## Farmers shut off wells

# At last, big rains come!

Enough rain to give irrigation pumps a rest and bring green to dry pastures fell over Castro County during the week, principally late Monday when every part of the county received a share of the moisture in showers from half an inch to more than three inches.

SCATTERED showers over the weekend preceded the more general fall Monday, giving almost all sections a total of two inches or more.

The official Dimmitt total for the week measured at KDHN Radio Station north of the city, was 3.10 inches, more than the entire 1976 total of 2.56 inches up to last Thursday.

The main effect of the rains for farmers, aside from the fact that "rain water is just better for crops," is that the moisture will make irrigation water go farther and save fuel, according to N.A. Bryson, district conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service office here.

IN SOME places enough rain has fallen to provide moisture for as much as 10 days, Bryson estimated, and even where farmers must continue to irrigate their crops they will not need as much water as through the early months of this year.

On ranchlands in the county, the grass is coming out where "up to now the pastures have had no grass," Bryson said. Runoff has not yet been sufficient to fill stock tanks in most places, he added.

Over the entire county, rain gauges showed their highest figures of the year. Farmers called the Monday showers "one of those million-dollar rains" because no damaging wind or hail accompanied the rain and it fell slowly enough to soak into the soil.

HEAVIEST rainfall was around Sunnyside, with more than 3 inches registered. At the John Gilbreath farm 12 miles south and two east of Dimmitt, a hard afternoon rain and lighter rain all night amounted to 3.4 inches.

However, the area of the downpour was limited. At the Jim Roberts farm 12 miles southeast of Dimmitt, the reading was 1 1/2 inch and L.B. Bowden reported an inch at his home 2 1/2 miles north of Sunnyside.

## AFS selects Dimmitt girl for summer in Colombia

Annita Parker, 17, will be the first Dimmitt youth ever to go to another country as an American Field Service exchange student.

SHE WILL leave June 16 for Colombia, where she will spend three months as a participant in AFS's "American Abroad" Summer Program.

Dimmitt has hosted many students from other countries since the early 1960s under AFS's School Year Exchange Program. But the community has never sent one of its own youths to another country.

The American Field Service provides programs to enable American youths to spend either three months or a full year abroad, as well as a summer "Domestic Program" in which students can live with families in other parts of the U.S.

MISS PARKER, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Parker, will live this summer with the family of Luis Alfonso Tascon-Valderrama at Valle, Colombia. Tascon-Valderrama is a bac-

terologist, and also owns a farm outside Valle, where he raises chickens and field crops.

He and his wife, Martha Ines Duran de Tascon, have four daughters—Martha, 17, Diana, 16, Ana, 15, and Claudia, 12—and one son, Luis, 5.

Ana, a high school junior, will be Miss Parker's AFS "Sister." She plays guitar—as do all her sisters—and she and her father are also amateur radio (ham) operators.

Diana, who is now completing her junior year, will be an AFS exchange student somewhere in the US next school year.

THIS WILL be the second overseas experience for Miss Parker. Born in Post, she spent 4 1/2 years in Denmark while her father was a Church of Christ missionary there; the family returned to the US when she was 6 years old.

Miss Parker was Dimmitt's delegate last February to the Presidential Classroom for Young Americans in Washington, D.C., selected by a Dimmitt High School faculty committee.

To earn her AFS "Americans Abroad" summer experience, she applied last winter to the Dimmitt AFS Chapter, which forwarded her application to AFS International in New York. She was one of two Dimmitt girls to apply for the "Americans Abroad" program; the other girl's application was rejected by the international office for medical reasons.

## Children's reading party on tap today

A "Summer Reading Party" for all Castro County youngsters will be held at 2 p.m. today at the Rhoads Memorial Library. Children may enroll in the library's "Ring a Bell '76" summer reading program during the party.

CHILDREN of all ages are welcome, Librarian Carlton Moyers said. The program is aimed mainly at pupils from kindergarten through sixth grade.

Party entertainment will include cartoons, puppet shows and games with prizes. Refreshments will be served.

The program is free and will last about two hours, Moyers said.

THE LIBRARY'S summer reading program is getting underway and will include special activities through the vacation months.

IN APRIL, Miss Parker was notified that she had been accepted and was guaranteed placement, and AFS International also granted her a \$350 scholarship to apply to the cost of the trip. She received her specific placement last week.

She will leave from Lubbock Airport June 16 for Miami, Fla., where she will undergo 1 1/2 days of orientation with other AFS exchange students who are bound for Central and South American countries. She will then be flown to Bogota, capital of Colombia, where she will take two more days of orientation on Colombian history, customs, etc., then will be taken to Valle to join her Colombian "family."

