I HOPE everyone had a nice July 4th holiday. It makes us refreshed and more ready to go to work again. Doesn't it?

Thursday we had a 4-H Record Workshop. There were 22 members and 9 leaders present from five 4-H clubs in the county. Our county 4-H'ers are certainly doing an excellent job. Keep your ears and eyes open when a 4-H speaks or acts — you can learn from them. The 4-H leaders tell me when they teach a project in 4-H they learn more than the boys and girls. So we see 4-H is really educational.

GIVE YOUR plumbing regular attention and care. Plumbing represents about 10 percent of the value of your home and costs more when neglected. A faucet leaking 60 drops per minute will waste about 2,300 gallons of water in a year, and neglecting to put a new washer may result in a damaged fitting. These tips may help you add years of service and satisfaction to your equipment.

Fix leaky faucets immediately to avoid costly damage. Use a force cup, or rubber plunger, to clear obstacles beyond the drain traps. Don't use drain chemicals without trying this first.

Keep foreign objects out of the drain. Never pour grease, fats, or oils down them. Drain a few quarts of water from your water heater periodically. This will remove sediment and prolong heater life. When repairing fixtures, always pad gripping tools to prevent marring.

Use non-abrasive cleaners on enamel fixtures and chrome-plated fittings. Be sure your water heater thermostat is set at the recommended level.

★ **THOSE NEW** sheets will last a lot longer if they're properly laundered and cared for. Tucked-in sheets should be loosened from all edges of the bed before they are removed. Pulling sheets without loosening them will weaken the fabric and may slit weak spots. Mitered corners should be loosened to avoid ripping. If the sheet should rip or tear, mend it before laundering. Small tears will become larger in washing.

Don't use a sheet as a laundry bag. This puts a strain on the sheet and increases snagging and soiling. Time can be saved by not folding sheets before they are put into the laundry bag. When line-drying sheets, fold the sheet hem to hem and lap about 4 inches over the line. After securely pinning the sheet, straighten the selvages with your fingers. When sheets are dry, fold them as they are removed from the line. Ironing is not necessary if sheets are folded evenly.

When drying sheets in the dryer, they should be removed before they are completely dry unless the dryer has a moisture sensing control. Remove sheets as soon as the dryer stops. If sheets are folded immediately after removal from the dryer, you'll save a lot of ironing time. You may, however, prefer to press at least the top 12 inches, which will show when the bed is made.

Man, the Explorer

Today I'm spending a great deal of time enjoying the "Theme Pavilions." First I toured the "Man the Explorer" complex near the southwest tip of Isle St. Helene. This is close to Expo Express and Metro stations. Beautiful Swan Lake is nearby. Next door is the Scandinavian Pavilion complete with distinctive national foods in the restaurant.

THE REST of the family has scattered. David, with his western hat and boots is attracting plenty of attention which he rather enjoys. The girls are also attired in Texas type outfits.

There is an endless number and variety of people here. There are Scotsmen wearing kilts, Indian ladies wrapped in yards of loose fitting saris, orientals in modern or old fashioned dress, thousands of Americans and Canadians of every description. Actually the most fascinating aspect of the fair is the people viewing it.

Every man I guess, and many women, have felt the urge to explore new frontiers, to climb a mountain to see what lies beyond, to sail the deep, mysterious waters of the ocean to see what kind of land and people are on the far-off shore. From infancy on, man explores. When man ceases to wonder, when no curiosity is left — man is dead. As man's knowledge grows, one of his main thoughts is how what he finds may best be used and adapted to his purpose — and to help his

fellow man.

"**MAN AND the Oceans**" is on the upper level of the northwest building. I am always fascinated by the infinite variety and extent of the sea and its inhabitants. Oceans cover more than two-thirds of the earth's surface. They represent a realm still largely unknown, a force of almost unbelievable physical energy, a near untapped source of many forms of wealth. In the near future man must begin to reap new and greater harvests from the ocean's depths to meet his ever increasing needs.

It is a treat to watch aquanauts at work in a large aquarium. Diving vehicles are on display. Development of transportation on the ocean is traced from ancient times to the present.

"**MAN, HIS Planet and Space**" is on the northeast side. This is one of the most ambitious and exciting of all the pavilions in this space age. It emphasizes man's achievements in space but makes very clear that man is still a pioneer, just barely scratching the surface of space. Every time I see this type of display I wonder anew, are we spending too much time and money on space? How about the pressing problems of earth, war, starvation, disease, poverty, ignorance?

With over three billion people in the world, isn't it strange that each one of us is unique and different. Over 3,000 different languages are spoken. Man has separated himself into more than

100 nations and countless provinces, states, counties, tribes, cities, and villages. And yet, man is one. All human beings belong to one species, Homo sapiens.

"**Man, the Producer**" Pavilion is on Isle Notre Dame next to the Expo Express station. Three headings to tell one story in a single building. Machinery and automation are popular words today but it all boils down to "tools for man" which enables him to do the job better and faster.

