a period of eight years without a County Agent, Callahan County points with pride to the work accomplished during the last year by Demonstration Agent A. M. Cooper. Mr. Cooper is a graduate of A. & M. College and his work has met with the approval of the farmers to whom he has rendered assistance. The work is firmly established in the county and the value of it is being more and more realized as it reaches more people over the entire county.

During Mr. Cooper's year's work he has made a total of 596 farm visits, has attended 797 office calls, 172 Telephone calls and written 992 letters. He has spent 201 days in the field and 75 days in the office. A total of 87 meetings and demonstrations have been held with an attendance of 1562. In his work he has traveled 7616 miles. The county this year used 350,000 pounds of commercial fertilizer or three times the amount ever used before. This fertilizer was used on the lighter lands of the county. Over 100 farmers used fertilizer on at least one crop that had never used it before.

As the Federal Land Bank recognizes an increased value of \$10.00 per acre on terraced land this county has profited considerably during the past year as 24 terracing demonstrations were given and a total of 2500 acres of land terraced.

As to Insect Control, work involving grasshopper, boll weevil and leaf worm was chiefly for field crops, but other work was done in this line in the orchards for the control of the codling moth and scale insects. 20,000 acres were poisoned for the grasshopper under the advice of the county agent and approximately 1000 acres for boll weevil and leaf worm. In approximately all cases a larger yield was obtained where the insects were controlled.

As to the improvement of grain, sorghum etc., 850 pounds of pure milo Kaffir, and Fetereta seed were obtained from the experiment stations and distributed among the farmers of the county. These seed were distributed to 30 farmers who reported an average of 11 bushels per acre increase. In the summer seed selection demonstrations were held in these fields.

Pure bred hogs and other live stock have been secured by the farmers of this county through the assistance of the county agent. He has cooperated in the organizing of a Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and through this organization 6000 sheep and goats have been placed on the farms and ranches of Callahan County.

Fourteen demonstrations in poultry culling was given during the year and over 10,000 head of poultry were culled by the agent. In addition to this work information was given concerning proper feeding rations and diseases.

He cooperated with the Chamber of Commerce in promoting a commercial hatchery of 12000 egg capacity which declared a twenty per cent dividend after first year's operation. This hatchery hatched over 35,000 chickens for the county and the result has been that another hatchery of the same size, (privately owned) was built at Clyde the last of the year. This fall 2000 head of poultry were vaccinated to immune them against diseases.

Alfalfa demonstrations have proven that alfalfa can be successfully grown in the county and this year more will be planted. Approximately one ton per acre was made where alfalfa was grown this year.

Five pecan work demonstrations were held during the year most of which work was budding.

Demonstrations in pruning and spraying were held over the county which included work on apples, grapes and peaches. A fruit and truck organization is being organized which will take up the work of standardizing the products and will increase the interest in pruning and spraying and foster better care of orchards. 75,000 new trees will be planted this winter.

At the West Texas Fair at Abilene, the only fair that Callahan County Exhibits, were shown, the county won Second Place in County Exhibits and Grand Champion Maize Price; Eight First Places, and Ten Second Places, in Agriculture products.

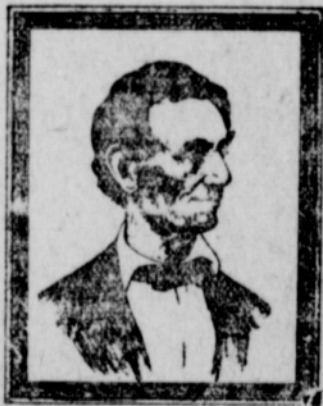

**Poor Man's Judge Bars  
Lawyers From Court**

Wichita, Kans.—A court in which no lawyer is admitted, except as a spectator, where there are no court attaches, no office equipment, no permanent records and which meets at the time and place most suitable to the litigants, is conducted here by David D. Leahy, veteran newspaper man.

