SUGAR BEET FACTORY WILL LIKELY BE LOCAT-ED AT PORTALES SOON

Development Awaiting Outcome of Free Sugar Bill

Important Reperesentaives Here Looking Over Land

Present indications show that Portales is soon to have a million and half dollar sugar beet factory here in a short while. The American Sugar Manufacturing and Refining Company representatives came in Tuesday afternoon and spent Wednesday looking over the land and selecting sight for the factory. The American Sugar Manufacturing and Odd Fellows. Refining Company's representatives were men who hold high offices with the company, Judge Quinton being secretary and treasurer, Don A. the factory to take all of the beets, at a stated price, that he can raise on the number of acres that he puts in beets. In other localities an acre produces fifteen tons of beets which nets the farmer about \$45.00 per acre. Two men can work 30 acres of beets.

Portales needs this factory and she is doing her best to get it as the people recognize the fact that it will be the biggest thing in this section of country, because of fact that the farmer knows in the spring just what his crop is going to bring him in the fall.

A Co-operated Creamery

One of the best paying proposi tions to the dry farmers here is a co-operative creamery. Let each farmer take, say ten dollars worth of stock in the creamery for each cow that he has, then if that is not enough for the capital stock get the remainder of the Citizens Held Public Meeting money on the outside. The creamery will cost something like two thousand dollars to be gin with. It will take an exeprienced man to look after this and his services can be obtained for one hundred dollars a month, if hired by the month, or at one thousand dollars a year by a yearly contract. It will take two assistants to help, who can be secured for fifty dollars 8 month each. A man with a team can be hired to make a round each day and collect the cream from the farmer every two days. place the school here. One day he can take one route and the next day the other rorte. On account of the numerous false reports going the rounds in regard to our having quit buying bear grass and the way it should be prepared, we wish to advise that we are still in the market when it has been prepared and baled as per our first set of rules which we had published in the Portales Times and the Roosevelt County Herald some time ago. Now that there may be no misunderstanding, we again give the following rules which must be observed if you expect us to buy and ship your bear grass.

In preparing the plants they must be split open, and anything that is worth cutting is worth splitting, and cut off from the roots above the ground close up to the lower live leaves and above all dead or rotten leaves and there must not be any more of the root or bulb left attached to the plants than is needed to hold the leaves together, and all dirt or sand must be shaken out of the plants before being baled, and all green or partly green IHC Gasoline Engines and wet plants and all rotten leaves, roots, trash, and waste material generally must be excluded from the bales.

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
Senatorial Trifles Cost Much Money



WASHINGTON .- The vanities, follies and eccentricities of statesmen are brought a trifle further into the limelight through the secretary of the senate's annual report, made public in congress. It discloses the little odds and ends of luxury and comfort near a senator's heart, when it can be obtained at government expense.

From May 1 to June 28 there were \$32 cases of appoliharis splits furnished the senate, costing \$1,856. Taxicabs for taking senators home at the close of sessions cost \$110. 




