The Homecoming game will be with the tough Hereford Whitefaces. A before-game barbecue sponsored by Dimmitt FHA Chapters will offer plenty of time for visiting, renewing acquaintances

and catching up on time lapses with old classmates. Barbecue will be from 5 to 7 p.m. in the High School cafeteria. Tickets are \$1.25 for adults and 75 cents for children under 12.

Other Friday activities include an afternoon tea at 1:30 p.m. for exes in the Homemaking Department. This tea is sponsored by Dimmitt Student Council.

Candidates are: seniors, Johanna Hastings and Claudio Benzizzi; juniors, Paralynd Render and Joe Bob Sanders; sophomores Sue Lust and Glenn Mundell; and freshmen, Steve Buckley and Vickie Lawson.

Big events are afoot for Dimmitt exes Saturday according to Kenneth Fulfer, president of Ex-Student Association.

The big day starts with coffee from 9:30 to 11 a.m. in the Homemaking Department sponsored by Dimmitt band. Exes will have this time for more visiting and

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H-D NOTES

Tell a teenage daughter she can't have anything to eat for 12 hours, and she'd accuse you of starving her. But this is what many young people are doing to themselves when they skip breakfast, says Luise Mason, Texas A&M University Extension foods and nutrition specialist.

Recent studies by the Department of Agriculture show that six out of every ten teenage girls and four out of every ten teenage boys studied have poor diets. This is because of their habit of skipping breakfast and of relying on snacks that do not contain enough vitamins, minerals, and proteins.

Calore counting girls often

skip breakfast thinking they will lose weight. However, during several Iowa breakfast studies, it was demonstrated that the omission of breakfast held no advantage in a weight reduction diet.

In fact, it is a disadvantage. Those people who omit breakfast accentuate their hunger and suffer a significant loss of efficiency in the late morning hours.

The following menu is an excellent example of a good, low calorie breakfast.

- 100 Calorie Breakfast Menu**
- 1/2 cup orange juice
 - 1 ounce hot or ready-to-eat cereal
 - 1 teaspoon sugar
 - 1 cup nonfat milk for cereal and beverage
 - 2 slices enriched white bread
 - 1 teaspoon butter

Deeply carved or heavily embossed ashtrays sometimes present a cleaning problem — but here's a way to beat it.

Protect them before they become a cleaning chore. The next time you wash one of the ornate receptacles, rub a few layers of hard paste wax into the crevices before you use it.

Then, as you go to clean it, just dump out the ashes and wipe the ashtray with a damp cloth. The wax will keep ashes from getting ground into the tray, and save you from having to scrub them out laboriously.

Fresh, juicy peaches are ideal for No-Bake Peach Pie, as suggested by the National Peach Council. To make: Prepare a 9-inch graham cracker pie crust. Chill one hour. Make vanilla pie filling from one package instant pudding and pie mix. Peel and slice 2 or 3 peaches. Fold into pie filling. Pour into pie shell. Just before serving, top with sweetened whipped cream flavored with 1/2 teaspoon almond extract.

