Well informed parties insist that there will also be at least three or four graft bills, intending to give the handling of the color bonds and the lands into the hands interested parties, the payment of the militia warrants, and a few other things.

The prohibitionists held a big metting in the hall of the house of representatives Wednesday the 20th, and passed resolutions urging all prohibitionists to get into the fight for satewide prohibition and to keep up the fight until an amendment to the constitution is submitted to the peo-

That the prohibitionists are getting to be troublesome to the politicians is shown by the activity in both the great political parties to meet the demands of the "drys." The prohibitionists insist that the governor's message supports their contentions as to the laws of the state and their enforcement. The republican convention attempted to frame a plank which would, in a measure at least, satisfy the "dry" sentiment in the party, and the republicans failed to even interest the militant 'drys.' Prohibition leaders charge that in several republican counties parties circulating their petitions for statewide paohibition have been threatened with different kinds of prosecution and persecution if they did not de sist. This may lead to complications in the repuplican party.

Two proposed amendments to the state constitution have al ready appeared, one for state wide prohibition and the other for the amendment of the language qualification clause. It is understood that the legislature will be given an opportunity to pass upon several other amendments, all to be submitted, if submitted at all, at the congressional election this fall.

California Lemon Crop

California's lemon crop this since the culture of that fruit was first inaugurated in that state. At the present time the lemon growers of the state estimate a minimum crop of five thousand carloads. Up to and including the last day of February, thirteen hundred and fortyone carloads had been shippeP this year and the remainder of the crop will be moved just as quickly as cars can be provided. The usual loss to the lemon crop each sear on account of frosts, was very small in that state this season, and some of the growers predict as heavy a season as

Since the season of 1906-1907, when three thousand five hun dred and seven carloads of California lemons were shipped east the output has grown steadily until but very few lemons now have to be imported by this thriftyy country. During the Irst five years twenty-six thousand two hundred and eight carloads of lemons have been shipped out of California over the lines of the Southern Pacific. The average annual shipment is about five thousand two hundred and forty-one carloads and the minimum estimate of this year's shipment is said to have been placed quite low, especially as last year's businees amounted to six thousand seven hundred and sixty-four carloads; another reason being that the loss to the crop this year on account of