The jurisdiction of the court is limited to the city, and to suits of money not to exceed \$20. Often cases involving less than a dollar are heard. Ordinarily after Judge Leahy has rendered a decision, payment is made on the spot. When a judgment is not paid he sends notice of it to the clerk of the District court and it is executed in the same way as any other judgments are executed.

The court was created by the legislature. About ten years ago Judge Leahy took it over. In less than a year he has heard more than 300 cases and not one of them has been appealed.

**The Revival Field**

A Revival meeting will begin, at the Methodist Church, March 6th.

Sins of the people are bad. Sin will ruin any life Church member or non-Church member. All sin is a field and a reason for a revival. But the first battle is within the Church, for a Church is a human organization Divinely instituted, and therefore is filled with imperfections. Also a vestige of the devil is left in most of us, and when we become careless about religious service and generally indifferent to duty, he gains control over us. Sin in the Church is the most hurtful of all sins, and the purpose of a revival is to purify the Church.

Indifference may be remedied by a revival. The average pastor had much rather fight open, outbreking sin, in the world, than fight indifference in the Church, for he has a better chance of winning the fight. Indifference is that dead thing that causes men to remain away from Church, cease to read the Bible, kills influence with friends and family, leads into sinful practices and makes the preachers' labors, oft times, appear useless. In olden times they stoned the prophets, today the prophets, is often crushed beneath a mountain of indifference.

Closely related to indifference is the disposition to regard Church obligations lightly. Some good business men are so careless about their Church obligations, that the same method—if pursued—would cause the failure of a pea-nut peddler. Covenants that we may make with God are not written contracts, but they are just as binding.

After bringing a renewal of faith on th part of the Church member, a revival is to cause sinners to repent and be converted. Truly the fields are white unto harvest, for we know men women and children who are lost. We know families that never come into contact with a Church. A revival is to reach the lost, and as we look about us we ought to pray "Lord, send a revival", and no doubt we should continue the prayer "Let it begin in MY heart."

I believe that we will agree that the modern social trend is toward the disruption of the home life. Social, pleasure and study contacts are rapidly becoming divorced from home life. It is not our purpose to discuss the causes, in this paper, but we observe that when father is immersed with business cares and mother is overloaded with an endless round of social obligations, the child is free to select companions, come and go as it may desire. We need a revival to save the home and the older generation, for if the home is disrupted and the younger generation lost we must accept the blame.

We need revivals to save the Sabbath. We maintain that when shows, business houses and organized amusements operate on Sunday it is un-Christian and un-American.

We need revivals to give us a vision of the needs of our neighbors. The lawyer said "Who is my neighbor?" In answering the question Jesus taught that the person who stands in need is our neighbor. His needs may be material or mental or spiritual. In considering his needs we must know that "man does not live by bread alone," but also by the Word of God.

The kingdom needs new blood, and the kingdom has always been built up by revivals. Look about you. Fully ninety of the Church membership was won during a revival.

The revival reaches out into the world of sin to cure it's wrongs; it brings light where there was darkness; it brings life where there was death; it reaches out and carries the message of love and grace to sad and lonely hearts; it's message is vital and it's work is glorious. Lord, send a revival.

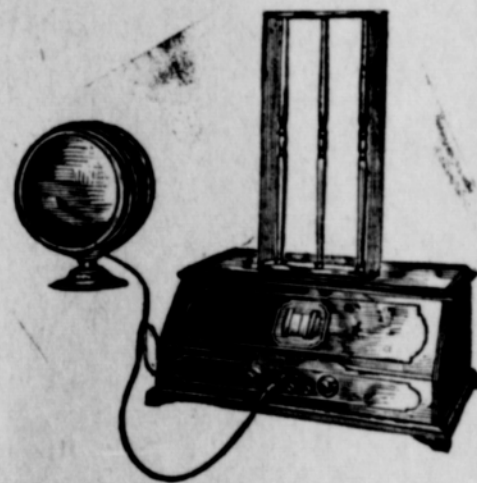
