#### Beet Sugar Factory at Las Veges.

The Commercial Club of East Laz Vegas is at work to secure the location of a beet sugar factory at or near that city. The undertaking is a very commendable and timely one. It is be-lived that there are thousands of acres of land within comparatively short distances of Meadow City that can ant will produce satisfactory crops of suga-At any rate the experiment should be made in determining the feasibility and success in the raising of such beets in sufficient quantities to supply a beet sugar factory and that without the slightest delay. The climate is very favorable, the soil is all that can be desired, a sufficient water supply can be secured by well directed efforts: the commercial club and the citizens of the town should unite in sacuring the farmers, who will do the work and raise the beets. The project looks feasible and favorable and therefore why not try?

The judge granted the application and the referee made report in the afternoon. Judge McFie filed an order overruling all of the exceptions that were argued some time ago to the previous report of the ref-eree. This morning the final decree for partition was signed by the judge, appointing Francisco A. Serna, Antonio A. Vigil and Jose Salazar, commissioners to make the partition.

The New Mexico Asylum for Deaf and Dumb near Santa Fe has been closed for the term. The general public had been invited to the closing exercises which were held under the direction of Superintendent W. J. Connor, Jr. A feature of the program was several recitations by the members of the oral class who, deaf and perhaps born dumb under capeful training can now talk intelligibly. There were twenty pu-pils enrolled at the institution for the term just ending, which was the first under the superintendency of Mr. Connor, and he is sanguine that this number will be largely increased next

#### The Wool Crop.

Santa Fe.—Dr. G. T. Casper arrived in the city this morning from an spection of the ranges in San Juan and Rio Arriba counties. Dr. Casper states that the grass is good in the two counties named byt that there is scarcity of water on the plains; however, there is plenty of the lifegiving fluid in the mountains which can be reached without inconvenience. Sheep are in good condition considering the late spring and cold weather. Sheep men in those counties are very busy at the present shearing their sheep.

Dr. Casper states that four pounds wool will be a good average the sheep in that section this year, although some are shearing better. The increase in lambs is not as high as it ought to be, this on account of the late spring and cold weather. He states that one herd of sheep at Pueblo Bonita yielded 125 per cent., and others in that vicinity 100 per cent., aithough the average, he thinks, is about 70 per cent., perhaps a little higher. Dr. Casper was accompanied on his inspection trip by Drs. Fish Board of Education adjourned after a Hearn, Smith and Perry. He left this city about two months ago and made his headquarters at Chama.

PURIFIED LIFE INSURANCE.

Benefits from New Law, Which Remains Substantially Unchanged.

Through the influence of Gov. Hughes, the New York Legislature decided to make no radical changes in the new insurance law. It was pointed out by Gov. Hughes that the New York law has already accomplished widespread reforms, with proportionate benefits to policyholders, and that it should be given a thorough trial before any amendments were seriously considered. It is estimated that the cost of the mismanagement of the past did not average more than 20 cents to each policyholder, while the benefits to present and future policyholders will amount to many times more and be cumulative besides. The speed craze of the big companies and the excessive cost of securing new business was the most extravagant evil of the old managements. Under the new regime the cost of new business has already been greatly reduced, along

The showing made by the Equitable Life Assurance Society in its report for 1906 was a strong argument against meddling with the new law. In the Equitable alone there was a saving of over \$2,000,000 in expenses, besides an increase in the income from the Society's assets amounting to as much more. The ratios of the Equitable's total expenses to its total income was 19.42% in 1904, 17.38% in 1905, and only 14.48% in 1906. The dividends paid to Equitable policyholders in 1906 amounted to \$7,289,734, which was an increase of more than 9% over 1905

While the Equitable made a better showing than any other big company, all reported radical economies and under such conditions the Legislature wisely decided to leave the law substantially as it stands.

### **NEW ONION RECIPES**

GOOD DISHES MADE FROM ARO MATIC VEGETABLE.

It Would Seem That All Possibilities of Cooking This Valuable Food Had Been Exhausted, But Try These Three.

What cooks would do if suddenly deprived of the onion makes one shud der to think. There is no savory dist without a hint of its toothsome pres ence. Its varied uses are legion; it is not only valuable in cookery but is useful medicinally. It is said that it cases of malaria the free use of onions is wonderfully helpful, while onios tea is one of the latest alds in the treatment of gall stones. Onions are also good for those who are poor sleepers, being soothing to the nerves

Onions may be boiled, fried, stewed or baked, or eaten raw as a salad; ir fact, so general is their use that h seems hardly possible to suggest a new recipe, but here are two or three that will be valuable:

Onion Soup.-Cup up four large onions and brown them in six ounce of butter for two minutes; add salt cayenne and a quart of stock; cook slowly one hour, then add a large cut of hot milk with two beaten eggs and stir in quickly. Lay in the bottom of the tureen toasted bread squares sifted with Parmesan cheese and turr the soup over them.

Baked Spanish Onlone.—Take four Spanish onions and with a sharp knife cut out some of their centers; do not pare them, but boil in salted water one hour; take them out, dry them and stuff them with grated cheese, butter, pepper and salt. Bake with a moderate oven. When done they may be eaten from the skin or the outer skin removed and a rich brown gravy poured over them.

