Enough rain to give irrigation pumps a rest and bring green to dry pastures fell over Castro County during the week, principally late Monday when every part of the county received a share of the moisture in showers from half an inch to more than

SCATTERED showers over the weekend preceded the more inches or more.

The official Dimmitt total for the week measured at KDHN Radio Station north of the city, was 3.10 inches, more than the entire 1976 total of 2.56 inches up to last Thursday.