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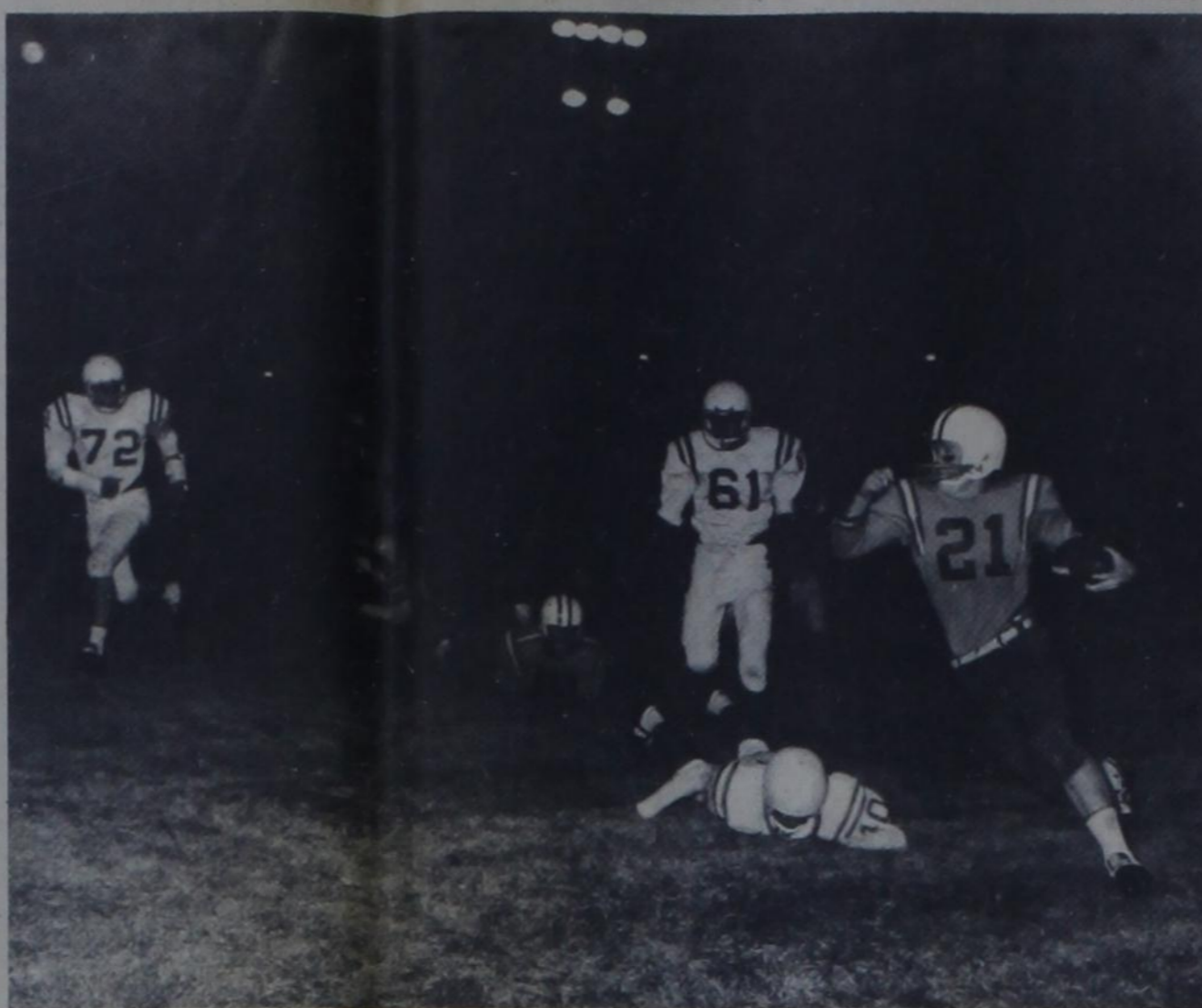

Hale Center Owls Outfly Lighter Bobcats, 34-6

The Hale Center Owls flew into town Friday and held their own Hootenanny as they romped over the Dimmitt Bobcats at Bobcat Stadium to the tune of 34-6.

It took Hale Center six minutes to go 61 yards after receiving the opening kickoff for their first touchdown. With quarterback Don Townsend at the helm and halfback Ronnie Sherrod and fullback Leroy Taylor doing the power work against the small fighting Bobcat line, Townsend finally plowed over from the 1 yard line after being held there twice. Ronald Burgess' kick for the extra points

was blocked by three rushing linemen.

Less than two minutes later, Hale Center scored again after they had recovered a fumble by Tony Young. Young was taking the handoff from quarterback Kent Lindsey and sweeping the left side of the line when he was hit hard and the fumble was recovered by Earl Hudgins on the Dimmitt 27 yard line. Townsend gained one yard on his first attempt over the tackle slot but on his second try, he went a little more to the outside and went all the way into the end zone for the

TD. Townsend ran the extra points over on the same play and Hale Center had a 14-0 lead in the first quarter.

Lindsey, Young and Danny Land kept trying to go through the tough defensive line of the Owls in the second quarter but the most they ever picked up in the first half on the ground was a 10 yard gain by Young.

Hale Center scored their third touchdown late in the second period on a sustained 62 yard drive. The big play in this drive was a third down pass play from Townsend to Larry Weil for 35 yards. Dimmitt was penalized 15 yards for piling on and then Ronnie Sherrod carried over from the two. Marvin Wilson tried to run the extra points over but the forward line of the Bobcats led by Beelee Goodwin, Mike Bruegel and Gene Carson stopped him before he could get back to the line of scrimmage. The half ended a few minutes later and Dimmitt at halftime had registered only one first down and was trailing in the game 9-0.

On the third play in the second half, Kent Lindsey pulled the outstanding play of the game. He

swept around left end and raced 15 yards before being hit by two Owl defenders and as he was going down, he lateralled to Tony Young who picked up another 30 yards before being run out of bounds. Dimmitt was penalized 15 yards for clipping but they still had their first down. A few minutes later, the Bobcats were forced to punt and Ronnie Kenmore put it into the end zone. Three plays later, Hale Center was forced to punt from their own five yard line. The ball slipped off the side of Sherrod's foot and went out of bounds on the Hale Center nineteen yard line.

