We are only about one-twelfth of the way into the new year, but all the indications are that this will be a good one for Dimmitt and Castro County.

The First Baptist Church is building a fine new church edifice that will be the pride of all the church people of the community regardless of denomination. In order of importance churches of any community comes first.

Then there is that other project that has at long last got underway, the corn wet milling plant. It will be ready for operation next year. This is a major industry that will put starch in a considerable number of collars as well as supplying Karo Syrup for many tables. Many other goodies will come out of that plant that will add considerably to the income of county farmers as well as stimulating business on Main Street.

All preliminary plans have been completed by the Dimmitt Produce Company for the construction and equipping of a potato processing plant on its property in Northeast Dimmitt. This will be the first time that the company has provided for the handling of spuds, and will add one more agricultural commodity to the long list of crops that are handled by and through Dimmitt plants.

Not to be overlooked is the highway improvement work that is getting underway in the county. The highway north of Dimmitt, 385, is being widened and straightened out only to make it easier for people to come to Dimmitt. It is not to be used at any time to go to towns to the north to shop or trade, anyone using it for that purpose will be barred from its use and could possibly lose their drivers license.

These are only a few of the good things that are happening to Dimmitt and Castro County. There will be many more before 1970 rolls around.

I wish that I could report that two other improvements were being made, but apparently that will have to wait until later. There is no doubt, however, that we need some more traffic lights on Main Street and Bedford as well as paved parking space on all sides of the courthouse square.

While we are on the subject of traffic lights, city fathers, how about turning the traffic light at East Second and Jones into a blinker, or caution light. There is hardly ever two cars at that intersection at the same time, and it gets a little lonesome waiting for the light to change. Just a block west, however, there is a busy intersection, without the convenience of a traffic light, where you can get clobbered with the greatest of ease.

Don Newman presented a very interesting program Tuesday at the Dimmitt Lions Club meeting. Don is home from Vietnam for a visit and apparently is optimistic about the situation in that war-torn country. He showed a number of colored slides and gave a running account of some of his experiences in Vietnam.

Some very beautiful and peaceful looking pastoral scenes were shown of the countryside as well as scenes in Saigon and other major cities of South Vietnam. While looking at pictures of isolated areas of Vietnam it is easy to imagine that the potential, both in natural resources and an intelligent and resourceful people, is almost unlimited for development and progress with the right leadership under peaceful conditions. One of the greatest needs in the world today is for success in the Paris Peace Conference, not only because of our involvement but also because of the suffering of the people in that unhappy land.

At Nazareth Flu Outbreak Closes Schools

Nazareth's schools are back to normal today after being forced to close three days by a severe outbreak of influenza among students.

Twenty percent of Nazareth's students were absent Monday of last week, and the outbreak reached serious proportions the following day, when 25 percent of the students were out of school.

Supt. John Slavik called off all school activities Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

When school resumed Monday, the absentee rate was back down to 11 percent, and by Tuesday it had dropped below 10 percent.

"BUT WE'RE not taking anything for granted," Slavik said. "There still might be a danger of it cropping up again."

The flu affected more youngsters than adults, and was characterized by headaches, sore throats and upper respiratory infections, Slavik reported.

"After talking with Dr. Blackburn (County medical officer), I am of the opinion that it was one of the Asian flu viruses," Slavik said. "We had had some all along, even before Christmas, but it really hit us hard the first of last week."

DIMITT'S and Hart's schools experienced flu outbreaks in December, but the incidence wasn't as sudden as Nazareth's, and the absentee rates didn't reach school-closing proportions.

Denver City Probable Foe In Bi-District

Unless the gods of roundball turn fickle in the waning days of the regular season, it'll be Dimmitt vs. Denver City in the bi-district championship game Feb. 25.

THE BOBCATS of District 3-AA and the Mustangs of 4-AA virtually sewed up their loop titles this week. Both teams are undefeated in district play.

If fate does dictate that these two high-flying squads tangle in the bi-district showdown, Coach Kenneth Cleveland said the game probably will be in the Texan Dome at South Plains College in Levelland.

The four bi-district champions of North Texas will meet in the Region 1-AA tournament Saturday, March 1, in Lubbock Municipal Coliseum, with each team playing two games during the day.

