Some Prominent Speakers to Accompany The Train.

Train Will Arrive in Portales January 24.

Prof. J. D. Tinsley, Agricultural Demonstrator of the Santa Fe Railroad, today announced the completion of all arrangements for the big Agricultural Demonstration train which the Santa Fe will operate to all points on its lines in New Mexico starting January 11th. The equipment has been assembled in the Santa Fe shops at Albuquerque and is ready for the trip. The six cars will be thoroughly lighted so as to provide for the night meetings and will be heated by steam so that even should the weather be cold the cars will be comfortable during the lectures and demonstration.

The train will arrive at Portales at 8 a. m. on Jan. 24th, and will remain there for 2 hrs. 13 min. Every one interested, farmers, business men, school children, are urged to be present promptly as the lectures and demonstration will begin immediately upon arrival of the train. Assist ing Prof. Tinsley, who will have charge of the operation of the train will be a strong corps of experts in all lines of agriculture and live-stock growing, including: Prof. W. E. Garrison, President, New Mexico Agricultural College; Prof. Luther Foster, Director, New Mexico Experiment Station; Prof. W. C. Conway, in charge of the Agricultural College experiment work, who on this trip will give particular attention to the meeting of the apecial feature at every stop.

F. L. Bixby, Irrigation Engineer; H. H. Simpson Professor of Animal Husbandry; Prof. Fabian Garcia, Horticulturist; Prof. E.P. Humbert, Agriculturist.





The Difference

The New Mexican printed the other day the following interesting information concerning the financial condition of New Mexico and its neighbor. Texas:

"State Treasurer Sam Sparks of Texas closed the calendar year on Saturday with a deficit of \$500,000. Territorial Treasurer R. J. Palen could have closed his books on Saturday with a surplus of \$500,000. Texas is more than twice as large as New Mexico, and has ten times the population and fifty times the wealth, but Texas has been under a democratic administration al most since the war, while New Mexico has been in republican hands the past fifteen years. It makes a big difference.'

The New Mexican never print ed a greater truth than the above It makes a big difference. For fifteen years the people of New Mexico have been taxed at an av erage rate of more than \$13 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. Lest year the rate for \$11.00 in New Mexico and the rate in Texas was 40 cents, or a little less than one-twenty seventh of the rate here. Had the people of Texas been taxed for only one year at the rate the people in New Mexico were taxed last year there would have been a surplus of more than \$2,000,000 in the Texas treasury last Saturday, and had the people of Texas been taxed at the same rate for the past fifteen years as the people of New Mexico have been taxed, the treasury of Texas would be bulging with money; it would be second only to the treasury of the United States.

The low tax rate in Texas also explains that part in the editorial in the New Mexican which says that Texas has ten times the population and fifty times the wealth that New Mexico has. A low tax rate encourages immi gration and stimulates the accumulation of wealth. According to the New Mexican the people of Texas are five times as wealthy, per capita, as the people of New Mexico, since there are ten times as many people there and fifty times the wealth that there is in New Mexico. This speaks well for the democratic administration in Texas. The people down there have not been robbed by the politicians, under the guise of taxation, and have been able to accumulate wealth.

When New Mexico was made a territory of the United States, the population of Texas was about 150,000 greater than that of New Mexico. Now it is more than three and a half millions more than New Mexico and the increase in the population of Texas during the ten years from 1900 to 1910 was more than double the entire population of New Mexico at this time.

It should not be forgotten that, for the past fifteen years, the Individual Deposits Subject to Check tax rate in Texas has averaged more than \$10 less per thousand than in New Mexico. Had Texans paid the same rate on their valuation of between two and

sessed property as was paid in New Mexico, Texas would now be able to buy and pay for a large part of New Mexico. There is a difference between honest, economical administration and graft.—Eagle.
