

Hart And Nazareth School Trustees Elected Saturday

School trustees were elected in Hart and Nazareth school districts in balloting Saturday.

Nazareth School District cast 117 votes. Two trustees elected were Ed Raemakers and George H. Book. Defeated were Elmer Klemm and Albert Gerber. Book was reelected and Raemakers took the place of the retiring board member, Greg Hoelting.

Both incumbents were defeated in the Hart school trustee election, while two new candidates took their places. Winning posts were E. R. (Bob) Bennett, a farmer and merchant, and J. N. Kendrick, also a farmer. Bennett took 178 votes to lead the ticket, while Kendrick had 138.

Defeated incumbents were C. B. Martin, 65; and Waymon Foster, 69 votes.

County School Trustees Elected In Saturday Voting

LABOR DEPARTMENT APPROVES FEDERAL GRANT FOR PROJECT

Word was received Monday afternoon by The News from Senator Ralph W. Yarborough and Congressman Walter Rogers that the Labor Department approved the proposal for a federal grant to set up a Neighborhood Youth Corps project in the Dimmitt Independent School District.

Under the project, 50 boys and girls between ages of 16 and 21 will be given help in finding part-time jobs with the school district or some other nonprofit organization. The work will be designed to help the students remain in school or to learn

a profitable skill. Purposes of the Work-Training program as stated in the application are: to provide useful work experience opportunities for youths, ages 16 through 21, who are drop-outs or potential drop-outs from school; and to provide opportunities for these youngsters to earn money to sustain themselves in school.

The plan approved by the Labor Department will give \$13,060 in federal grants to Dimmitt Independent School District for this project. Total cost of the project is \$16,755.

Superintendent Paul Hilburn and the four principals of Dimmitt Schools originally asked for a federal grant of \$18,880 toward a total cost of \$22,991. The request was sent to

Mize commented, "About the only department lacking was the Department of Theology."

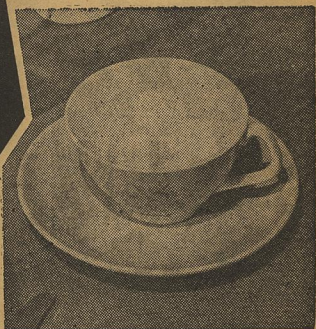

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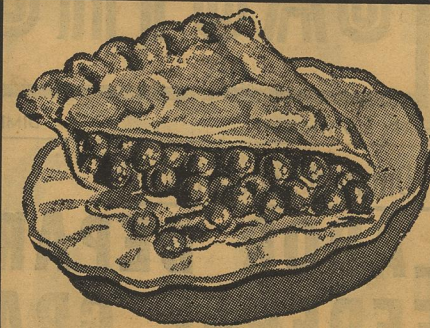

SULPHUR REACTIONS IN THE SOIL

Sulphur is normally added to a soil as either elemental sulphur or in the sulphate form. The reactions of these two sources of sulphur in the soil are somewhat different.

Elemental sulphur when added to the soil is reacted upon by sulphur-oxidizing bacteria in the soil. These sulphur bacteria use the elemental sulphur as a source of energy.

The initial step in the oxidation of sulphur is usually the longest. The first compound formed is sulphur dioxide which is subsequently oxidized to the sulphate or SO4 form. The speed of oxidation of sulphur will depend on the fineness of the grind of sulphur, the presence of the bacteria and the amount of moisture and level of temperature. The activity of sulphur-oxidizing bacteria is similar to most other bacteria in that their activity will increase with increasing temperature and with adequate moisture.

When the elemental sulphur has been oxidized to the sulphate form it then reacts with calcium in the soil to form a calcium sulphate similar to the reactions of other active sulphate forms which are applied. When active sulphate forms are applied, the sulphate will undergo a chemical reaction to form calcium

Dr. Charles Vandiver, First Baptist Church, Dimmitt led the singing in a revival held March 28-April 4 at Summerfield Baptist Church.

