Analysis of Water

Requests for analyses of irrigating waters are very numerous from all parts of the state. Unfortunately the farmer is often unable to interpret the analysis of the water which he uses, or proposes to use for irrigation, and to him the analysis may be of little value. An agricultural analysis of a New Mexico water is usually made to determine whether or not it holds sufficient 'alkali" in solution to render it injurious to crops. The chemist in his report to the farmer gives him the amount of total "alkali" and its component salts contained by either one hundred thousand or a million parts of the water. If a certain farmer finds that his water contains 1,000 parts per million of common table salt, he can calculate the amount of this ingredient applied to an acre of soil with the use of each foot of water, as follows:

One acre has 43560 square feet. One cubit foot of water weighs 60 pounds, hence one acre-foot of water weighs 43560x60 or 2613600 pounds; and will centain 2613.6 pounds of common salt which will be deposited on each acre of soil when one foot of this water velt on the tenter books and is added. 