Miss Parker's trip is financed jointly by the Dimmitt AFS Chapter, her family and the AFS International scholarship. The Dimmitt AFS Chapter receives its funds from the United Way, the DHS student body and individual contributions.

"I'M GRATEFUL to all the people here who are helping send me," Miss Parker said. "I want to be a good representative for Dimmitt."

Ranked in the top 5% of her class scholastically, Miss Parker speaks both English and Spanish. She is a member of the girls' varsity basketball team, a cheerleader, clarinetist in the Bobcat Band and president of the DHS Lyre Club.

"Annita will be an excellent representative of our community and our nation," said Don Nelson, Dimmitt AFS Chapter president.

## Rites are held for Bob Roland

Graveside military rites were conducted at Castro Memorial Gardens Saturday afternoon for Robert T. Roland, 56.

MR. ROLAND died of a gunshot wound at 10 a.m. last Thursday. Justice of the Peace Marshall Young ruled that his death was a suicide.

An honor guard from the Nazareth American Legion Post performed the graveside rites. Rev. John Street, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiated.

A native of Michigan, Mr. Roland had been a Dimmitt resident since 1969. He was a feedlot worker and truck driver, and served for a time as steward of the Castro Memorial VFW Post. He had been living recently in Nebraska.

## Fireworks donations needed

# July 4 plans take shape

Fireworks will light up the sky in Dimmitt as the high point of a Bicentennial Fourth of July celebration if plans of the city's Bicentennial Committee materialize.

A HOLIDAY weekend with a pioneer dress display, time capsule burial, Sunday evening community supper followed by a church service, then a program including songs by the 76'ers and patriotic oratory is being planned, according to Linda Maxwell, general chairman of the Bicentennial Committee.

The big fireworks display Saturday night, July 3, will be

a salute to the nation's 200th birthday and will be financed by contributions from local residents.

A minimum cost estimate of \$1,200 has been given by the Barnette Fireworks Co. of Enid, Okla., which would stage the display with employees who meet state qualifications for operating such shows, Mrs. Maxwell said.

SEVERAL of Dimmitt's organizations have pledged support for the project but additional funds are needed, she explained. The Bicentennial Committee plans a "Community Firecracker Fund," and is asking families to donate part or all of the amount they would normally spend on fireworks for the Fourth of July.

Individuals and groups mak-

ing contributions will be recognized on a "Community Firecracker" page in the Bicentennial edition of the Castro County News, she continued, and any funds received above the minimum amount will go to make the show bigger and to cover incidental expenses.

THOSE WISHING to pledge any amount to the fund are asked to contact the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce office. The pledges must be paid before July 10, when the payment must be made to the fireworks suppliers.

Pledges to date total \$560, the chairman reported. Preceding the fireworks display Saturday, a ceremony will be held at 1 p.m. on the courthouse lawn to bury a time capsule, followed by a water polo match staged by the Dimmitt Fire Dept.

SATURDAY is designated as Pioneer Western Dress Day for all residents, and the Senior

Citizens Association has been asked to supply judges to determine the best costumes in the style worn by early settlers of Castro County.

The time capsule will hold items of county history or current interest supplied by local residents and designated for descendants of the donors, or for the county library or museum. The capsule is scheduled to be dug up and opened 50 years from now.

The Bicentennial Committee's Horizons division, headed by Linda Roberts, is in charge of the time capsule project. Sunday evening events, under direction of the Ministerial Association, will be held in the County Expo Center.

A community supper is planned, followed by a union church service. Songs by the community chorus, the 76'ers, and speaking in a patriotic vein are being arranged for the evening program.

## While school board and city feud

# Public swimming pool stays dry

The Dimmitt City Commission and the Dimmitt School Board are feuding over who should pay last year's operating deficit on the public pool at Dimmitt Middle School.

MEANWHILE, the pool remains closed. City commissioners feel the school board is trying to whip-

ple the city into paying the pool's operating deficit for last summer, and the school trustees charge that the city is welshing on a "gentleman's agreement" under which the pool has been operated for two decades or more. The issue has close friends on both governing bodies arguing with each other.

The school pool—the only public swimming pool in Dim-

mitt—normally would have opened the day after school was out for the summer.

BUILT on school property in 1946 with public contributions, the pool was donated to the school district—although school officials aren't sure they want to own it any longer.

Until last year, the city provided free water for the pool and the school district operated it, provided upkeep and hired the staff—usually coaches with student helpers. If there was a deficit at the end of the summer, the city would pay it.

"When E. B. Noble was the city manager, it was a swap-out deal under a gentleman's agreement that worked fine," School District Business Man-

ager Robert Ryan said. "The summer swimming program was a headache, but we really had no problem. And it was a good deal for the city, because it was a small enough cost for a summer recreation program."