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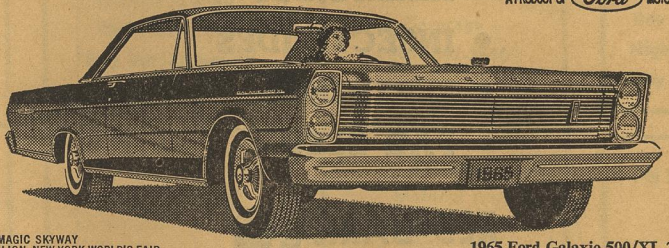
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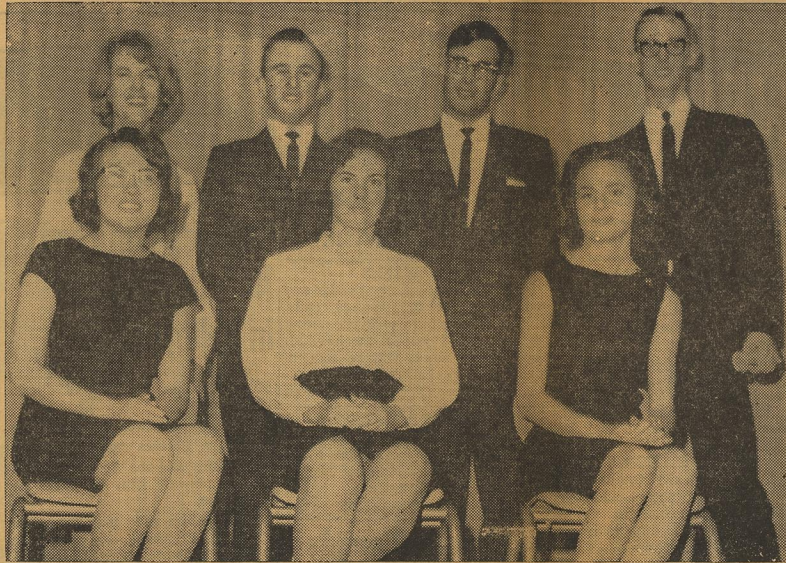
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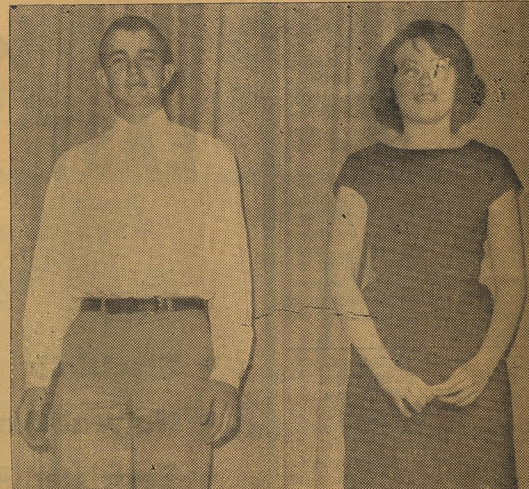

Screwworm Plan Needs To Be Kept In Operation Here

Texas farmers and ranchers have been asked to raise \$300,000 to keep the Screwworm Eradication Program in operation through June.

Leo Witkowski, Chairman of the Castro County Animal Health Committee, stated that the goal for Castro County is \$100. He pointed out this goal can be attained if every farmer and rancher will contribute on the basis of 10 cents per animal unit.

Livestock producers can leave their contribution at the First State Bank in Dimmitt.

Necessity for additional producer funds was announced earlier this month by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation which, along with the State of Texas and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, is conducting the eradication program.

The program needs approximately \$1.1 million to operate through April, May and June. Leo Witkowski explained, "The Texas Legislature has already voted \$250,000 and Congress is expected to appropriate \$50,000 for the three month period. These government funds cannot be spent, however, unless producer money is also made available the county chairman stressed.

The screwworm fly has been eradicated from the Southwest, but a barrier of live, sterile flies must be maintained along the U. S.-Mexico border to prevent fertile flies from Mexico re-infesting the U. S. Approximately 100 million sterile flies will be needed each week during April, May and June. If funds are not made available, the Southwest stands to lose the gains that have already been made.

Charles Hottel, county agricultural agent, said in the three years the program has been in existence, savings of more than \$168 million have been realized by producers. He said no screwworm infestations were detected in this county last year.

Congress is considering a USDA request for \$5 million which would make the program financed entirely by the Federal government beginning July 1.

The entire county depends directly or indirectly on farming for an income. Two rather distinct groups make up the community. Those who own or manage farms, businesses, industry and the professions. The second group include the semi-skilled and unskilled laborers. Employment for much of this low income group is seasonal. Children from this low income group are in need of a better health program, good food and clothing. The ability of this group to communicate is limited and they all lack a broad base for social adjustment.

Project Head Start is geared to help the children from about age 5 to 7 to adjust better to the school environment. The Board is asking the Federal Government for \$20,000 for 110 children to start this two month program next September.