THE WINNER of the regional endurance contest will go to the state tournament March 6, 7 and 8 in Gregory Gym at the University of Texas in Austin.

"There is keen interest in the two applications with the Federal Power Commission by two cooperatives in Castro County to purchase gas from El Paso Natural Gas Co. for approximately 22 cents," Sides said. "A full report on these applications will also be made at the annual meeting."

More Road Work Okayed

The Texas Highway Commission has awarded a \$1.7 million seal-coating contract that includes almost 35 miles of US 385 and State 86 in Castro County.

SCHEDULED to be seal-coated during the big 90-day project this spring are 15.6 miles of US 385 from the "Y" in southeast Dimmitt to the Lamb County line, and 19.1 miles of State 86 from the west city limits of Dimmitt to the Swisher County line.

The US 385 job will continue through Lamb County to Loop 430 in Littlefield. However, the seal-coating of State 86 will stop at the Castro-Swisher line and resume in Tulia, to the Briscoe County line.

The new US 385 contracts mean that work will be underway along every mile of this highway within the county at one time or another this year. Work is now starting on a major rebuilding project of US 385 from Dimmitt to the Deaf Smith County line, under an earlier state contract.

THE CASTRO County projects were part of a \$1,729,643.10 contract awarded by the state highway commission for 530 miles of seal-coating within the Lubbock district.

Winning the multi-county contract with the low bid were High Plains Pavers Inc. and Panhandle Pavers, Inc., of Lubbock.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer O. L. Crain, and will include highways in Castro, Parmer, Lubbock, Swisher, Hale, Dawson, Hockley, Floyd, Lamb, Terry, Cochran, Crosby, Bailey, Gaines and Yoakum Counties.

J. W. KING of Lubbock will be the highway department engineer in charge of the project.

3,052 Register To Vote in '69

The county's 1969 voter registration total almost doubled during the final week, and the tax assessor's office had to stay open until 6:15 p.m. Friday to handle the throng of last-minute applicants.

COUNTY Assessor Kent Birdwell reported Monday that the 1969 total had climbed to 3,052, with a few more mailed-in applications still expected.

The new figure is 778 below the election-year record of 3,830 set last year.

Bobcats Ice District Title

Dimmitt's Bobcats virtually put the district championship on ice with victories Friday and Tuesday nights, while the Bobbies lost to the Floydada Whirlwinds Friday and topped the Olton Fillices Tuesday.

THE BOBCATS' title clincher was a brawl-like game at Olton Tuesday night. The upset-minded Mustangs, the only team with a chance to knock off the Cats, tried but failed, 71-45, in a foul-ridden contest. Bobby Baker led the Dimmitt onslaught with 22 points.

The Bobbies, playing without the services of scoring queen Ruth Dyer most of the way, came through with a 49-44 victory over the Fillices as Sharon Barker bucketed 19 points. Dyer picked up four fouls in the first period and stayed on the bench until the fourth frame. The game was whipsaw-close until the final minutes.

DAVID LAND had a field day with fast breaks Friday night, scoring 21 points to lead the Bobcats to a 91-35 slaughter of Floydada. Most of Land's points came after downcourt passes from rebounder Jerry Brady, under the Whitwind basket. Brady also collected 17 points, while Jerral Seale picked up 15 and Bobby Baker 12.

Despite an exciting last-quarter rally, the Bobbies fell to the strong Whirlwinds, 51-43, in Friday night's game. Suzanne Merritt scored half the Bobbies' points with outside set shots.

In a Monday night freshman bout, Jerry Matthews bucketed 29 to lead Dimmitt to a 74-37 victory over Littlefield.

Four-Month Grant Is Approved For Community Action Program

In line with its recent announcement to the Castro County Community Action Committee, the Office of Economic Opportunity has approved a grant of \$79,303 for local OEO programs.

THE GRANT includes \$47,954 for the nine-month Head Start program in public schools and \$19,912 for the two-month Summer Head Start, but allows only enough funds (\$11,437) for four months of operation of two local neighborhood centers and administrative costs.

The local committee was notified Jan. 6 by the Southwest regional OEO office that it would be funded only through March, except for the Head Start programs. The fate of the local Community Action Program isn't known at this time.