"**MAN THE Producer**" takes materials from the earth and draws energy from the sun and converts them to his purposes. The impression the visitor gets is that the resources available to man are still abundantly adequate if he will use them with intelligence and understanding. It may be later than we think. Every producer must learn to look beyond the next crop if he has any concern for his children or his children's children.

Well, guess what — I'm out of space again. Our 13-year-old Betty Bob, lost her purse today. Fortunately, she had most of her capital in mama's purse.

By the way, I do believe these Canadian dollars disappear a little faster than US dollars. We paid 47 cents a gallon for gas today but, surprise — Canadians gallons contain five quarts! (Next week: Individual Pavilions and La Ronde, playground extraordinary.)

County Is Free Of July 4 Deaths

Castro County stayed free of major accidents over the holiday weekend.

Although Texas led the nation in July 4 holiday deaths, none occurred in Castro County according to Sheriff Jack Cartwright.

THE NATION'S traffic death toll for this July 4 was the worst in history for a summer holiday period, with 958 deaths, 649 of which happened on the highways. This broke the o'd record set last Labor Day.

Texas led the nation with 64 traffic deaths, followed by California with 55, New York with 34 and Illinois and Ohio with 33 apiece.

Texas also led the nation in drowning deaths with 20.

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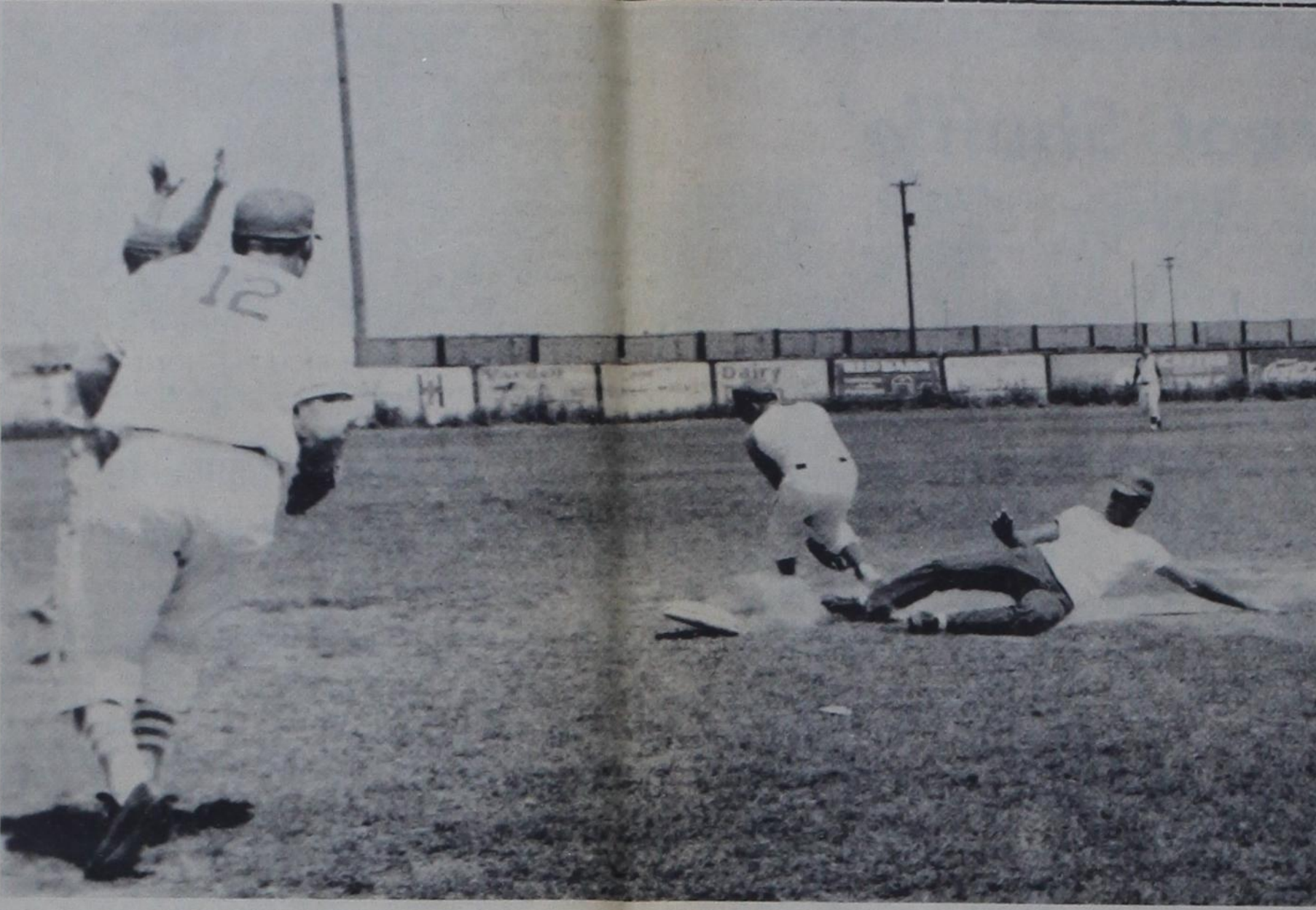