LAST YEAR the cost to the city took a jump. At the school board's request, the city paid \$27,000 from Revenue Sharing funds to replace the pool's worn-out filter system and add a pumphouse and heater.

Meanwhile, between swimming seasons—and after a change of city managers—the city had raised its water rates and revised its water-charge policy.

Until April 1975, the school district paid a monthly flat rate



IN THE Railroad Commission runoff race, voters here gave Jon Newton a decisive 149-17 nod over Jerry Sadler. Newton won the nomination statewide.

Local Democrats bucked the state trend in the balloting for Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, Unexpired Term. Carl Dally received 92 votes to W.T. Phillips' 61 here, but Phillips won the statewide race.


COLE SHOWED Bull's Diabla, taking first for registered mares and then the grand championship. He also placed second in the Western Pleasure riding event.

The New York City school system has enough crayons on hand to last 84 years and enough chalk to last 20 years. It could be that this indicates why the Big Apple is in its current financial mess. Chances are that the school system would never have known about the crayon and chalk surplus but for the work of a group of volunteer businessmen that has been solving some of New York City's problems.

THUS FAR a task force has dug into New York's court system, human resources department, middle income housing projects and public school system. The result in savings to

the city is estimated at \$80 million. State and local governments have turned to business men to serve as full-time consultants and have hired professional consulting firms in the past, but the idea of mobilizing a small group of executives is relatively new. A volunteer task force of businessmen can make tremendous strides in solving complex management problems in government as well as business.

Corporations, facing ever-rising tax bills and anti-business sentiment, have a lot at stake in the program. If well-documented tax savings can be pointed out to taxpayers, then the thousands of volunteer man-hours are worth the time and money it costs the corporations.

A TASK force in Pennsylvania came up with 412 recommendations that would save the state \$370 million annually. A Colorado task force came up with a unique "sunset law" which requires certain state agencies to go out of existence unless they are periodically renewed by the state legislature.

A Massachusetts task force was instrumental in getting an "open budget act" passed which forces legislators to be completely open about the state's fiscal matter, instead of sweeping deficits under the rug.

The volunteer task forces can tackle just about any problem in government from simple cost-cutting to delicate policy issues. There are just three rules essential to being effective. Those are the support for the task force must be as strong during the investigation as it was at the beginning, volunteers must understand how bureaucracy works, the bureaucracy under study must be willing to yield.

### Store granted permit to sell beer and wine

County Judge Weldon Bradley granted a permit to the Circle K Corp. Monday to sell beer and wine at its Dimmitt convenience store.

THE LICENSE will be the first in the city for the sale of alcoholic beverages in a food store.

Bradley's ruling came after a three-hour hearing last Thursday, during which local liquor-store owners voiced opposition to Circle K's application. They

contended that their stores—which sell all types of alcoholic beverages, including beer and wine—could better control the sale of beer and wine to minors, since minors aren't permitted in a liquor store. Also, they maintained that convenience-store employees don't have the same interest in enforcing the law and protecting the store's license as do owners and employees of liquor stores.

Representatives of the Circle K Corp. argues that beer and

wine are sold in Circle K stores elsewhere without conflicts of violations of the state liquor laws.

After Thursday's hearing, Bradley took the matter under advisement.

"After much consideration and study of the evidence and facts presented at the hearing," he said Monday, "I have ruled in favor of the application by the Circle K Corp. for a wine and beer sales permit."

## Small Talk

The obituary page may seem a strange place to study social trends, but they do show up there as I've found in writing obituaries for newspapers in several different cities through the years.

ABOUT 10 years ago it occurred to me that an unusual number of old people, in their 80's and 90's were dying—three or four a week in a town not much bigger than Dimmitt.

Mentioned to a funeral director, that fact didn't surprise him at all. He asked if I hadn't noticed for a decade previously the decline in the number of deaths in the 55-75 age bracket.

All those people were living longer, he explained, and survived until they were past 80, which gave the country a larger over-80 population and the natural result, more deaths in that age group. Of course I knew modern medicine was lengthening lives, but hadn't thought it affected death statistics too.

LATELY IT has been noticeable in obituaries of older people that most of them had few children. Maybe one or two children survive, or none, but usually a good number of grandchildren.

These are the people who would normally have had children in the 1920's or 1930's, and as I remarked here lately, small families were the rule then.

The "baby boom" of World War II years and afterwards will show up in obituaries 20 years from now when aged parents die, survived by five or six or more children.

But grandchildren will likely be fewer since modern couples, products of the "baby boom" themselves, are choosing smaller families.







## Board urges doctor search

The president of the Castro County Hospital Board has called on all local residents—especially Chamber of Commerce members—to help find more doctors for Dimmitt.