The new grant, announced Saturday by Sen. Ralph Yarborough and Congressman Bob Price, provides for 60 children in the nine-month Head Start program and 100 children in Summer Head Start. These programs are designed to provide pre-school training to children in low-income families, including medical, social and psychological services, and will require 21 non-professional aides.

ALSO authorized by the grant are such locally initiated programs as adult classes and tutoring, development of community organization, mobilization of local resources, and enrichment programs.

Local share of the programs will be \$18,671.

Capital to Host Senior Courses

Congressman Bob Price announced this week that five courses sponsored by a Presidential Classroom for Young Americans will be held in Washington, D. C., this spring.

"The Presidential Classroom," the congressman commented, "is open to all American high school seniors and will give them an opportunity for an in-depth, on the spot study of the intricacies of the US government.

"THE CLASSROOM is also intended to encourage dedication to and an understanding of the American system, which all too often seems remote, bureaucratic and inaccessible to today's young people," he added.

Price said that the curriculum will focus on the three branches of government — the executive, legislative and judicial. Classes will be held in the actual locations of many of the government branches, agencies and departments being studied, and the teaching will be supplemented by lectures, seminars and meetings with key officials from numerous areas within the government.

Classes will last one full week from 4 p.m., Saturday afternoon through the next Saturday morning, and there will be five classes, each of which will hold a maximum of 350 students: (1) Feb. 22 through March 1; (2) March 1 through 8; (3) March 8 through 15; (4) March 15 through 22; (5) March 22 through April 5.

PRICE suggested that all interested high school seniors contact his office in Washington, or the senior class advisor of his or her high school, who has been furnished all available information on the program.

Bible Thoughts

REPENTANCE

By Ronnie Parker

Repentance of sins must come before salvation. In Luke 13:3 Jesus taught, "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." Peter commanded, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38).

It is natural to ask; What do men do when they repent of their sins? It is vital to know since repentance is necessary in the gospel plan of salvation. One common conception is that repentance is godly sorrow for sin. But the scriptures teach that "Godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation" (2 Cor. 7:9). Another conception is that repentance is a reformation of life; but according to the divine word, reformation of life is the effect of repentance. In Acts 26:20 Paul tells of preaching to men "that they should repent and turn to God and do works meet for repentance."

The basic meaning of the word repentance is a change of mind. This can be seen in this example, which is one of many. "But what think ye? A certain man had two sons; and he came to the first, and said, Son, go work today in my vineyard. He answered and said, I will not; but afterward he repented and went" (Matt. 21:28-29). New why did this son obey His father after he first refused? His repentance — his change of mind or purpose.

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

Price Seeks Aid-Trade Ban On North Vietnam Suppliers

A resolution to ban all US aid and trade with any country furnishing supplies to North Vietnam was introduced by Fanhandle Congressman Bob Price Friday.

AMENDMENTS to the Foreign Assistance Act already prohibit grants, loans, credits or other assistance to any country which sells or furnishes to North Vietnam or which permits ships or aircraft under its registry to transport to or from that country any equipment, materials, or commodities or gives any form of assistance to North Vietnam, Price said.

"But," he added, "the law has never been enforced. The resolution simply states that it is the recommendation of the Congress that the President take immediate action under the law to stop all aid to countries that are aiding our Communist North Vietnam enemies."

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





Here Are Tips For Laundry Day

By IRENE KEATING

This week I've been giving Home Demonstration Club programs on home laundry. This is something that is of concern to all homemakers. It is very important to follow a few basic rules in our home laundering.

FIRST SORT your clothes into the proper categories according to color, fabric content, and amount of soil. Next pre-treat clothes. This doesn't only mean to check for stains but check all pockets, remove buckles, belts, etc. that might be damaged in the machine, zippers should be closed, and durable press garments should be turned inside out.

Thirdly, select the proper water temperature — fiber content is important here. Then use the right amount and kind of washing products. Fifth, use the correct amount of washing action and lastly, be sure all items are rinsed thoroughly. Poor rinsing is one of the major causes of discoloration in clothes. Over-use of detergent is also a factor in discolored clothes.

