**Secular or Spiritual.**

Today, there exists in all communities a class who, while ignoring the claims of religion, are apparently earnest and true to a high moral conception of life. No one can deny that they believe in the great law of work, and, as a class can be depended on to uphold the dignity of honest labor, whether it be with muscle or mind. In the industrial and commercial progress of the bee-hive era, this class seems to be an immensely important factor. Furthermore they believe in the law of love, operating in the home, in society, in the nation. Indeed, after a fashion, they respect the church, often support it financially, attend somewhat, and are by no means "heathens." # To Vote Bonds For Deep Well

**Question Meets With Unqualified Approval From All Sections of the County**

## A STRAIGHT BUSINESS PROPOSITION

**Should the Bonds Be Issued the Artesian Well Proposition will Be on a Sound Financial Basis.**

### THE EXPENSE WILL THUS BE EQUALLY DIVIDED

**Well Will Be Sunk on Private Property and Paid for by Owner if the Well Proves Successful.**

The acts of 1897, governing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of securing money for the sinking artesian wells, by the Commissioner's Courts, of the respective counties in the territory, are as follows:

- 640. Any county in this territory may issue and sell bonds to the amount of six thousand (\$6,000.00) dollars for the purpose of sinking artesian wells.
- 641. The object of said wells shall be to ascertain whether flowing water be procured on lands, at present, considered above and beyond the belt wherein it has been demonstrated that flowing wells can be obtained, and to encourage the boring of such wells, for the purpose of increasing the area and productiveness of our agricultural lands and to reclaim high mesa lands, which are now valueless for agricultural purposes.
- 642. Before any bonds shall be issued for the purpose set forth in the preceding sections, not less than twenty-five tax payers of the county shall present a written petition to the board of county commissioners, requesting them to call an election within and for that particular county, for the purpose of voting on the proposed bond issue. When any such petition shall have been presented to the board of county commissioners, at a regular meeting of said board, it shall be the duty of said board to call an election to be held within thirty days, for the purpose of letting all qualified voters vote on the said bond issue. Said election shall be conducted in the same manner and form as general elections are now held.
- 643. If two thirds of all the votes cast at said election be in favor of the bonds, it shall be the duty of the county commissioners to forthwith issue and sell said bonds.
- 644. Said bonds shall mature in not less than fifteen nor more than thirty years, and shall bear an annual rate of interest not exceeding 7 per cent, and shall not be sold for less than their value.
- 645. The funds derived from said sale of bonds shall be known as the artesian well fund, and shall be under the control of the county commissioners.
- 646. As soon as the bonds are sold the commissioners shall advertise for bids for boring a well, and shall let a contract to the lowest responsible bidder.
- 647. Said well shall be sunk on the land of the person, or persons who will agree to give the highest price for the same, provided water is obtained; the person making the bid to accompany said bid with a good bond for the faithful performance.
- 648. If water is secured and said business proves successful, the commissioners shall keep all moneys so derived from the sale of wells, in active use until said bonds mature at which time they shall apply the money then on hand to the payment of said bonds, and convert the surplus, if any, to the general expense fund of the county.

It will be readily seen that the foregoing articles provide a cheap, adequate and expeditious method by which the people of Roosevelt county may, without prejudice against, or favor for, any particular section of the county, secure the necessary money at low interest. In addition to this, it takes the matter out of the hands of private individuals and places it in the custody of the commissioners' court, who are under bond to exercise, in a proper and legal manner, a judicial supervision over the affairs of the county, and to handle and disburse, under the provisions of law, the people's money. In the event artesian water is obtained, the amount bid for the well reverts to the artesian well fund, and repays the county the amount expended for drilling, together with the bonus arising from such sale. The amount of interest payments incurred by the county to the bond purchasers will probably not exceed \$875 per annum, and the additional tax rate incurred can not exceed one fortieth of one per cent, and probably not so much.

To those who profess belief in the story of sectional advantage from the issuance of the bonds, we desire to draw your attention to section 647 of the statute printed above, wherein it is provided that the well must be sunk on the property of the person or persons who will agree to give the highest price for the same. Under this provision, no section of the county is debarred from participating in the benefits accruing from an artesian well. The petition has been filed with the commissioners and will be acted on by them Monday, and there is no question but what the good sense and business sagacity of the citizens of Roosevelt county will prevail to the extent that every voter will turn out and make it unanimous for the "Bonds and advancement."