Onion Fritters.-Make a batter as for clam fritters and add three large sions grated, pepper, salt, and a dash of celery sait. Fry in hot lard and serve with English chops.

To Make a Mending Box. It is easy to make a good mending

box from an ordinary wooden box bought from your grocer. Cover it with denim and pad the lid. Line the box with a pretty wall paper. On the inside make pockets of denim with flaps to fasten down and tack these pockets on with brass-headed thimble, scissors, etc. Fill the others with scraps of woolen and cotton mathial for mending. On the inside of the lid tack a pin cushion filled with all sorts of needles and some common pins. On ironing day fold each garment that needs mending and place it inside the box. Then, when a neighbor comes in to pass the afternoon pull out your box from where it has been serving as a window seat or stool, and the weekly mending will not be such a bugb

Rhubarb and Orange Marmalade.

Wash and cut in small pieces one quart tender rhubarb, peel thin onehalf dozen oranges, and cut the yellow rind into thin shreds, removing all the white pitch. Cut in slices and remove seeds. Put the rhubarb in a pan with the oranges and peel, and one pound and a half granulated sugar. Place over a gentle fire, stirring frequently until reduced to the consistency desired. Turn into marmalade pots, and leave uncovered until the following day, then cover with paraffin and seal. This is excellent and keeps well.

Sauce for Fruit Fritters.

Beat the yolks of two eggs with half a cupful of sugar. Add the juice and grated rind of a lemon and three table spoonfuls of water. Stir over hot water until it thickens. Beat the whites of the eggs to a stiff froth with two teaspoonfuls of powdered sugar. When ready to serve pour a little of the sauce over a fritter and put on this a spoonful of the beaten whites.

Mush and Bacon.

Put thin strips of breakfast bacon on a toaster and lay in common sheet iron dripping pan large enough to al low toaster to rest one edge on bot tom of pan. Put all in a hot oven and when cooked the fat will be in the pan and the bacon well browned and free from grease. For the mush, bread the small

slices by dipping first in egg, then in crumbs, and brown on toaster same as bacon, and when nearly done dot with butter.

Grained and varnished imitations of hard wood are best cleaned by rubbing well with cloths wrung out in borax soapsuds, never letting the water touch them. Afterward they should be rubbed with flannel barely moistened with kerosene. If there is too much kerosene it will dissolve and blur the colors. Clean hardwood with a namel wet in turpentine, and rub afterward lightly with boiled linseed oil. Take off spots with fine



### ABODE OF TRAITOR

BENEDICT ARNOLD'S MANSION IN PHILADELPHIA.

House is One of the Few Specimens of Colonial Architecture Left In the Country-Now belongs to the City.

Mount Pleasant, in the East Park, near Columbia avenue entrance, which is almost equally well known to park visitors as Arnold's mansion is to be the headquarters of La Moriganta Klambo, the newly formed organization of fashionable women motorists, says the Philadelphia Public Ledger.

Few buildings in the park equal Mount Pleasant in interest, and none is older. It is one of the few well preserved country mansions built in this country in Colonial times. As a specimen of architecture modeled upon the style made popular by Sir Christopher Wren, it is one of the half dozen or less which remain in this country.

The house, which John Adamswho dined there in 1774-declared was the most elegant in Pennsylvania, was built for Capt. John McPherson in 1762. In 1779 MacPherson grew tired of the place and sold it to Gen. Benedict Arnold who had married Peggy Shippen. In its time the mansion has borne three names. MacPherson called it The Hills and also Clunie, and subsequently it was known as Mount Pleasant.

Capt. MacPherson was one of the most original men in the province. If he had not been immensely wealthy he probably would not have been tolerated; but as a privateersman in England's wars with France and Lpain before the revolution he was lucky and came home with a genuine gold galleon. He had two sons. One was an officer in the British army, but resigned his commission on the breaking out of the revolution and became a major in the Continental army, The other son was with the colonists from the beginning of the struggle and was killed at the attempt to take Quebec, being the first Philadelphian of importance to give up his life for

When Arnold married Peggy Shippen, daughter of Edward Shippen, subsequently chief justice of Pennsylvania, he bought Mount Pleasant and settled it on himself for life, with the remainder of his wife and children. At the time Arnold was military governor of Philadelphia, and Judge Peters, who occupied Belmont, the seat across the Schuylkill from Mount Pleasant, accused the general of having converted \$50,000 to his own use and of having used this toward the purchase of Mount Pleasant.

Arnold did not long remain at Mount Pleasant. After his treason he of course had to leave the country, and the state of Pennsylvania confisated his life interest in the beautiful estate. Baron de Steuben became the next tenant of the place and Arnold's life interest was sold to Colonel Richard Hampton for \$850.

In the Shippen correspondence, published a few years ago, there are several references to Mount Pleasant. In 1785 in a letter from Mrs. Arnold to her father it appears that Arnold had an idea of privately getting title to the property for his family. He changed his mind, however, and suggested that the place be sold at public sale for as much as it would bring. In 1796 Mount Pleasant was sold, but for barely enough to satisfy the mortgages upon it.

Gen. Jonathan Williams, a revolutionary patriot and commercial agent of the United States in France from 1777 to 1785, bought the country seat and lived there for years. The property remained in his family for many years and was purchased by the park commission by virtue of the act of 1867, which permitted the acquisition of what are now park prop-