Keep in mind the definition of a "good wash" which is "clothes

free of dirt, free of spots and stains, soft, absorbent, non-irritating to the skin, white, bright, and new looking."

THAT'S THE goal of Dimmitt's new Warehouse, as stated by Jon Pollard, wholesale representative, who is organizing furniture and appliance dealerships in this area to be supplied by the new company.

The Warehouse, which recently opened for business, is the former Family Mart organization, and the faces you'll see there are familiar ones. David Harpole is president of the new company, and Bob Bingham is the Warehouse manager. Mrs. Dolores Allison is the firm's head bookkeeper.

Warehouse sells furniture and accessories, TV, electronics, large and small appliances, statuary and art, bedding, carpeting and draperies. Its brand lines include Maytag, General Electric, Norge, Curtis-Mathes, Voice of Music, Broyhill, Berklene, Stratford Futorian, Owasso, Sealy and others.

THE COMPANY also is prepared to completely outfit new

homes with fixtures and accessories, and has the services of a professional decorator consultant, Pollard said.

Harpole, Bingham and Pollard hope the new firm will become the headquarters of a large number of independent dealerships throughout this area. From its Dimmitt location, Warehouse will supply its dealers and sell its merchandise to local customers also.

"Our policy will be to buy directly from the manufacturer in carload lots, instead of going through the wholesaler as we did with Family Mart," Bingham explained. "By buying direct from the factory we can buy and sell at considerably lower prices."

THE PRICING system of Warehouse's headquarters outlet here enables a customer to set his own price — from "crate price" to "volume price" — depending on the retail services he wants with

the item, such as delivery, maintenance, repair service, etc.

An explanation sheet offered to customers explains Warehouse's pricing schedule:

1. All merchandise is tagged at the retail price, which includes all services normally expected from a retail store.

2. THE PRICE tag on the item also includes a Warehouse "code price," which can be quoted by a member of the staff. The code price is considerably below retail, but includes none of the normal retail services. This is the price for the merchandise in the crate, FOB the store.

3. Delivery, installation and after-the-sale maintenance service are available, but each service carries an extra charge.

5. All manufacturers' warranties are valid, whether or not the customer buys a service contract.

6. Monthly payments can be arranged.



Is Your Color TV Working Properly? This Check-List Can Help You Decide

Most color television sets require special "setting up" color adjustments in the home before they function satisfactorily, reports a home management specialist with the Extension Service.

THIS SERVICE should be part of the purchase price of the set, says Wanda Meyer at Texas A-&M. She says here is how to check if the serviceman has done his job:

Purity — Tune in a black-and-white picture with a variety of shading but little action. Set the picture for moderate contrast.

If, at six or eight feet, you see pronounced blotches of color with irregular outlines, purity is off. Convergence — The convergence needs adjustment if, from normal viewing distance, you see colored outlines around objects in a black-and-white picture.

TRACKING — The slight color tint of the background in a black-and-white picture should be the same throughout, often grayish blue. If the tint varies across the picture — to green, for example, or to pink — the tracking is out of adjustment.

Focus — Viewed at a distance of a foot or two, the horizontal scanning lines should be clearly visible and of uniform thickness. If the serviceman cannot get good

focus, your picture tube may be defective.

Tuning Accuracy — If your set has a special device to make fine tuning easier, you can check it against your own manual fine tuning. Select a fairly strong station and fine-tune so you get a sharp picture. Then move the control slightly until the picture just appears to "worm" and move it back again to sharp.

YOUR tuning indicator should not be at its optimum position. If your set has Automatic Frequency Control, switch it off for this test. After you've tuned, switch on the AFC. It should make no changes in picture sharpness, notes Mrs. Meyer.

IS IT MORE economical to buy convenience soups or to make your own? Both are equal in price if the same ingredients are used, answers Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist. Homemade soups tend to be more expensive because they use more expensive ingredients and a higher proportion of meat.

He described West Berlin as "an island in a sea of sharks." The original German capital is in Russian-occupied East Germany, but is divided into American, French, English and Russian sectors. The sectors controlled by the three allies make up West Berlin.

HE DESCRIBED the transportation routes into West Berlin and told of the frustrations West Berliners face when they want to enter or leave the sector on Russian-controlled highways.
