



In discussing with a friend his determination to issue the proclamation granting statehood to Oklahoma, President Roosevelt said certain things that are much at odds with the reports of his views on the matter, For example, that much berated "gerrymander."

Mr. Roosevelt looked upon this from the standpoint of a practical man, He remarked that it might be bad, but it could not be as bad as some with which he has had experiense with in New York, and had had knowledge of in other northern republican states. Nor did he express any objection to the initiative and referendum clause in the constitution, that feature which the unfortunate Taft at tacked. Mr. Roosevelt approves the system of direct legislation for cities, counties and state, but fears it is too cumbersome for the nation.

"Nor did the President, express any of that hostility to the constitutional prohibition of government by injunction, which Secretary Taft attacked so bitterly. People in Washington are wandering whether l'aft was sent out to test public sentiment on this subject, or whether he was merely dispatched like a lamb to the slaughter.

All that Roosevelt has said to the half score mea who taked to him upon the subject has been in direct contradiction of all that Secretary Taft said in his ill advised speech, a speech the substance of which the president must have known before its delivery. Certain parts of constitution, notably that prohibiting campaign funds from corporations, and compelling candidates for office to make sworn tatements as to their expenses and affixing heavy penalties for any perjury committed are good.

If the official copy of the constitution and report of the election are received at the white house before the president starts on his trip to the middle west, the proclamation of statehood will be issued at once. Otherwise it may be delayed until the middle of October.

Members of the inland waterways commissoin left St. Paul on Friday, Sept. 27 on their momentuous trip down the Father of Waters, on which they were joined at Keokk Tuesday, by President Roosevelt. The up per Mississippi river boat, the Colonel A. MacKenzie, will be used for the trip. Brief steps will be made by the commission at Prescott, Red Wing, Wabasha and Winona, Minn., La Crosse, McGregor and Cassville, Wis., Dubuque and Burlington, Ia, and Rock Island, Ill. The itinerary provides for the arrival of the boat at Keokuk on the evening of Monday, and at noon on Tuesday the party will proceed down the Mississippi with President Roosevelt. From there on the trip is expected to be a continual triumph. St. Louis will be reached Wednesday, where the president will be given an ovation such as he has seldom before received. A great river parade will be held, in which not less than 100 cities of the Mississippi valley will be represented. The largest fleet assembled in St Louis in thirty years will be there, to receive and salute the president upon hisarrival, and governors of a score of states will be in attendance.

Another great demonstration will greet the president at Mem. phis, where the lake to the gulf Deep : Waterways convention will be in session, It is ex pected that coming trip of the

commission will be of inestimate value iz securing the legislative action desired for the improve ment of the Mississippi and trib is very specuraging to the m utary streams.