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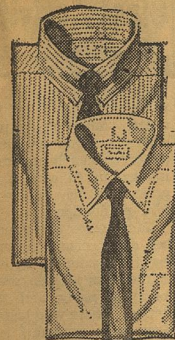
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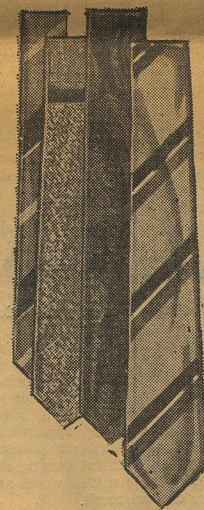

Senator YARBOROUGH'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Texans:

Assuming a continuation of current consumption and practices, there will not be enough usable water to meet requirements of the State of Texas by the year 2,000.

If we are to meet the challenge

that the demands for water in the near future will require, we must exert efforts not to waste time, talent, and finances, but must take immediate and appropriate steps to insure that effective measures are taken.

For this reason, I have been a firm supporter of the Water Resources Research Act, and have offered amendments to expand its coverage so that it can adequately fulfill its objectives.

Under this Act, Congress has authorized grant matching, and contract funds for assistance to educational institutions in addition to State land grant colleges, to competent private organizations and individuals, and to local, State and Federal agencies in undertaking special research in water resource problems.

The amendments which I have sup-

ported would raise the \$1 million ceiling per year to \$5 million, increasing by an additional \$1 million annually until it reaches \$10 million in the fifth year.

Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall has notified the Senate that in the short life of the Office of Water Resources, 36 research proposals have been received, totaling \$1,750,000. This experience indicates clearly that the original \$1 million ceiling is inadequate and the larger amount is justified.

In addition, this bill encourages research by water resources research institutes, since the previous provision restricting support from them has been deleted.

This proposal has widespread support in Texas. Six proposals from

the Texas Water Resources Center have already been submitted. These involve research into the water cycle, water and land management, and into qualitative, economic, and institutional aspects of water resources research.

The whole future of the Southwest part of the United States is vitally dependent on water. No sounder investment of public funds can be made today.

Folks please remember when reporting a fire to remain as Cool and Calm as you possibly can. Excitement can cause one to give incorrect and incomplete information to the operator. In reporting a fire give your name, the location of the fire, directions if out of town and nature of the fire if possible. Above all again, remain calm, give all information complete and correct as possible and do not hang up on the operator too soon. Your Fire Dept. can not give you fast, efficient service, if they are not given the correct location or directions to reach the fire. Lately we have noticed several people,

young and older alike, following the fire truck. Folks you are not only putting your own life and property in danger, but the lives and property of the firemen as well. Your Dept. being a volunteer Dept., most of the firemen use their own vehicles going to the fires. Folks you could also be guilty of hindering the Fire Truck and Firemen from traveling to the fire as fast and as safely as possible. You can be fined for following a fire truck or hindering operations at a fire. That friends is not too bad, but could you live with yourself in peace if you were responsible for an accident that took a life, or caused considerable damage to a friend or neighbors property. 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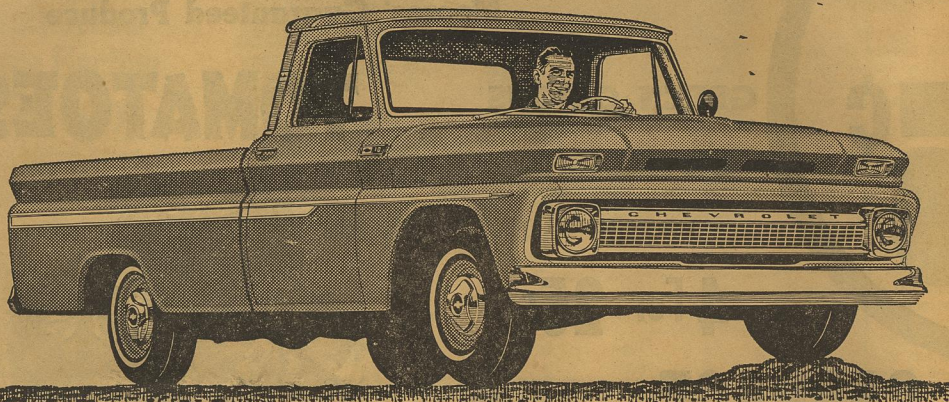

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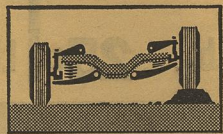