It took Dimmitt seven plays to score from the nineteen. Young and Lindsey kept hitting the line but could not through to the goal line. On third down and the ball resting on the two yard line, quarterback Kent Lindsey crossed up the Owl defense and shot a two yard scoring pass to end Don Moore. Kenmore's attempt for the extra points went wide to the right and the score was cut to 6-20.

Kent Lindsey stopped the next Hale Center drive on a beautiful interception of a pass that saw Lindsey go high into the air to pull out of the receiver's hand. Dimmitt drove to the Hale Center 37 yard line but had to give the ball up on downs. From there, Hale Center drove 63 yards and consumed most of the third quarter to score their fourth touchdown. Fullback Leroy Taylor

went over from the 16 yard line after being hit twice behind the line of scrimmage. Townsend ran over the extra points to make the scoreboard read 6-28.

Dimmitt's offense never made another sustained drive in the fourth period but Hale Center

came back to score once more on a 52 yard pass from Townsen to Weil for 52 yards and a touchdown with only four seconds left on the clock. Halfback J. D. Davis tried to kick the points but it never got off of the ground. That made the final score 6-34.

Dimmitt fans had little to cheer about in the contest but the showing of quarterback Kent Lindsey and halfback Tony Young showed through even in defeat. The lighter 'Cats in the line and defensive secondary looked promising in their outing over the much heavier Owls. The middle of the defensive line was extremely tough on the Owls and all of their scoring drives came on sweeps and a pass.

TIPS for OUTDOORSMEN

Keeping Matches Dry

"A wet match is an abomination to both smoker and camp cook," so sayeth The Sportsman's Bible.

You can keep matches dry by daubing the heads with clear fingernail polish. This is much easier than dipping them in paraffin.

Fingernail polish waterproofs the matches even under trying conditions — and the polish adds to their combustibility.

Retouching Duck Decoys

When you touch up the worn paint spots on your decoys, be careful what sort of paint you use.

Flat paint is best, as it has no shine to scare away incoming flights. Use turpentine as thinner since linseed oil will tend to add shine.

After the paint dries, give the surface a few licks with fine steel wool to dull the paint even more.

Fisherman's Dilemma

How often have you heard it argued around camp whether, or not, a hook should be fully covered with the bait?

Leave the barb bare! A naked hook will no more scare away fish than will the hooks on an artificial lure.

Fact is you will snag more fish when the barbs are sharp and bare.

Stringing the Fly Rod

If you are one of those anglers who threads a fly rod by pushing the leader through the guides—don't!

An easier and quicker method is to double the line above the leader connection and shove this doubled line through the guides.

This way, the line won't be able to slip back and become unthreaded should you lose your grip on it.

Eating Your Fish Bait

Ever get hungry enough to eat a horse?

Well, should there be no

horses handy, you can eat your bait when appetite calls. That is, if you are lucky enough to be fishing with live crawfish.

Just take out half a dozen of the biggest ones (be sure they are alive) for each person to be fed, dump the crawfish in salted boiling water, and cook about 10 minutes.

You'll have the finest meal of pee-wee size lobsters you ever ate.

Don't be alarmed if the crawfish turn red when cooked—they should.

Tie Down Binoculars

Binoculars can make a lot of unnecessary noise bouncing around when you are walking afield.

Cut out this racket by taking an 8-inch strip of thin leather and punching small buttonholes at each end. When walking, button the glasses to your shirt buttons.

Then, just unbutton one end of the strap when binoculars are needed.

Painting Fisheyes

To make your bucktails and flies more lifelike, give them eyes by dipping a small nail head in white glossy enamel.

Touch each side of the lure at the spot where the natural eyes should be.

Let the enamel dry, then with the point of the same nail, put a dot of black for the pupil in the middle of each white spot.

Thermometers Aid Fishing

A smart fly fisherman adopts any method that promises to improve his chances for success. One wrinkle is the use of a thermometer to register water temperature.

For instance, in water 55° and warmer, use lightly submerged nymphs and flies. If the water is 45 to 55 degrees, use weighted nymphs and wets with streamers.

If colder than 45°, go way down deep with your flies, or spoons.

Stiffing Flames

The bane of a camp cook's existence is to have his fire burst into flames, when what he wants is hot coals.

Experienced cooks have found a way to instantly douse these unwanted flames.

They merely sprinkle a handful of common table salt over the fire and—presto—the flames disappear.