H. M. STANLEY DIES IN LONDON.

London, May 10.—Sir Henry M. Stanley, the African explorer, is dead. Sir Henry, who was attacked by pleurisy a fortnight ago, died at his London residence. His illness was complicated by chronic heart trouble. He had been in a semi-conscious condition since Sunday afternoon.

Henry M. Stanley was conceded to be the most noted traveler and explorer of his time. His greatest fame grew out of his finding Dr. David Livingstone in the heart of Central Africa after that greatest of all men, who had been lost to the world for several years, and later Stanley's successful efforts in carrying out the work begun by Livingstone in solving the world's greatest mystery of the Dark Continent.

The first years of Stanley's life were spent in an English poor-house. His name was Henry M. Hagland, but at an early age he went to New Orleans with an uncle and assumed the name of Stanley. His school education was limited, and before he had reached the age of 20 he had enlisted in the Southern army. At the close of the war he drifted to Colorado, and he is remembered by many of the men who first gathered at the Gregory diggings near Central City. It is said that his first journey of exploration was after the Pinta river, starting in a common row boat at Denver, and extending his journey to the Missouri river.

At that time Stanley commenced to write for newspapers, and the first heard of him was when he accompanied a government expedition, of which John D. Howland, the Denver artist, was the official secretary, to the High Sierras, a Sierran agency in Dakota. He was then correspondent for the New York Herald.

Later Stanley went to Europe, and next made two journeys into Africa as war correspondent—first to Abyssinia and then to Ashanti.

James Gordon Bennett then sent Stanley to find Livingstone, and then followed his memorable journeys into the unknown regions of that continent, his discovery of the sources of the Congo river, and a further five years spent in the development of the Congo region in the employ of King Leopold.

In 1886, while on a lecturing tour in the United States, he was called upon to rescue Emin Bey, the lost governor of Ethiopia, in upper Egypt. That work he carried out successfully in the next three years, winning the acclaim of the highest honors. No man was ever so highly honored.

Stanley settled down in London. His one aim in life was to sit as a member in the English Parliament. At first he met defeat, but next effort was successful, and he has been re-elected time and time again.

From a poor-house he rose, by his unaided efforts, to be a member of the British Parliament.

BRUIN USUALLY GOOD-NATURED

A Bad Thief, but Not So Cross as Some Farm Dogs—It is Best Not to Pick a Fight With Him.

The brown or black bear of California is the most cowardly animal that roams the hills. He is a worse thief than the Northern wolverine and at the same time better natured than half the farm dogs the hunter chances upon. A walk at play will furnish more amusement than a three-ring circus and run like scared deer if you but show yourself through the brush—in short, the brown bear is the most "amocosi" cuss' of all, if approached properly.

But don't be misled into picking a fight with either of our small bears unless you are well armed, for the black or the brown bear—one and the same animal under variations of pelage—will fight ferociously when cornered. You will come upon them, too, in the most unexpected places; not even the willful jackknife can beat a brown bear in variability of mood or choice of feeding ground. Traveling in the mountains one is apt to come upon Sir Bruin drinking from a little wayside stream, and the very next day, having descended into the foothills, find possibly a pair playing about some poorly guarded sheep camp.

Good-natured as is either of these smaller bears, which weigh from 400 to 500 pounds apiece, it is best to know how to hunt them before attempting it. As with most big game, the best way to hunt them for sport is alone with a reliable rifle and a good knife, though there is seldom occasion for using the latter before attempting it. If one is hunting for hides or to rid a section of undesirable bear neighbors, a well-trained little dog is probably the best ally. Fox terriers usually are best, as they are quick, resourceful and an easy living. A little dog brought up in a good bear country, where he has roamed the hills all his life, has had the best training possible and is a prize to be taken care of.

As has been said, a black or brown bear seldom keeps one address long, but likely most of them just now are down among the oaks, where the fallen acorns afford them an easy living. There are possibly a good many along the willow fringes of the larger water courses, but once let the bear get first sight of you there and he will make off into a tangle of elder scrub, willow underbrush, and blackberry vines in which you and your dogs will last about three minutes.

If a bear could be persuaded to play football he would make the sweetest little backer ever known, judging by the way he would make a tangle of undergrowth, and the way a bear of any species will attend to a dog that dares to follow him alone into such retreat, is certainly scandalous.—Los Angeles Times.
