## NOTICE

 TO BEAR GRASS PRODUCERSOn account of the numerous false reports going the rounds in regard to our having quit buying bear grass and the way it should be prepared, we wish to advise pared and baled as per our first set of rules which we had published in the Portales Times and the Roosevelt County Herald some time ago. Now that there may be no misunderstanding, we again give the following rules which must be observed if you expect us to buy and ship your bear grass.
In preparing the plants they must be split open, and anything that is worth cutting is worth splitting, and cut off from the roots above the ground close up to the lower live leaves and above all dead or rotten leaves and there must not be any more of the root or bulb left attached to the plants than is needed to hold the leaves together, and all dirt or sand must be shaken out of the and wet plants and all rotten leaves, roots, trash, and waste material generally must be excluded from the bales.

After being prepared as above described, the plants must be laid straight in box presses and pressed into wide, weighing about 250 pounds each high, bound with 3 baling wires and must be dry and clean.

Harris'. <br> Letter From Champ Clark Mr. W. O. McCormick, <br> Rogers, N. M. <br> My dear Sir: <br> I am writing you because you used to live in Missouri and I feel-that you are friendly to me. I will deeply appreciate your active help. <br> The Democrats of your state are progressive; so am I. I bave been working for twentyfive years for progressive legislation. When I began it the word "Progressive" was not used in a political sense. <br> I voted for the Initiative and Referendum when the Constitutional Amendment was submitted in 1908. <br> I have continually fought for the election of United States Senators by the direct vote of the people. <br> I introduced, reported and secured the passage in the legislature of Missouri in 1889 of one of the first anti-trust laws ever passed by any State legislature in America. That lasw has been tested in all the courts, and nobody has ever been able to pick a flaw in it. Hundreds of thousands of dollars have been collected in fines under it, and three or four big trusts have been driven out of Missouri. It has served as a model for other states. <br> I introduced and secured the Australian ballot law. I voted | for the corrupt practice act while I was in the legislature. I had one of my friends intro duce the parole bill. My activity in having the pcimary introdused in my district and constantly agitating the subject at last secured a general primary law in Missouri <br> As minority leader I led the dight to overthrow the house machine and liberalize the rules. I also led the flightagainst the Payne tariff bill, which attracted the attention of the whole country and gave us the House in 1910. <br> I have advocated and voted for every progressive measure introduced into the House in the last nineteen years. All these things are matters of record. There is nothing in $m y$ career that I have to explain away or apologize for. A public record of past performances is the best guarantee for the future that a man can give. It is worth more than all the promises in the world. <br> I hope you will see your neighbors and friends in my behalf. I now have eighty four delegates to Baltimore; Governor Wilson has ten. <br> Your friend, <br> Champ Clark. <br> Tariff Discussion <br> Washington, April 28.-Tariff discussion will begin in the senate this week after prolonged hearings of the finance committee over the various Democratic measures sent over by the house. Senator Cummins of Iowa will introduce tomorrow the bill which he drafted to make a sharp reduction in the iron and steel schedule of the tariff law. He will speak on it Wednesday. Democrats and some of thepro- | gressive Republicans expect they may reach some common ground on the basis of this bill with a view to forcing rẹvision legislature through the senate. Senator Simmons of North Carolina is in charge of the house bill and expects to call it up Tuesday. <br> Tomorrow the postoftice appropriation bill, one of the heaviest of the supply measures, prob. ably will be passed in the house <br> The bill for direct popular election of United States senators, already passed by the house but amended in the senate to provide for federal supervision, may be brought up in the house tomor row on a motion of the house con. ferees to accept the senateamend ment. This, if adopted, would mean the enactment of the law. The conferees had been dead locked on the senate amendment for months. <br> The senate committee on commerce, and the house committee on merchant marine are considering measures designed to insure the safety of ocean traffic, in the light of the Titanic disas. ter. The senate committee probably this week will recommend a bill to require two wireless telegraph operators on all ocean passenger craft of more than 5, 000 tons. Many measures affecting regulation of ocean traffic have been introduced in both bouses and pressure is being brought to bear from outside to expedite legislation to remedy conditions disclosed by the Titanic disaster. <br> The rivers and harbors appropriation bill, amended from its house form, will be ready to report to the senate probably this week.-Roswell News. <br> W.