A Handy Gadget

When that old three-ring notebook gets too old for use, don't throw it away.

Use the back (with the three rings) to keep camp cooking tools together.

The rings will hold spoons, large forks, pancake turners, etc., handy and ready for instant use.

Straightening Nylon Leader

There are three good ways of straightening a coiled nylon leader:

1. Soak it in liquid detergent.
2. Dampen and stretch it between the hands (hold for several minutes stretched tight).
3. Pull it through a folded piece of rubber, or rubberized material.

Human Hand As A Ruler

How many times have you been in a situation where a ruler was needed, and none was handy?

Well, you'll never be in that fix again if you'll remember the distance between the tip of your little finger to the tip of your thumb. Span your hand on a ruler, by placing the tip of the little finger on 0, and the thumb tip on whatever numeral in inches you can reach.

Tip for Amateurs

If you are thinking of mounting a recoil pad on your gun butt, take this precaution against splintering the wood when the stock is sawed.

Wrap adhesive tape around stock at the cutting point and use a table saw.

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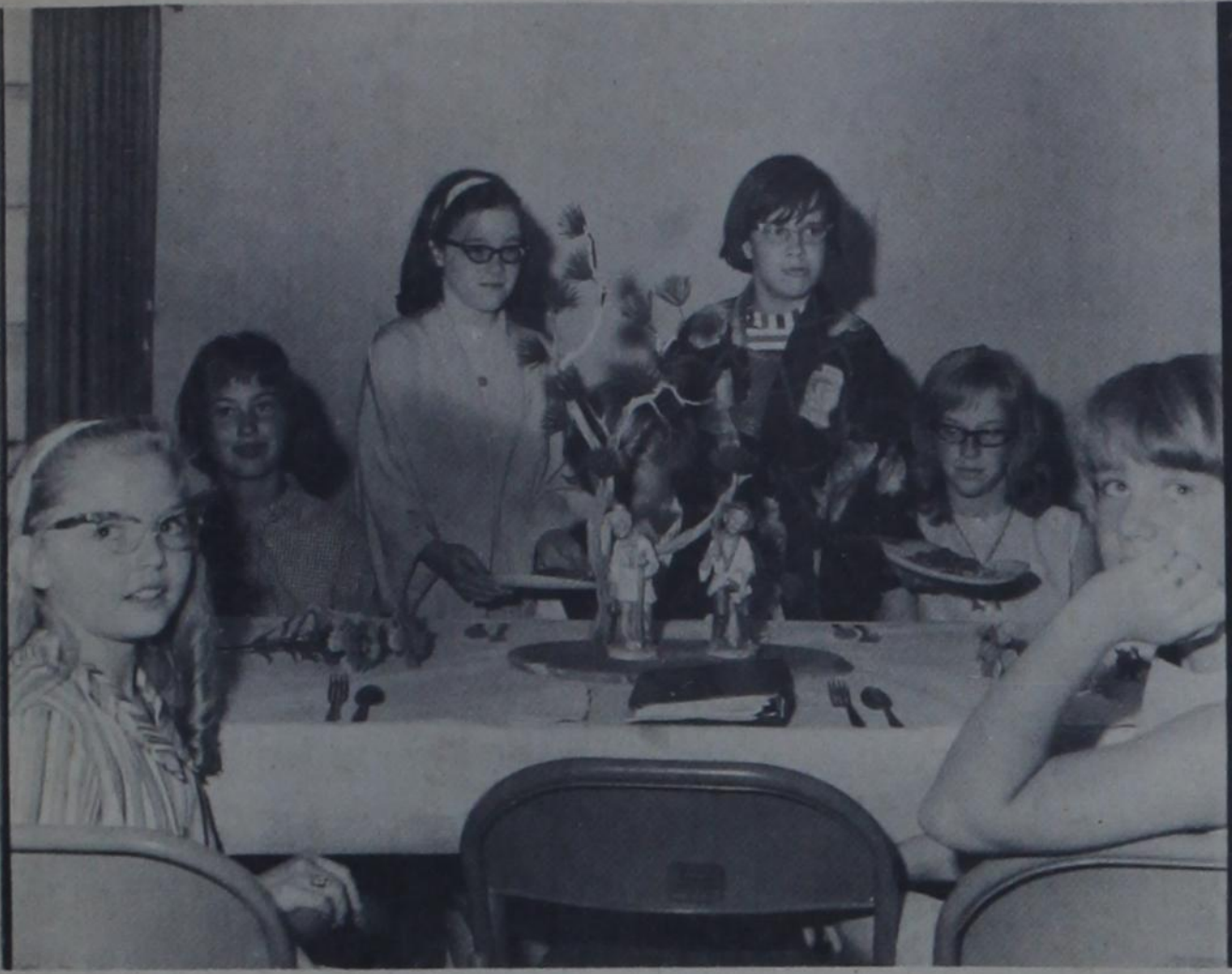

Nazareth Swifts Outrun Tough Anton Team, 14-6

Nazareth High School made the coaching debut of Wayne Potter a sweet one last Friday night with a hard-fought 14-6 victory over the Anton Bulldogs.