METTING with Chamber of Commerce directors last Thursday morning, Dan Nelson said that the city's two physicians and the hospital board are trying to entice doctors to Dimmitt, but that they could use help in their search.

"Our present doctors are overworked," Nelson said. "The hospital needs the income that more doctors would provide. But mainly, the community needs the medical care."

Hospital Administrator Jack Newsom told chamber directors that other small cities have been disappointed after trying the more expensive methods of doctor-hunting—such as advertising in trade magazines, subsidizing medical students' schooling, building clinics, etc.

"Personal contact is the best way," Newsom said. "We need help from the Chamber of Commerce and from every citizen here."

He added, "Our facilities here are better than nearly any large city has. We're on computer, we've got the very latest heart and X-ray equipment, and so forth."

After hearing the plea from Nelson and Newsom, the chamber board agreed to help in the search.

"We can't presume to hire doctors or to bring in partners for our present doctors," Chamber Manager Elvon DeVaney said. "But we do want everybody who knows a doctor to invite him or her to come and look at Dimmitt."

The Flagg Grain Co. reported 2.4 inches Monday and about an inch and a half earlier. The Bob Anthony place five miles southwest of Flagg got an inch, the Charles Wales farm 15 miles southwest of Dimmitt .80 and

the Milton Bagwell farm to the north, an inch.

Kemp Farms measured 1.6 inches and George Sides reported 1.2. All those reporting from the area west of Dimmitt estimated the week's total at 3 inches or more.

### Water supply study gets committee O.K.

Congressman George Mahon, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, reports that in the Public Works Appropriations bill approved by the Committee last week \$150,000 is provided to begin a multi-year study of availability of ground water supplies in the High Plains area of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

THE TOTAL estimated cost of the study is \$1 million. Final House action on the measure is scheduled for mid-June.

Mahon points out that this new program in no way reduces

the urgency for a water import program, but could be significant in meeting short-term needs.

He continues to emphasize the urgency for a viable water import program and is working with West Texans and the State of Texas officials toward that goal.

ALSO IN the Appropriations Committee-approved bill is \$200,000 for advanced engineering work by the US Corps of Engineers on the flood control project at Plainview. The design work for the Plainview

project is now in its final stages, preliminary to a \$10 million effort to improve floodways and flood barriers within the city.

Mahon's committee also okayed an expenditure of \$60,000 for continued study of the salinity at Lake Meredith on the Canadian River, which is a major source of municipal water in the High Plains area.



## Anti-shoplifting course slated

A free course on how to control shoplifting and bad checks will be offered to retail business people here June 24.

CONDUCTED by the Small Business Administration, the course is co-sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and local law-enforcement agencies. It will begin at 8 p.m. and will last two hours.

## Swimming pool

water bills, the school board ordered an accounting of the school district's charges for operating and maintaining the pool.

IN SEPTEMBER, the school board submitted a financial statement to the city that showed an operating deficit on the pool of \$2,231.89—including the city's water bills and the school district's labor. The statement showed a starting surplus of \$672.28, receipts of \$2,587.70, and expenses of \$5,491.87.

The board requested the city to underwrite the deficit. The city commission refused. Later the school board asked the county to pay part of the deficit. The county commissioners' court also refused.

The pool problem has been brought up at the last two city commission meetings. Monday night the commission decided a realistic deficit on the pool for last summer would be \$1,500, and voted to pay \$750 of it.

"THE DIMMITT Independent School District won't open the pool until the city pays the deficit of \$2,231.89," Supt. Charlie White said Tuesday. "That is the school board's decision."

He added, "The school board doesn't mind sharing the responsibility for the pool—or didn't until the city started charging for meters and water, and refused to pay the 1975 deficit."

"The school board discussed this problem at length, and decided it was not the responsibility of the school district's taxpayers to provide the summer recreation program," Ryan said. "The trustees felt the school district was already going the second mile by lining up workers, providing dressing rooms, maintenance people, etc. The board ordered the administration not to open the pool until the city paid the deficit as it has done in the past."

"AFTER THE city commission spent \$27,000 for the filter plant and the school board says we're 'not cooperating,' I just can't see it," City Commissioner J. R. Brown said. "It appears to me that the pool is in the same category as the football field and the basketball courts."

Brown added, "I don't want to be hard-nosed about it and refuse to give any support in the future. But I don't think the city should necessarily underwrite the entire amount. I don't think there was any binding agreement that the city would pick up all of the deficit. After spending \$27,000 last year and then offering to put up \$750—which we figured was about half of the actual deficit—then I feel we're doing our part on it."

Meanwhile, the pool remains empty, and closed.

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
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