The Swifts capitalized on a pass interception in the first quarter and a Bulldog fumble in the third quarter for both of their touchdowns. Relying primarily on a ground attack, quarterback Marvin Hoelting led the Swifts to their first tally following a pass interception at Nazareth's 45 yard line. Hoelting's attempted extra point was blocked by onrushing Anton linemen. Donald Braddock recovered one of four Anton fumbles grabbed by the Swifts, midway in the third quarter at the Bulldogs' 45. Nazareth drove for a score in eight plays without throwing a pass as Hoelting and halfback Gerald Brockman piled up yardage, as the Anton forward wall began to weaken. Hoelting scored on a 10 yard scamper which gave the Swifts a 12-0 margin. Nazareth added the two extra points on a fake kick on which Hoelting received the ball instead of the holder and flipped to end Tom Pohlmeier, who was open by at least five yards.

Anton's over-sized offensive line began to wear down the lighter Nazareth defenders late in the second half. After receiving a Nazareth punt at their own 30, the Bulldogs began to move like a steamroller. Halfbacks Nicky Biffle and Roger Mitchell ran right over the middle of the Nazareth line, which was being demolished by the big Anton interior line. Mitchell ripped the final six yards to pay dirt putting Anton on the scoreboard with the six-point-er. Nazareth held the Bulldogs when they attempted to run for a pair of extra points. Anton drove the 70 yards for the score on 14 plays while piling up five first downs.

Brockman returned the Anton kickoff from his own 35 to Nazareth's 49 yard strip. The Swifts could manage only one first down against the stubborn Anton defense before Hoelting punted giving the Bulldogs the ball at Anton's 15. Mitchell and Biffle quickly ripped off two first downs placing the pigskin at the Anton 45, but on the next play Nazareth grabbed off an Anton fumble.

Nazareth was content to eat up the clock, but couldn't muster a first down and was forced to punt. Clyde Schulte took it upon himself to make sure that Anton didn't score with two jarring tackles, the latter ending the game.

Although no complete statistics were available on the game it is safe to say that Anton gained considerable more yardage on the ground than the Swifts. Nazareth was more successful in the air, however, while Anton attempted five passes having one intercepted and the others go incomplete. Hoelting attempted seven passes, completing two and having one intercepted. Hoelting fired a 22 yard scoring strike to Brockman and added a completion on the extra point tally in the fourth quarter. Hoelting carried the ball 19 times, running mainly the quarterback keeper, and managed to gain 94 yards. His total rushing offense, however, was only 54 yards, as he lost 40 yards caused by a good pass rush applied by the Bulldogs. Brockman racked up 18 yards on five carries while Gerber was held to only 12 yards in seven carries. Brockman sparked, along with Hoelting, on kick-off and punt returns. The pair totaled over 50

yards on two punt returns and two kick-offs.

Anton racked up only two first downs in the first half but added eight in the final stanza, giving the Bulldogs ten in the fracas. Nazareth netted five first downs while being held to only two the second half. Anton's strong second half can be summed up in the words of Coach Potter.

"Anton's big line just wore our boys down and especially their 275-pound tackle, Ed Henson, who played a strong game for the Bulldogs." The coach added that he was satisfied with the victory and said that it is always nice to win that first game. Coach Potter stressed that the Swifts have a great deal of work to do and

Cherry Trees Blossom Now

Mother Nature took a unique twist last week on the Loy Stone place where cherry trees put out new leaves and gave forth with an unusual blooming spree.

According to the Stones, the trees had produced a bountiful harvest of cherries during the regular growing season which was the latter part of April and early part of May.

After a consultation with W. F. Bennett, agronomist for Western Ammonia, it was decided that the cherry trees had suffered a shock of some type, possibly chemical. The shock caused the trees to be dormant. Following a heavy watering two weeks ago, the Stones then noted the budding leaves and blossoms.

Some reasons given by Bennett why the cherry trees were affected and other trees escaped the shock include: cherry trees could have been in more rapid growth or they were more sensitive to the chemical.
